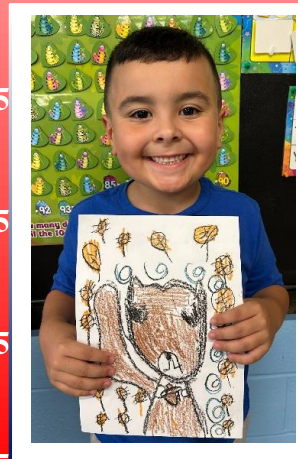

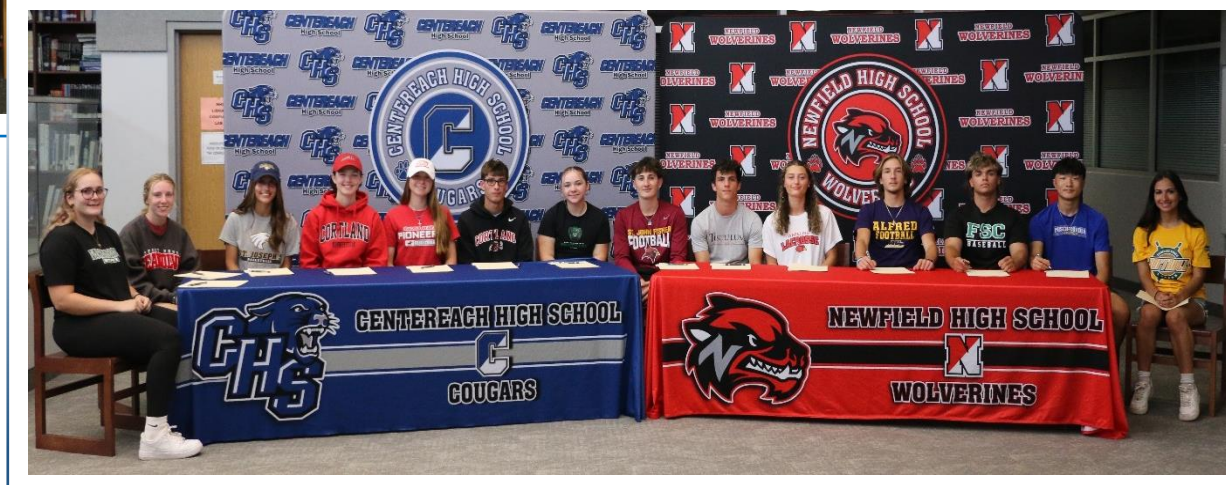

Parents' Bill of Rights for Student Data Privacy and Security

The Middle Country Central School District, in recognition of the risk of identity theft and unwarranted invasion of privacy, affirms its commitment to safeguarding student personally identifiable information (PII) in educational records from unauthorized access or disclosure in accordance with state and federal law. The Middle Country Central School District establishes the following parental bill of rights:

- Student PII will be collected and disclosed only as necessary to achieve educational purposes in accordance with state and federal law.
- The District and its schools, and third-party contractors and subcontractors, will not sell student PII or use or disclose it for any marketing or commercial purposes or facilitate its use or disclosure by any other party for any marketing or commercial purpose or permit another party to do so.
- Parents have the right to inspect and review the complete contents of their child's education record (for more information about how to exercise this right, see Policy 5500-R).
- State and federal laws, such as NYS Education Law §2-d and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act, protect the confidentiality of students' personally identifiable information. Safeguards associated with industry standards and best practices, including but not limited to encryption, firewalls, and password protection, must be in place when data is stored or transferred.
- A complete list of all student data elements collected by the State Education Department is available for public review at [Student Data Inventory](#) or by writing to: Chief Privacy Officer, New York State Education Department, 89 Washington Avenue, Albany, NY 12234.
- Parents have the right to have complaints about possible breaches and unauthorized disclosures of student data addressed. Complaints should be directed to Jonathan Singer, Assistant Superintendent for Instruction, at 8 43rd Street, Centereach, NY 11720 or jsinger@mccsd.net or by telephone at 631-285-8010. Complaints can also be directed to the New York State Education Department by email: privacy@nysed.gov or telephone at 518-474-0937 or by mail to the Chief Privacy Officer, New York State Education Department, 89 Washington Avenue, Albany, NY 12234.

