We're thankful for every act of kindness and partnership that helps lift up our students and staff and reminds us that we are all in this together!




Thank You Grandparents!

All About Health

This month, students across the district explored a variety of lessons focused on health and anatomy while also engaging in real-world experiences. School staff and students even joined in by donating blood, modeling the importance of giving back and supporting community health.

In Watauga, PE students worked together to build a lifesize human body puzzle, helping them better understand how body muscles work together. Medical Therapeutics students also visited Robert F. Woodall Elementary, where they taught first graders about body systems and shared simple tips for staying healthy. As part of these lessons, a PICU nurse from Erlanger Children's Hospital in Chattanooga visited to discuss practical ways students can care for their bodies.

At Jo Byrns High School, Mrs. Teasley's Anatomy and Physiology class has been exploring a wide range of topics. Students have studied directional terms, types of dissection incisions, and organ placement within the abdominal cavity. They've also investigated DNA and are now turning their focus to the integumentary system.












At Greenbrier High School, Anatomy and Physiology students learned about the muscular system through hands-on activities. Using rubber bands, they discovered how sustained contractions can lead to fatigue, energy loss, and a buildup of byproducts over time. The lesson included a chicken wing dissection, where students were able to visualize how muscles and bones work together in pairs.

White House Heritage High School and Springfield high school hosted blood drives for both teachers and students. At SHS, students collected 26 pints of blood—enough to save nearly 80 lives! Beyond the donations themselves, the event provided an important learning experience. Students built leadership skills through coordinating, recruiting, and managing the drive while also gaining insight into healthcare careers by observing clinical skills such as blood draws and patient interactions.

Together, these activities show how students at every level are learning more about health and wellness. knowledge they can carry with them well beyond the classroom!






CAREER WEEK

MARINE CORPS SILENT DRILL PLATOON | SEPT. 24TH


Lance Corporal Jalen Jones (Springfield High School Class of 2023) received a special honor at the White House on September 24. Jalen, a former Springfield Yellow Jackets football player, is now a member of the elite United States Marine Corps Silent Drill Platoon.

The Silent Drill Platoon is a 24-man unit that performs a unique exhibition drill with hand-polished M1 Garand rifles and fixed bayonets. Drills are executed entirely without verbal commands. Founded in 1948 and based at Marine Barracks Washington, the platoon is known for its precision, discipline, and ability to represent the professionalism and traditions of the Marine Corps at ceremonies across the nation and abroad.

On September 24, his platoon performed on the South Lawn of the White House for members of the President's cabinet and senior staff. Following the performance, President Trump invited the platoon into the Oval Office, where he presented each Marine with a presidential challenge coin.



We are proud to see our students representing the district with excellence, sportsmanship, and determination!

































Homecoming Highlights







