Fullerton School District Superintendent Dr. Bob Pletka Announces Retirement

After more than 13 years of dedicated leadership in the Fullerton School District (FSD), Superintendent Dr. Robert "Bob" Pletka has announced his plans to retire on February 1, 2026.

In a letter to the FSD community, Dr. Pletka expressed deep gratitude to students, staff, families, and community members, calling his time as superintendent "one of the greatest honors of my life."

"This district is so much more than a system of schools—it's a true community, woven together by people who care deeply about children and one another," Dr. Pletka shared.

During his tenure, Dr. Pletka has championed innovative instructional programs, expanded access to technology and personalized learning, and strengthened community partnerships to ensure students are prepared with the skills they need for the future. Under his leadership, the district has continued to live its motto, "Great Schools – Successful Kids," through academic excellence, creativity, collaboration, and a strong sense of belonging for all students.

"Dr. Pletka's leadership has left a lasting impact on the Fullerton School District," FSD Board of Trustees President Beverly Berryman said.

"His vision for innovation, his unwavering belief in our students, and his ability to connect with people have strengthened our schools and our community. Many superintendents have vision and leadership, but Dr. Pletka has a true heart and compassion for all students, committing himself to doing all he can to provide them with the best educational experiences and opportunities possible because he knows that is what every child deserves. On behalf of the Board of Trustees, we are

deeply grateful for his years of service and his dedication to ensuring that every FSD student has the opportunity to achieve success."

Dr. Pletka began his career in education more than 35 years ago as an elementary and middle school teacher in the Lake Elsinore Unified School District. He later served in leadership roles including Director of Instruction and Technology at Covina-Valley Unified, Associate Superintendent at Vista Unified, and Superintendent of El Centro Elementary School District before joining Fullerton in 2012.

A recognized leader in educational technology and 21st-century learning, Dr. Pletka is the author of two books—Educating the Net Generation: How to Engage Students in the 21st Century and My So-Called Digital Life. He earned his Doctorate in Education from the joint program at UC Irvine and Cal Poly Pomona, his Master's in Educational Technology from National University, and his Bachelor's in Communications from Cal State San Bernardino.

Beyond his professional accomplishments, Dr. Pletka has become a respected leader through his passion for cultivating a lifelong love of learning in students, his collaborative and caring leadership, and his gift for uniting the community in both moments of celebration and times of challenge.

As he looks ahead, Dr. Pletka says he is most eager to spend more time with his wife Katie, their six children, and grandchildren.

"I leave this role with deep appreciation—and deep peace—knowing that the Fullerton community will continue to care fiercely for its children and for each other," Dr. Pletka reflected.

The Fullerton School District Board of Trustees will begin the process of selecting the district's next superintendent in the coming months, ensuring a smooth transition of leadership.

Fullerton School District Speech and **Debate Team Wins Sixth Consecutive National Championship**

The Fullerton School District (FSD) Speech and Debate team has once again earned top national honors winning a sixth consecutive national championship at the 2025 National Speech and Debate Tournament, held in Des Moines, Iowa this June.

The prestigious event brought together more than 6,000 students from over 1,500

schools across the nation and world. At the middle school level, 829 students from 198 schools representing 40 states and five countries competed for top honors. This year also marked a historic milestone through the centennial celebration of the National Speech and Debate Association (NSDA). Students kicked off the tournament with a 100th birthday celebration at the Blank Park Zoo and explored a century of debate history through a special Centennial Timeline at the Iowa Events Center.

Representing FSD were students from Beechwood and Fisler Schools, Ladera Vista, Nicolas, and Parks Junior High Schools. Nearly every FSD school advanced students into the final rounds, a remarkable achievement with competitors reaching the top eight in the nation across 36 different events. Several FSD students placed among the top six competitors nationally in categories that included Original Spoken Word Poetry, Informative Speaking, Humorous Interpretation, and Poetry Interpretation.

One of the district's standout moments came when Parks Junior High's newly minted alumna Sabrina Samidon claimed first place in the nation for Original Oratory, a persuasive speech event focused on advocacy and

social impact. A runner-up finish for first for Informative Speaking featured a Fisler competitor, and two other FSD students saw top-three finishes in Humorous Interpretation and Poetry Interpretation.

