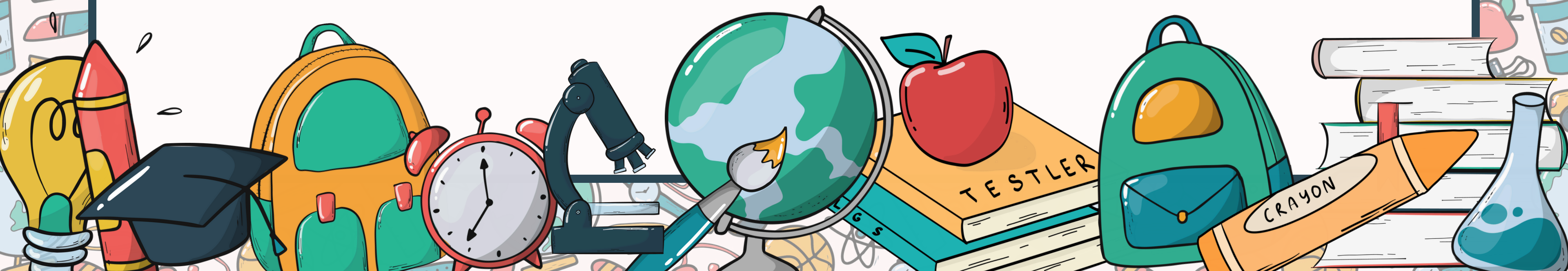
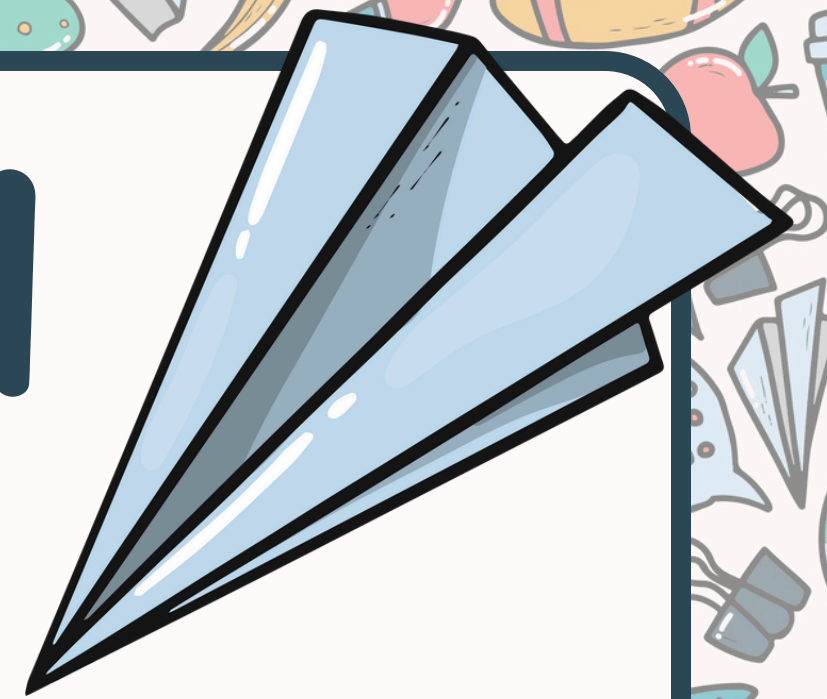

What is a Title I School?

Title I began in 1965 (ESEA–Elementary and Secondary Education Act) as a federal program to ensure equal opportunities for low income school districts. Through Title I, the federal government disburses money to school districts based on the number of low-income families in each district as determined by census data. The school uses its Title I money to supplement and improve educational programs offered to help ALL students meet state standards.



Title I Money

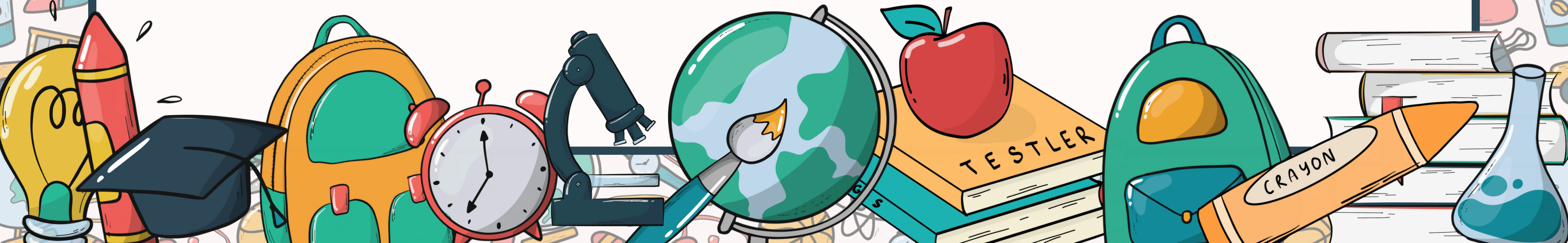


These funds may be used for children from preschool aged to high school. Title I is designed to support State and local school reform efforts tied to challenging State academic standards in order to reinforce and enhance efforts to improve teaching and learning for students. Title I programs must be based on effective means of improving student achievement and include strategies to support parental involvement.

How does our school spend Title I Money?

- Hiring additional teachers and other support staff.
- Providing professional development for teachers and staff.
- Purchasing supplemental (additional) instructional materials, resources, and educational programs.

Staff Members provided by Title I help to lower the student-teacher ratio.

What is required by law for Parental engagement?

- Notification of Highly Qualified Teacher and Paraprofessional Status (Parents right to know)
- Notification of School Status under ESEA
- 1% of system allocation must be reserved for parental involvement
- At least one annual parent conference must be offered

What is the school's Parent and Family Engagement Policy?

What is a Parent's right to know?

In compliance with the requirements of the Every Students Succeeds Act (ESSA), the Jefferson County School System would like to inform you that you may request information about the professional qualifications of your student's teacher(s) and/or paraprofessional(s). The following information may be requested:

- Whether the student's teacher(s) –
 - **has met State qualification and licensing criteria for the grade levels and subjects areas in which the teacher provides instruction;
- is teaching under emergency or other provisional status through which State qualification or licensing criteria have been waived; and
- is teaching in the field of discipline of the certification of the teacher.
 - **Whether the child is provided services by paraprofessional(s), and, if so, his/her qualifications.

Parent ProTech



In April 2024, the state of Georgia enacted Senate Bill 351, know as the Protecting Georgia's Children on Social Media Act. It requires schools to:

- Create and enforce social media policies on school devices and internet access.
- Include digital citizenship and online safety instruction in school curricula.

-To help schools meet these new requirements, the Georgia Department of Education has partnered with Parent ProTech, a platform offering lessons, parent tools, and resources tailored for digital citizenship education. This platform is available to our district and families.
