## AREAS OF FOCUS

## ANNUAL ADMINISTRATORS' RETREAT & LEADERSHIP MEETINGS

Each summer, and at least monthly throughout the school year, the Administrative Team meets for professional development opportunities. These include, but are not limited to annual lead evaluator recertification, legal and regulatory updates and dedicated time for collaboration around the District's mission statement and goals.



## ELWOOD PROFESSIONAL LEARNING ACADEMY (EPLA)

The District has established the Elwood Professional Learning Academy (EPLA) in order to offer a variety of courses to instructional staff members. The Mission of the ELPA is to provide high-quality professional learning opportunities for educators to enrich their teaching practice and improve student learning and achievement. Classes are offered after school, evenings, weekends and during the summer.



The Office of Curriculum and Instruction has developed an extension of our onboarding practices to support new teachers and teacher assistants during their first year in the Elwood School District. The program is designed to provide new staff members with essential information and enhance pedagogical skills to ensure their success within the Elwood School District. During our after-school mentoring sessions with district administrators we share important information for success, provide the opportunity for discussion about district-wide initiatives, invite guest speakers, and participate in a book talk as well. These sessions are designed around new teacher feedback and requests. We use this information to plan each session. A mentor is assigned to new teachers and this mentor is responsible for providing support for their mentees outside of the school day.

## WESTERN SUFFOLK BOCES MODEL SCHOOLS

The [Model Schools Program](#) is a statewide initiative that offers support to teachers in the area of technology integration in order to facilitate the implementation of the New York State Learning Standards. ## MY LEARNING PLAN IN FRONTLINE EDUCATION

Elwood School District provides [Frontline Education](#) for staff to track their professional development journey. This tool provides a catalog of goal-aligned learning opportunities from a variety of organizations. The software is designed to assist the Administrative Team in supporting the unique needs of each staff member with individual Professional Development plans and targets learning opportunities. Instructional staff and Administrators can use Frontline to track the workshops they have attended and reflect on their experiences in a required evaluation form. This feedback can be used by Administration to help guide beneficial learning experiences for all members of the staff.

## TITLE III CONSORTIUM

The LI RBERN serves as Lead Applicant for Suffolk County's [Title III Consortium](#) which comprises eligible school districts in Suffolk County. The Consortium focuses on enhancing the education of English Language Learners (ELLs) in order to meet the New York State Learning Standards through the infusion and integration of instructional technology into English as a New Language (ENL) programs. Through this federally funded program, ENL teachers in participating districts receive comprehensive professional learning opportunities, on-site embedded coaching, training in interpreting assessment data, instructional technology, educational software, and subscriptions to online resources/applications.

## WS BOCES & OTHER PROFESSIONAL ORGANIZATIONS

Our instructional staff has the opportunity to submit requests to the Administrative Team for additional professional development. Many of these workshops are provided through our partnership with BOCES or other professional organizations.

# UNDERSTANDING HOW TO MAINTAIN VALID CERTIFICATION

- All certified professionals must maintain their TEACH account at NYSED.
- All certified professionals must register their certificates with NYSED every five years (for all types of certificates).
- All Professional Certificate Holders and Level III Teaching Assistants (not Permanent or Initial Certificate Holders), must earn 100 hours of CTLE every five years, including hours for language acquisition for ELLs (15 hours, except TESOL certified teachers must have 50 hours).
- All Professional Certificate Holders and Level III Teaching Assistants must maintain their own records of CTLE hours earned and must send the ELWOOD HR DEPARTMENT a list of CTLE hours they have earned WITH COPIES OF OFFICIAL CERTIFICATES, every June.

Note - these Registration and CTLE requirements do not apply to holders of Continuing Teaching Assistant certificates and Pupil Personnel Services (PPS) certificates, such as School Attendance Teachers, School Counselors, School Psychologists, School Social Workers, School Dental Hygiene Teachers and School Nurse Teachers.

