Credits and Promotion

Credits

How many credits are needed to be in 11th Grade?

11 credits at the start of the 2025/26 school year

- No mid year promotion
- If less than 11 credits, the student is classified as a 10th grader

How many credits are required to be in the 12th grade?

17 credits earned by the start of the 2026/2027 school year

- If a student does not have 17 credits, the student will be classified as an 11th grader
- If a student gains 20 credits by end of first semester, the student will be promoted to 12th grade for the second semester

Credit Recovery Options

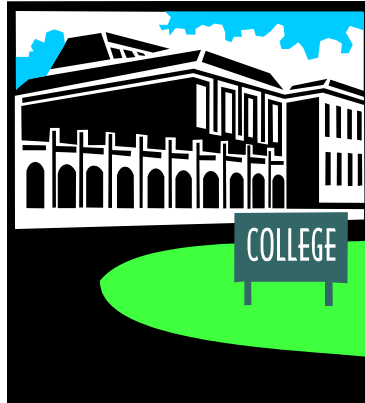
- Students can make up failed credits in different ways:
 - **Credit Recovery:** Students can be assigned to the Credit Recovery Lab to make up failed courses. Not every course is available as a Credit Recovery course
 - **Summer School:** Students can make up courses via Summer School. This may be required if the course is not available as a Credit Recovery course
 - **Retake Course:** Students can re-take the failed course in its entirety to make up the course

NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse



- If you are planning on participating in intercollegiate athletics at an NCAA Division I or II institution, you must register with the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse .
 - **Access the registration materials by visiting the NCAA website www.ncaaclearinghouse.net**
 - When taking the SAT/ACT, enter 9999 for scores to be sent to NCAA
 - Students and parents are responsible for determining NCAA eligibility to Division I and Division II schools
- At the end of the junior year, request a transcript to be sent to NCAA
 - Counselors are neither responsible nor allowed to determine eligibility

- ▶ Be aware that the NCAA may or may not approve courses taken through a non-traditional format such as online, test-out, distance learning, correspondence, credit recovery, etc.
- ▶ Counselors are not responsible for researching or advising NCAA policies. It is up to the student and family to investigate NCAA regulations as they pertain to non-traditional courses

Junior Meetings

All Juniors and their parents/guardians are invited to make an appointment with their assigned counselor to go over senior year classes and answer questions.

Do your research. Knowledge is power!

- **Use the Internet** - www.collegeboard.org, www.gafutures.org, etc.
- **Academic Common Market**-multiple states offer in-state tuition for majors not offered in Georgia www.sreb.org
- **Visit college websites** to review services, requirements and deadlines
- **Attend Virtual College Visits at CHS** – Register online through Schoolinks
- **Visit college campuses** – Take advantage of long weekends, teacher work days, summer
- **Attend college fairs and programs**

***Apply to Colleges Senior Year**

Becoming Strongest Applicant

- Show: Interests, Passions, & Values
- Explore summer programs and internships/shadowing opportunities
- Academic profile – Take advantage of high school curriculum. Work up to ability level. “rigor without grades”
- Upward transcript progression
- AP classes/Dual Enrollment
- Apply when strongest applicant – Early or Regular Decision
- Apply Senior year!
 - Will have class meetings at the beginning of senior school year to review application process and procedures

Focus Your List

Narrow your list of colleges – balance is key

View the school profiles and compare the admissions data to your own academic record and test scores.

- ▶ **Dream/Reach school (less than 30% chance of admission) – Pick 1 or 2**
 - Your Academic Record/Test scores are below average of Freshman Profile
 - Very competitive admissions; low acceptance rates

- ▶ **Good Fit/Target school (30%-60% chance of admission) – Pick 2 - 4**
 - Your Academic Record/Test Scores are in line with Freshman Profile

- ▶ **Safety school (greater than 60% chance of admission) – Pick 1 or 2**
 - Your Academic Record/Test Scores are above the average Freshman Profile

Apply to schools that are a good match for your personality, interests, financial situation and career goals

College Entrance Exams

SAT

College admission test which measures aptitude and skill in math, evidence-based reading and writing.

ACT

College admission test which measures aptitude and skill in Math, Reading, English, Science (optional), and writing (optional).

It is recommended students take the SAT and/or ACT twice during junior year and once at the beginning of their senior year

Getting Ready for the SAT/ACT

- PSAT/NMSQT: Testing in early October for all juniors. Score report available in the student's College Board account- typically in December
- Become familiar with the SAT/ACT question types, format, and directions (SAT Question of the Day)
- Sign up for a prep course
 - Khan Academy (free)
 - Watch Cambridge Headlines and newsletter for local prep course info

Option: when registering for SAT/ACT, select scores to be sent for FREE (4 colleges)- scores will be sent before you can review them

HOPE Academic Requirements

HOPE SCHOLARSHIP

- Earn a 3.0 GPA in high school (calculated by GA Student Finance Commission)
- Minimum of 4 courses of Rigor
- Recipients must have 3.0 GPA at checkpoints in college to maintain

ZELL MILLER SCHOLARSHIP

- Graduate valedictorian or salutatorian
OR
- Earn a 3.7 GPA in high school AND earn a 1200 combined score of reading and math on a single administration of the SAT or a 25 composite score on a single administration of the ACT by your graduation date
- Minimum of 4 courses of Rigor
- Recipients must have 3.3 GPA at checkpoints in college to maintain

HOPE GPA Calculation

A 3.0 GPA is required by averaging core coursework, including failing grades, on a 4.0 scale

A	90 to 100	4.0 Points
B	80 to 89	3.0 Points
C	70 to 79	2.0 Points
F	0 to 69	0 Points

Honors points are removed and a 0.50 weighting is added back in for AP and College courses only, not to exceed 4.0

Middle school credit is not calculated in the HOPE GPA

All calculations are done by the Georgia Student Finance Commission

A 2.999 GPA does NOT qualify you for HOPE. GPA's are not rounded up.

HOPE Grant Academic Requirements

HOPE GRANT

- Available to students seeking a technical certification or diploma regardless of high school GPA or graduation date
- No course of Rigor requirement
- Covers a percentage amount of the standard tuition charges from the previous year. Subject to change annually.
- Must earn cumulative GPA of 2.0 at 30 semester hours/60 semester hours to maintain

ZELL MILLER GRANT

- Available to students seeking a technical certification or diploma regardless of high school GPA or graduation date
- No course of Rigor requirement
- Covers full standard rate of tuition
- Cumulative GPA of 3.5 each term to maintain

Dual Enrollment Opportunities

Dual Enrollment

An opportunity for students to attend a postsecondary institution full-time or part-time during high school

Students will receive high school credit and college credit simultaneously while attending college classes on the college campus or virtually.

- Tuition is paid through local system funds (30 credit max.)
- Any student interested must notify their counselor and request a meeting prior to the stated FCS deadlines.

*The deadline for applications to be submitted to the college and paperwork to CHS counseling department is late March 2026, regardless of college application deadlines- exact deadline will be posted on DE paperwork when it becomes available