FSD's championship win was reinforced by both Parks Junior High and Beechwood School receiving National Schools of Excellence awards.

Reflecting on the impact of the program during a recap meeting of the tournament with FSD's student-competitors, Cindy Hye Lee, an FSD teacher on special assignment supporting FSD's Speech and Debate program, shared that students overwhelmingly agreed this was a "surreal experience."

"It reminded me that Speech and Debate is about so much more than winning rounds—it's about finding our voice and using it to better the future," Lee paraphrased as the students' overall takeaway from the tournament.

Echoing that sentiment was FSD Speech and Debate competitor Arjun Parikh, Parks Junior High Class of 2025.

"Joining Speech and Debate was not only about winning rounds; it was truly about the friendships and experiences gained through competing and supporting teammates, all while using our voices to better the future."

With its sixth straight national title, FSD continues to set the standard for middle school Speech and Debate excellence. Students, teachers, and coaches alike say the victory reflects not just skill, but also the lasting values of teamwork, leadership, and the power of student voices.

A New Era

On September 17, Nicolas Junior High marked a historic milestone with the ribbon cutting of its brand-new Arts and Recreation Center (ARC). 
I can still see the sun-splashed blacktop at Green Elementary School in San Diego. In third grade, I navigated recess in my wheelchair, eager to play games but often uncertain how to break in. Then one day, something changed.

A Paralympic athlete — strong, confident and seated in a sleek racing wheelchair — visited campus to share his story and challenge students to a 100-meter dash. One by one, he left every competitor in the dust.

Later, I saw his car, outfitted with hand controls. I noticed the way he carried himself — capable, independent and assured. Until that day, I hadn't fully imagined those possibilities for myself. That single moment expanded my vision of what was possible and, in subtle but lasting ways, shifted how my classmates saw me, too.

The experience taught me something I carry to this day: Every student needs a connection that inspires them — a spark.



Solar-Powered Learning

Thanks to a \$20,000 Bright Futures Grant awarded to the Fullerton Education Foundation by the Orange County Power Authority, Nicolas Junior High's innovative Tiny Home Project is shining brighter than ever. Students will soon build a third tiny home, featuring lessons on solar installation. Funding will also allow the school's two existing tiny homes to be retrofitted with solar power.

In addition, the Tiny Home Project has sparked the creation of a new Construction Trade Academy at Nicolas Junior High. Through this program, students dedicate two class periods each day to hands-on building, learning directly from industry guest speakers, and exploring the entrepreneurial side of construction. Collectively, these opportunities empower students with real-world skills, teamwork, and a deeper understanding of sustainable building practices.

The future is bright—literally and figuratively—as FSD students continue to innovate and lead in career-connected learning.



The Cost of War

R.F. Kuang's *The*Poppy War is a haunting, beautifully composed masterpiece that weaves the physically taxing process of training with the emotionally draining devastation that follows.
Kuang's prose is sharp,



addictive, and incredibly poignant.


Fang Runin (Rin), the ambitious protagonist, learns from the beginning of her orphaned life that survival demands sacrifices. After escaping a forced marriage, Rin earns a place at the prestigious Sinegard Academy and discovers she possesses shamanic powers.

The story soon plunges into the absolute nightmares of war; from pathetic bargains to soulless, brutal warriors, Rin struggles to find humanity in herself after being stripped away of all but her survival instincts.

The Poppy War is a stunning work of art, and has quickly become one of my all-time favorites. It is a must-read for mature readers over 12.

A Passionate Breath

When Breath Becomes Air is an eloquent, poignant memoir by Paul Kalanithi. After being diagnosed with stage 4 lung cancer, Kalanithi confronts the fragility of life and the inevitable question of his confusing purpose. His love for literature rivaled his passion for science- two opposites that regularly clashed, but sometimes, beautifully intertwined. This deep understanding of literature, combined



with first-hand experience as a doctor, allowed Kalanithi to capture his journey of accepting his fate; and all the tensions- ups, downs- that accompanied it.

As a doctor, Kalanithi was immensely familiar in escorting patients into life and back- a raw sensation; either heart-warming or heart-breaking. However, being the patient escorted by a doctor was truly different. This touching reflection invites us to seek meaning in our lives, reminding us of our own morality. In my opinion, When Breath Becomes Air deserves 5/5 stars.