## NYSED REGISTRATION OF CERTIFICATION

Registration and Continuing Teacher and Leader Education (CTLE) Requirements

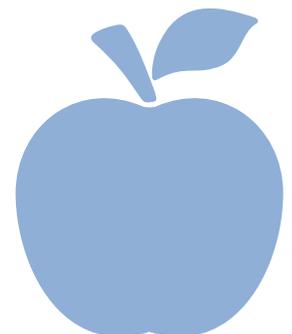
Educators who hold one or more of the following certificates must register with the Department every five years:

- Permanent or Professional certificate in the classroom teaching service
- Permanent or Professional certificate in the educational leadership service (i.e., School Building Leader, School Administrator/Supervisor, School District Leader, School District Administrator, School District Business Leader, or School Business Administrator)
- Teaching Assistant Level III certificate

# ACCEPTABLE CTLE ACTIVITIES

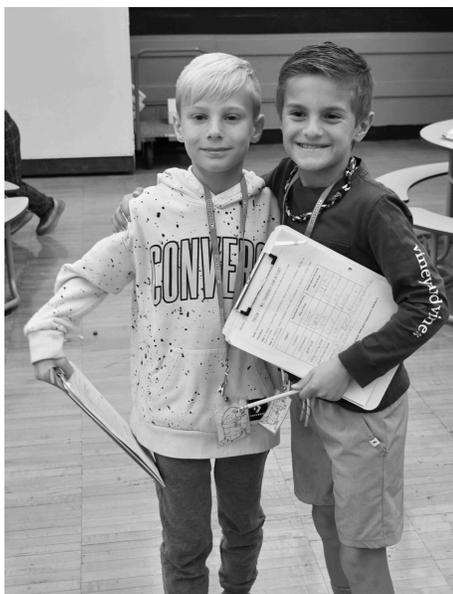
- Acceptable CTLE activities are designed to improve the teacher or leader's pedagogical and/or leadership skills and are targeted at improving student performance, including but not limited to formal CTLE activities. Such activities also shall promote the professionalization of teaching and educational leadership, as applicable, and be closely aligned to district goals for student performance.
- Acceptable CTLE includes activities:
  - **Content area(s)** of the certificate(s) held,
  - and/or Pedagogy,
  - and **Language Acquisition** addressing the needs of English Language Learners.
- The CTLE in the content area can be in the content area of any certificate held, including certificates not subject to CTLE (e.g., Initial/Permanent certificates). CTLE activities in pedagogy could be appropriate general pedagogy or pedagogy specific to the content area of the certificate(s). The CTLE language acquisition requirement is described [here](#).

# UNIVERSITY OR COLLEGE COURSE CREDITS

- Courses completed at an institution of higher education (IHE) can count towards the CTLE requirement only if the IHE is an approved CTLE sponsor and awards CTLE clock hours for the courses.
- For credit-bearing university or college courses, each semester hour of credit is equal to 15 clock hours of CTLE, and each quarter-hour of credit is equal to 10 clock hours of CTLE. For all other approved CTLE activities, one CTLE clock hour is a minimum of 60 minutes of instruction/education.
- Note: the sponsoring agency must issue the CTLE certificate

# WORKING WITH COLLEAGUES - MENTORING

- Teachers who provide mentoring may, at the discretion of the school district or BOCES, earn CTLE clock hours in the following manner.
- Teachers acting as mentor to new classroom teachers as part of a school district's mentoring program may, at the discretion of the school district, credit up to 30 hours of such time towards their CTLE requirement in each five-year registration period.
- Teachers must submit logs with dates, clock hours, and a summary of activities to earn a CTLE certificate sponsored by the Elwood School District.





# CTLE SPONSOR: ISSUING CERTIFICATES AND RECORDS MAINTENANCE

The Elwood UFSD issues certificates for CTLE hours sponsored by the district for completed activities. Certificates are issued through Frontline Professional Growth - formerly known as My Learning Plan. Records of all CTLE hours granted by Elwood UFSD are maintained in Frontline without expiration, for a minimum of at least 8 years.

### CTLE RECORDING KEEPING AND DOCUMENTATION REQUIREMENTS

Educators must maintain personal records of completed continuing teacher and education leader (CTLE), including:

- The title of the activities;
- Total number of hours completed;
- Number of hours completed in content, pedagogy, language acquisition addressing the needs of English language learners;
- Approved CTLE sponsor's name and number;
- Educators' identifying information listed on the activities;
- Attendance verification; and
- Date and location of the activities.

A sample CTLE recordkeeping form is available [online](#).

Educators must maintain CTLE records and documentation for at least three years from the end of the registration period in which they completed the CTLE.