- Parents have the right to be notified in accordance with applicable laws and regulations if a breach or unauthorized release of their student's PII occurs.
- All district and school employees and officers with access to PII will receive annual training on applicable federal and state laws, regulations, district and school policies and safeguards which will be in alignment with industry standards and best practices to protect PII.
- In the event that the District engages a third-party provider to deliver student educational services, the contractor or subcontractors will be obligated to adhere to state and federal laws to safeguard student PII. Mission Statement

The mission of the Middle Country Central School District is to empower and inspire all students to apply the knowledge, skill and attitudes necessary to be creative problem solvers, to achieve personal success, and to contribute responsibly in a diverse and dynamic world. Our commitment to this mission is embodied in our on-going strategic objectives:

- Each student will continually identify personal goals, and develop and implement plans for achieving those goals.
- Each student will choose to continually contribute to the community in a responsible manner.
- Each student will identify and implement creative solutions to increasingly challenging problems within his/her world.

Instructional Programs

Elementary Program

The academic program at the elementary level follows a carefully planned continuum. Instruction and assessments are interrelated across subject areas and defined by high standards, which describe what students should know and be able to do in order to succeed. English language arts, mathematics, science and social studies curricula are fully aligned with New York State common core standards.

The core subjects in the elementary program include English language arts (speaking, listening, reading and writing), mathematics, science and social studies; these are integrated across all grade levels. Children read and write across all content subject areas using a variety of materials, which focus on in-depth understanding as well as mechanics.

Computers are used as a tool to enhance the instructional program. All students beginning in pre-kindergarten are supplied with personal Chromebooks to be kept throughout the remainder of their school career in the District.

Each school has the services of literacy specialists who assist the classroom teacher in providing services to children in need of raising their skill level as well as those requiring enrichment opportunities. For more information about the elementary program, contact the principal of your child's school.

Secondary Program

The academic program at the middle school includes the core areas of English language arts, social studies, mathematics and science, along with related subjects.

In the high schools, classes are organized by level. Placement is based on skill development, interest and need. Emphasizing rigorous standards and building on students' previous acquisition of knowledge, regents, honors and advanced placement courses are offered. A wide range of electives allows students to explore a variety of subjects or concentrate in one area. In order to determine academic standing, students are ranked at the end of their junior year.

Extra-help programs and Saturday Regents review classes are offered at both the middle and high school levels. For more information about the secondary program, contact your child's school counselor or the principal of your child's school.

Progress Reports

Progress reports for pupils in grades kindergarten through five are issued three times during the school year. Formal parent/teacher conferences are scheduled in the fall for kindergarten and elementary level children.

High schools and middle schools issue progress reports every ten weeks and report cards at these levels are issued four times a year.

All parents are encouraged to contact their child's school counselor or teacher to request a conference any time during the year and also to create a Parent Portal Account.

State and National Testing

All students participate in the New York State testing program. This program includes the following assessments: Grade 3 – English Language Arts and Math; Grade 4 – English Language Arts, Math; Grade 5 – English Language Arts, Math and Science; Grade 6 – English Language Arts and Math; Grade 7 – English Language Arts and Math; Grade 8 – English Language Arts, Algebra (Regents) and Living Environment. All high school students must complete four years of Mathematics, a Capstone Research Project and take the required New York State Regents Examinations, during their four-year high school career. Information regarding all graduation requirements is contained in the Course Offering Book which is posted on the District's website. For further information about testing programs, please contact the principal of your child's school.

Graduation Requirements

As New York State phases in new graduation requirements, educational demands differ from grade level to grade level.

Course Offering Handbook

The Course Offering Handbook information is available on the District's Website and can also be obtained through the guidance departments. School counselors are available to meet with students and parents to discuss graduation requirements and assist with course scheduling. Parents and students are asked to consult the high school guidance department for a list of graduation requirements.

