Cheryl Anderson

Cheryl Anderson is a professor and dean of the University of California San Diego Herbert Wertheim School of Public Health and Human Longevity Science and is the director of the UCSD Center of Excellence in Health Promotion and Equity. Her work has impacted U.S. nutrition policy strategies for the prevention of cardiovascular disease, chronic kidney disease and diet-related cancers. Cheryl is the chair of the American Heart Association (AHA) Council of Epidemiology and Prevention and the immediate past chair of the AHA's nutrition committee. She also currently serves on the editorial board of Circulation and Annual Reviews of Nutrition, and she was elected to the U.S. National Academy of Medicine in 2016. Cheryl is a member of St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Del Mar and is a member of the Del Mar Women's Collective. Her son, AJ, is a recent graduate of the Bishop's Class of 2025.

Mac Armstrong '93 - Past-President

Mac Armstrong '93 served as Bishop's Board of Trustees President 2023-2025. Mac is the chief executive officer and a member of the board of directors of Palomar Holdings Inc., a specialty property insurance carrier. He founded the company, leading it from a single-person startup to a publicly traded company. Prior to Palomar, Mac served as the president of Arrowhead General Insurance Agency, where he held the positions of chief financial officer and chief operating officer. He led the sale of Arrowhead to Brown & Brown, Inc. in 2012. His prior experience includes Spectrum Equity Investors, a private equity investment firm, and Alex. Brown & Sons/BT Alex. Brown Inc., an investment bank. Mac is a member of the board of advisors of Cloverlay Investment Management LLC, a private equity investment firm, and he is a former member of the board of trustees of The Gillispie School, where he served as president and remains a member of the investment committee. Mac earned an A.B. in history from Princeton University and is a member of Bishop's Class of 1993. Doug Arthur '99 is the current Bishop's Board of Trustees President and is the President and Chief Executive Officer of SENTRE, a vertically integrated commercial real estate investment management firm with experience totaling more than 12 million square feet and \$4.5 billion in transactional volume. Doug is a member of the Young Presidents' Organization (YPO) and sits on the board of directors and chairs the investment committee for Vesta (NYSE: VTMX), a publicly traded industrial real estate investment firm headquartered in Mexico City; past chair of the board of directors and executive committee for Rady Children's Hospital Foundation; and is active on the Policy Advisory Board for the Burnham-Moores Center for Real Estate at the University of San Diego. (NXGN-NASDAQ), www.HealthFusion.com. Other business involvements include 2005 co-founding of Corinthian Capital Group, a New York and Boston based middle market private equity fund, www.CorinthianCap.com; director from 2014-2021 of Genelux, a mature clinical stage biopharmaceutical company with a proprietary oncolytic virus-based technology platform, www.Genelux.com; major investor and 2016 to 2018 director of NIPD Genetics, a Cyprus-based biotechnology designer, developer and manufacturer of non-invasive diagnostic genetics tests, www.NIPD.com, with a lead role in securing 2019 transformative growth financing from Swedish healthcare firm, Medicover (MCOV-B.ST); 1985 co-founder with Jack Ford, son of President Gerald Ford, of InfoplaceUSA, providing customer services at regional shopping centers throughout the United States; chair and controlling shareholder from 2014 to 2018 of Xtreme Green Electric Vehicles, manufacturer of lithium-ion, iron-phosphate battery powered all-electric niche vehicles; former director of Group Aero, which provided advanced engineering, design and manufacturing services to the space, commercial aerospace and defense markets. Byron has served since 2005 on the advisory board of the Harvard Law School Program on Corporate Governance, www.Law.Harvard.Edu/programs/corp_gov, which hosts the world's leading blog on corporate governance and financial regulation. From 2000 to 2011, he was Of Counsel to Robbins, Geller, Rudman & Dowd, www.RGRDlaw.com, and its predecessor law firms, the world's largest plaintiffs' securities practice, investigating and civilly prosecuting financial fraud, with leadership roles in the historic litigations on behalf of victimized institutional investors at Enron, WorldCom, Dynegy, and AOL/TimeWarner. In 1994, Byron co-founded American Partners Capital Group with Dale Hanson, then CEO of the California

Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS), America's largest pension fund, to meet the needs of institutional investors and investment managers with capital formation in a variety of alternative asset categories. During the second of Jerry Brown's four terms as California Governor (1980-1983), Byron served as Legal Affairs Secretary, responsible for litigation by and against the Governor, judicial appointments, liaison with the Attorney General, Judiciary and State Bar, legal advice to the Governor and members of his Cabinet, and exercise of the Governor's powers of extradition and clemency. Byron attended Stanford University on a full Alfred P. Sloan academic scholarship, graduating with Great Distinction with an A.B. in Political Science, as a participant in the Honors Program in Social Thought and Institutions, and received his J.D. Magna Cum Laude from Harvard Law School.

Rev. Dr. Mark Hargreaves

Sonia Ramamoorthy is a surgeon who specializes in colorectal diseases. Founding chief of the UC San Diego Division of Colorectal Surgery within the UCSD Moores Cancer Center, Sonia is part of the translational oncology program. She is nationally recognized as a leader in the field of colorectal surgery and is slated to be the first Asian female president of the American Society of Colorectal Surgery in 2025. An advocate for diversity, equity and inclusion, Sonia founded the Women in Surgery Committee' and currently serves as the vice chair of the UCSD Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Committee. She is the faculty representative to the UC Regents Health Services Committee where she represents faculty from all seven UC health systems across the state, and she serves as the treasurer for her national society and on the board of governors for the American College of Surgeons, the board of advisors for UCSD Health and the San Diego Medical Society. Don Rosenberg