### EDUCATOR DOCUMENTATION

Educators will not send documentation of their CTLE clock hours to the Department for the re-registration process. However, their CTLE documentation must be available upon request by the Department. For all of their CTLE activities, educators should be able to either:

- Provide the [Completion of Approved CTLE Hour\(s\) Certificate form](#) (CTLE completion form), or
- Provide an alternative form or format that captures the same information requested on the CTLE completion form (e.g., CTLE certificates), or
- Be able to generate a CTLE certificate with the information requested on the CTLE completion form (e.g., from a management system).

Please note that summaries of activities listed in management systems will not be accepted as documentation of CTLE clock hours at this time if the Department requests documentation. Educators must have certificates from the approved sponsor for each activity.

The Elwood School District requires all personnel subject to CTLE to submit an annual log of activities for CTLE to the Human Resources Office, to demonstrate progress toward the required minimum hours for CTLE, including hours related to the instruction of English as a New Language students.

### EDUCATOR DOCUMENTATION

From NYSED - Any change of name or address for a certificate holder must be updated by the holder in the TEACH system within thirty days of such change. A certificate holder who fails to inform the Department of his or her name or address change may be subject to moral character review.

# ELWOOD UFSD MENTORING PROGRAM FOR NEW TEACHERS

## Philosophy and Purpose

- A well-structured and properly implemented mentoring program will provide our new teachers with a most important support component. This program is designed not just to acclimate the novice teacher to the District, but also to provide the ongoing resource of a highly skilled and veteran staff member throughout the teacher's first year of employment. The availability and active participation of the veteran teacher as mentor will, we believe, enhance the newly hired staff members prospects for ultimately achieving sustained success in the profession.

## Mentor Selection and Overview

- In early August, the building principal will, following approval from the Assistant Superintendent for Human Resources after appropriate consultation, appoint a veteran teacher to serve as a full-year mentor for each newly hired teacher. Whenever possible, the mentor should be teaching at the same grade level or in the same content area as the newly hired teacher. (Where the effective date of employment is other than September, the selection will be made as soon as practicable after the new staff member is hired.)
- Persons chosen as mentors will be exemplary, experienced professionals with up-to-date knowledge of effective instructional strategies. They will also possess above-average interpersonal skills, to ensure that the mentor-mentee relationship is a successful one, with frequent communication in an atmosphere of mutual trust. The mentor is to understand that participation in the program is on a strictly voluntary basis. In addition, the mentor must subscribe fully to the scope of responsibilities, detailed herein.
- The District shall, whenever deemed necessary, provide mentors with appropriate preparation and training. Such preparation and training shall include, but shall not be limited to, the study of the theory of adult learning, the theory of teacher development, the elements of a mentoring relationship, peer coaching techniques and time management methodology.
- It is the position of the District that the mentoring program is more likely to be successful if newly hired teachers know that they can freely discuss any perceived shortcomings or performance difficulties with the mentor, secure in the knowledge that such disclosures will not, in and of themselves, be part of their evaluations. Consequently, the mentor will have no supervisory or evaluation role whatsoever.
- We recognize that, notwithstanding careful selection in mentor-mentee pairing, personality variables may, on rare occasions, be such that the program becomes unproductive for a particular new teacher. If the incompatibility is so pronounced as to justify an adjustment, the principal will, in consultation with, and following approval from the Assistant Superintendent for Human Resources, identify a new mentor teacher as soon as possible.
- Scope of Mentoring Responsibilities
- The NY State draft guidelines on mentoring characterize the ideal mentor-mentee relationship as, "...professional, flexible, trustful, mutually educational and entailing sustained, frequent contact." With this in mind, the mentor and mentee will meet formally on at least a weekly basis throughout the year. Principals will make every effort to ensure that scheduling permits optimal opportunities for this to occur.
- In agreeing to serve as a mentor, a senior teacher agrees that the scope of responsibility will include, as a minimum, the topics listed below. In addition, the mentor will be available to discuss with the mentee any performance issues that may require attention. It is also suggested that periodic scheduling adjustments be appropriately considered, so as to allow the mentor time to observe the new teacher in a classroom instruction setting. It is to be understood, however, that such observations would be solely for the purpose of providing constructive feedback and should therefore not be construed in any way as supervisory.
- The District believes that, to effect continued program improvement wherever possible, it is important to consider each participant's evaluation of the mentoring experience. All mentors and mentees will therefore be asked to complete a written program assessment at the end of the academic year.