Career Education Services

The Middle Country Central School District's secondary students have occupational education programs available to them at both Centereach and Newfield High Schools.

District offerings include: Business/Marketing, Cosmetology, Technology, General Work Experience, and Family & Consumer Sciences.

Pupil Personnel Services

Pupil Personnel

The Pupil Personnel Services (PPS) Department provides support services to the students in Middle Country Central School District in the areas of special education, psychological services, social work services, related services and school counseling.

Guidance and School Counseling

Guidance and counseling services are provided to all middle and high school students. School counselors provide support services addressing the academic as well as the social and emotional needs of students who are faced with important personal and career choices. They guide students in making appropriate decisions, solving problems and accepting responsibility for educational pursuits. They serve as resources for parents and students with information about scholarships, financial aid, test scores, graduation requirements and career planning/exploration.

All Kindergarten through 5th grade students are provided guidance curriculum and support services. Elementary students are introduced to college and career readiness, and given social-emotional learning support in the classroom. Each student, grades 6 through 12, is assigned a school counselor. The rapport established between student and school counselor many times sets the stage for a student's successful transition to postsecondary education and employment.

Child Find

All children are entitled to a free and appropriate education, with special services for those with special needs. Any parent or person in parental relation who suspects that their child has a disability may refer the child for an evaluation by the District's Committee on Special Education (CSE) eligibility for special education services and programs. More detailed information on this process is available in *A Parent's Guide to Special Education*, which is published on the New York State Education Department's website in English and Spanish; [A Parent's Guide to Special Education](#). Parents/guardians should contact their child's school if they believe their child has special needs and/or contact Office of Pupil Personnel Services at 631-285-8850.

Special Education Programs for Students with Disabilities

A range of programs and services is available for students with disabilities as identified by the Committee on Special Education (CSE). The CSE makes its decisions based on the Regulations as defined by the State Commissioner on Education, Part 200. Consideration of academic, social, management and physical needs form the basis for the type and duration of services. Special education programs and services are designed to assure that children with disabilities receive free and appropriate public education. Questions and additional information may be obtained by contacting the Office of Pupil Personnel Services at 631-285-8850.

Students Attending Nonpublic Schools

Pursuant to Education Law section 3602-c, the District of location will arrange to provide certain special education and related services to students who are residents of this school district, and who attend nonpublic schools and qualify for special education services.

Psychological Services

The District's staff of psychologists are members of the Committee on Special Education (CSE). They assist the CSE in determining whether the student is a student with a disability by using a variety of assessment tools to gather relevant information about the student. The District's staff of psychologists test students to determine intellectual, emotional and mental status and provide counseling services. As members of the buildings' Student Support Teams (SST), psychologists work with other professionals to review student performance and make educational recommendations. They are also members of the District Crisis Intervention Team, working with social workers, staff, students and families to assist in resolving emergency issues affecting the child. In addition, they assist teachers with classroom management techniques and implementation of behavior plans as needed. Finally, they are part of the School District's Support Program, serving students at risk for school failure.

Social Work Services

School social workers are members of the Pupil Personnel Services Team. They provide intervention services in areas such as child abuse and maltreatment, educational neglect and truancy, in-school counseling and agency referrals. The District's team of social workers complies with regulations set forth by the New York State Council on Children and Families to protect children from abuse and neglect.

Health Services

Each school is staffed with a nurse, who provides a variety of health screening services and administers first aid. School nurses maintain health histories for all children. It is important that parents keep the health office informed of any changes in their child's health. Nurses also conduct vision, hearing and scoliosis screenings throughout the year and are on constant alert for signs of health problems that might inhibit learning.

Related Services

Students who require related services are provided the support through the Committee on Special Education (CSE) and/or a 504 Plan.

