STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

We are committed to ensuring high levels of learning for all students while fostering strong partnerships with families and the community. Our goal is to plan and implement effective family and parent involvement activities to improve student academic achievement and school performance. One way we support this effort is by participating in the Title I, Part A State Program, which provides funding to campuses with higher percentages of economically disadvantaged students. We recognize that some students may need the extra assistance available through the Title I program, as well as other programs, to reach their grade-level goals, and we are committed to providing an exceptional educational experience for all students.

EXPECTATIONS AND OBJECTIVES

Aledo ISD believes every student should have the opportunity to attain his/her full potential as an individual. Aledo ISD will maximize its resources to enable each student to become a successful learner. A key resource is its people: administrators, teachers, school staff, parents, and community members. The expectation of our PFE Program is to foster communication and decision-making with parents about student performance and to collaboratively support learning. Our objectives are:

- School and home must work together to realize higher student achievement.
- On-going, open door, meaningful communication will occur to facilitate mutual understanding and to stimulate student success.
- Aledo ISD will provide parents with ongoing communication regarding their student's

 and progress reports and report cards via the online gradebook in the parent portal.

The Aledo ISD PFE Policy is developed and revised at least annually by the Districtwide Effectiveness and Improvement Committee (DWEIC) with all required stakeholders including parents. The PFE Policy will be distributed to parents and the community through the student handbook and by posting it on the district and campus websites. Parent involvement is essential to a student's academic and emotional success. The district aims to help parents understand how they can actively participate in their child's education. At the start of each school year, each campus hosts a Curriculum Night, offering parents an

opportunity to understand the connection between curriculum, instruction, and assessment. During this event, parents receive training on the District Instructional Focus, the Professional Learning Community process that ensures all students achieve proficiency on grade-level standards, and discover ways to stay actively involved in their child's academic progress. Parents are also guided on how to monitor their child's progress through technology resources and the importance of partnering with teachers and schools throughout the year. Throughout the year, parents receive progress reports and local and state assessment data for their child, including guidance on how to interpret these reports. Ongoing opportunities are provided for parent/teacher collaboration throughout the year. In addition, information on state and local assessment data, along with updates on teaching and learning, is shared during school board meetings. These meetings are open to all parents and community members and are held at 6:00 p.m. on the third Monday of each month at the Aledo ISD Administrative Building, pending any changes due to holidays. Meeting dates and agendas are posted in advance on the Aledo ISD district website

At the elementary level, at least one scheduled parent-teacher conference will be held to discuss student achievement in relation to the student's progress, grade-level curriculum expectations, testing information, and any additional concerns raised by the teacher or parent.

In addition, staff, parents and families at Title I campuses receive training including the following:

- Explanation of Title I program participation
- Explanation of the purpose of the Title I program and planned use of funds
- Explanation of the Title I, Part A requirements
- PFE Policy & School-Parent Compact distribution, feedback and statement of the annual evaluation to meet the needs of students, school, parents, and community
- Parent's rights to be involved in school's programs and how to do so
- Parent's rights to request regular meetings to offer suggestions and be involved in the decisions regarding their child's education
- State the expectations for school performance, individual student assessments, and grade level curriculum

Parents and families are given at least two different opportunities annually to receive information about Title I. To involve as many participants as possible, feedback on the Parent and Family Engagement Policy and the School-Parent Compact is solicited in various ways, such as meeting discussions, surveys and committee involvement.

Parents receive training and resources to support their child's success during events like Back to School Night, Curriculum Night, parent-teacher conferences, and by receiving progress reports

and student assessment data throughout the year. Aledo ISD also promotes family learning through programs like Aledo Reads, which offers parents a list of books to read with their child over the summer, the Special Programs Fall Parent Training Night, offering sessions and handouts to help parents support their students' academic and functional needs at home; and a variety of ESL parent engagement events, where families receive hands-on materials to support English language development at home.

The district's Instructional Technology Hub helps parents understand how technology supports student learning in a safe environment. Parents and staff can also access virtual training on tools such as Remind, Launchpad, and the district's learning systems. These resources, offered in multiple languages, empower families to stay engaged and support safe and effective digital learning both at school and at home.

Aledo ISD will provide staff members with training on the importance of two-way communication with parents during staff meetings throughout the year. Teachers new to the district participate in the New Teacher Academy, where they receive training on effective parent communication and are provided with sample materials to support meaningful and productive interactions with families. In addition, district personnel will assist Title I schools in the evaluation and revision of their PFE policy and school-parent compact.

Aledo ISD recognizes the value of parent input in decision-making and is committed to working with parents as equal partners to support student success. A variety of opportunities exist for parent/community involvement in decision making through the Districtwide Effectiveness Improvement Committee (DWEIC), Campus Improvement Committees, Student Health Advisory Committee (SHAC) and other various parent/community-led committees (i.e. Aledo Growth Committee, Attendance Zone Committee).

The Districtwide Effectiveness and Improvement Committee (DWEIC), in collaboration with parents, will evaluate the Aledo ISD Parent and Family Engagement Policy.