Proof of Immunizations

Immunization laws were established in New York State to protect children from dangerous communicable diseases. Parents are required to provide the school with written proof of a child's immunization against chicken pox, DTaP (diphtheria, tetanus, and pertussis), Tdap booster, Hepatitis B, measles, mumps, rubella, polio, Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib), Meningococcal disease (MenACWY) and Pneumococcal (PCV).

Medication

Parents must provide a doctor's note for the school nurse in order for a child to receive any type of medication during school hours. This medication must also be provided in an original container with the instructions affixed.

Physical Examinations

New York State law requires that all students who enroll in public school at any grade level, as well as those students entering pre-kindergarten or kindergarten, and first, third, fifth, seventh, ninth and eleventh grades must supply documented proof of a current physical and dental examination to the building nurse within 30 days of entering school. Students who do not provide documented proof will be scheduled for an examination by the District physician after October 1st. Students participating on an athletic team in grades 7-12 must receive a sport physical before they try out or practice with any team.

Homeless Students

The McKinney-Vento Act Homeless Assistant Act ensures educational rights and protections for children and youths who are homeless. It protects children and youths by assisting them in accessing educational services.

Home Schooled Students

In compliance with New York State Education Law, the Board of Education shall ensure that children instructed at home, provided that they are of compulsory school attendance age, receive full-time instruction and receive an education substantially equivalent to that provided by the School District.

Parents/Guardians who wish to educate their children at home must submit to the district an individual home instruction plan (IHIP), outlining the educational goals to be met and the course materials and syllabi to be used each year for the child's learning process. Parents/Guardians must submit quarterly reports, which will provide the district with the necessary information to make determinations of substantial equivalency and competency of instruction on an ongoing basis.

General Information

History of Our District

The Middle Country Central School District covers approximately 16 square miles in the Township of Brookhaven. It is composed of the villages and hamlets of Centereach, Selden, parts of Lake Grove, Coram, Lake Ronkonkoma, Port Jefferson Station and Farmingville.

- The District was formed in 1957 through the consolidation of the Selden and Centereach school districts. At the time, it consisted of five kindergarten rooms and 51 elementary classrooms.

After consolidation, the area moved into a period of unprecedented growth, resulting in Middle Country becoming one of the fastest-growing school districts in the state. Today, the District is one of the largest suburban districts in New York State, comprised of two pre-kindergarten/kindergarten centers, eight elementary schools, two middle schools, and two high schools. A District map is located on page 34.

The K-12 student enrollment projection for the 2025-2026 school year is approximately 9,400, plus over 500 pre-kindergarten students.

Admission and Registration

Children in Middle Country must be five years of age on or before December 1 in order to apply for admission to kindergarten. A child must be four years of age by December 1 in order to apply for admission to pre-kindergarten. When applying for school admission, parents must present the following:

- Pre-K/Kindergarten: Proof of District residency, original Birth or Baptismal Certificate, Immunization Record signed by a physician and Custody papers, if applicable.
- Grades 1-12: Proof of District residency, Transfer or Withdrawal Card from previous school district, original Birth or Baptismal Certificate, Immunization Record signed by a physician and Custody papers, if applicable.

New students may register Monday through Friday at Central Registration, located behind the Transportation Building across from Bicycle Path Pre-K/Kindergarten Center between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. For more information, call 285-8890.

Parents with children ages 0 - 4 years old. If you currently have no children attending a school in the Middle Country Central School District, please contact Central Registration at 285-8890 with your family's information regarding infants/toddlers for future mailings of pre-kindergarten and kindergarten registration information. Please be sure to inform Central Registration if your youngster is receiving services for a special need.

Attendance

Attending school regularly and on time is important to student progress. This also has an impact on District programs, since state financial aid is provided on the basis of student attendance.

If a child is absent or late to school, parents/guardians are required to provide a written excuse upon the child's return. Written excuses must state specific dates and the reason for an absence or tardiness, and include the signature of a parent/guardian. It is the parent's/guardian's responsibility to notify the school office within at least 24 hours of the absence, tardiness, early dismissal "ATED". In case of extended absences, parents/guardians are asked to make arrangements with a school counselor or teacher so their child may make up missed schoolwork.

A plain language summary of the attendance policy is provided to each parent/guardian. The complete policy is also available in the schools and on the District website.

Access to District Records

Records available for inspection in accordance with the law may be inspected after an Application for Public Access to Records form is completed and returned to the Public Information Access Officer. Copies of records may be obtained for 25 cents per page. For more information, call Stephanie Larkin, District Clerk @ 285-8011 or email slarkin@mccsd.net. Individual school records may be inspected by appointment in the presence of authorized school personnel during the regular working day.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records. They are:

(1) The right to inspect and review the student's education records within 45 days of the day the District receives a request for access.

Parents and eligible students should submit to the school principal (or appropriate school official) a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the record(s) may be inspected.

(2) The right to request the amendment of the student's education record(s) that the parent or eligible student believes inaccurate or misleading or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy under FERPA.

Parents or eligible students may ask the Middle Country Central School District to amend a record they believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inaccurate or misleading. If the District decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the District will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

(3) The right to provide written consent before the District discloses personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.

One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the District as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel), or a person serving on the School Board; a person or company with whom the District has contracted to perform a special task (such as an attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist), or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.

Another exception permits disclosure without consent to an authorized representative. An authorized representative is any individual or entity designated by a State or local educational authority or a Federal agency headed by the Secretary, the Comptroller General or the Attorney General to carry out audits, evaluations, or enforcement or compliance activities relating to educational programs.

The Board directs that "directory information" such as a student's name, address, telephone number, date and place of birth, major course of study, participation in school activities or sports, weight and height if a member of an athletic team, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and most recent school attended.

A directory of names, addresses and telephone numbers of 11th and 12th grade students will also be released to the Armed Services unless a written parental request is made preventing disclosure of this information.

Upon request, the District discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll.

Project SAVE/Safe School Zones

New York State has enacted Schools Against Violence in Education Act legislation. This legislation requires components such as, but not limited to, a comprehensive school safety plan, building safety plans, a code of conduct, violence prevention training and citizenship and character education. For more information, please contact the principal of your child's school. The Middle Country Central School District has entered into an agreement with the County of Suffolk in accordance with Local Law No. 7-1999, enacted by the Suffolk County Legislature, to establish "Safe School Zones." Any student or non-student found to be in possession of nuisance material, paraphernalia or contraband as defined by Local Law No. 7-1999, within 1,000 feet of school property, may be subject to an administrative hearing conducted by the Suffolk County Department of Probation. If it is determined that the individual committed an act prohibited by Local Law 7-1999, the individual and the parent or legal guardian of the individual may be liable for a fine up to \$500.00. The individual may also be required to perform up to 100 hours of community service. Additionally, civil penalties may be imposed of up to \$2,500.00.

Code of Conduct

The Middle Country Central School District has a long-standing set of expectations for conduct on school property and at school functions. These expectations are based on the principles of civility, mutual respect, personal responsibility, citizenship, character, tolerance, honesty, courtesy, integrity and observance of laws and rules. As such, and in light of Schools Against Violence in Education legislation, the Board of Education recognizes the need to define clearly these expectations for observance of laws, and acceptable conduct on school property, to identify the consequences of unacceptable conduct, and to ensure that discipline when necessary is administered promptly and fairly. To this end, and as required by the State Education Department, the Board has adopted a Districtwide Code of Conduct. Personal Electronic Devices

Per [NYS Education Law Section 2803](#), Board policy 5695 prohibits student use of personal electronic devices during the school day. Parents/Guardians who need to contact their child(ren) during the school day should contact the main office. The Internet and District Public Relations

The Middle Country Central School District makes the Internet available to our students. Students' pictures and schoolwork may be displayed on the District's website: www.mccsd.net.

Our District's Public Relations Department and your child's school may photograph/video students at school for use in various news media and/or school websites. Unless we receive written notification to the contrary from the students' parent/guardian, we will allow them to participate in these activities. If you have any questions or concerns, please contact your child's school.

Visitors

All visitors to our buildings must report to the welcome desk immediately to obtain information, to sign-in and obtain a visitor's badge before going anywhere in the building. We take our obligation to safeguard students and staff very seriously. Please be aware that, as required by New York State law, there are specific and appropriate guidelines for visitors to our schools.

Security

The District assigns security personnel to all school buildings. A number of patrol cars monitor school grounds and report regularly to a base station. These patrols work closely with the Suffolk County Police and the custodial staff at each of the schools. All our schools are equipped with door security systems, cameras and use hall monitors.

Sex Offender Notifications

The Middle Country Central School District uses an automated system for sex offender notifications. Postcards will not be mailed. For those in the Middle Country Central School District with a computer at home but no Internet or e-mail access, Parents for Megan's Law will provide material on how to get free Internet access via the Suffolk County Public Library system and a free Yahoo e-mail account. For those without a computer, Parents for Megan's Law will show residents how to set up the same accounts using a library computer if you call their hotline.

Transportation

Middle Country provides transportation for students well in excess of that required by New York State law. Bus information will be available on the Parent Portal in the summer. Please have students arrive at the bus stop 15 minutes prior to scheduled time. Please allow 15-minute of leeway after scheduled time especially during the month of September.

Regular drills are conducted to ensure children are aware of what to do in case of an emergency on the school bus. Parents are urged to discuss rules of the road with their children. Bus regulations and safety procedures will be strictly enforced.

School bus transportation is provided for students as follows:	
K-5	More than ½ mile from residence to school
6-12	More than 1 mile from residence to school
Non-Public Schools K-8	Less than 15 miles from residence to school
Non-Public Schools 9-12	Less than 25 miles from residence to school

Child Care Transportation applications must be filled out and handed in to the transportation department. Both the parent and child care provider signature sections are to be notarized or the application will be denied. Requests for Private and Parochial School Transportation 2026-2027

In accordance with the New York State Education Law, residents' requests for transportation to private and parochial schools must be submitted in writing by the parent or legal guardian to the Transportation Office no later than April 1, 2026. Requests submitted after the cut-off date may be approved providing no additional expenses are incurred by the District and providing there are available seats (based upon the April 1, 2026, cut-off date). The purpose of the cut-off date is to enable school districts to implement their contractual obligations and make the necessary arrangements to provide transportation in a reasonable and economical manner.

Student Wellness Policy

The Student Wellness Policy was adopted by the Board of Education to provide students with a school environment which promotes student wellness and educational success, through proper nutrition and adequate physical activity. The policy addresses several areas which include foods and beverages available in school, physical activity and nutrition education. The District will ensure that all schools meals meet or exceed the program requirements and nutrition standards found in federal regulations with increased offerings of whole grains, fresh fruits and vegetables, lean meats and healthy snacks. If you have a student with a food allergy that is eating from the cafeteria, please contact the nurse at your child's school. Communication is key and it's crucial that we work closely to meet the needs of our students with food allergies.

School Nutrition Services

The District participates in the National School Breakfast and Lunch Programs which makes it possible for all school children to receive nutritious meals. A hot breakfast is available at all sites. Research shows that when a child's nutritional needs are met, the child is more attentive in class and has better attendance and fewer disciplinary problems. This program offers parents an affordable, convenient way to provide nutritious meals for their children. Additionally, a la carte and second meals are available for purchase for an additional cost. Parents/Guardians can add money to their student's school lunch account online through, <https://www.myschoolbucks.com>.

MySchoolBucks (MSB) does charge a small service fee. Payment by cash or check is always accepted in the cafeteria. School menus including the nutritional and allergen information can be found on the District website, <https://www.mccsd.net>, under the Food Service Department page. Questions about the program should be directed to the School Lunch Coordinator at 631-285-8190.

Community Eligible Provision (CEP) Student Meals, School Year 2025-2026

All students are eligible to receive a free breakfast and lunch meal daily while school is in session. Parents/Guardians are encouraged to complete the household income form before the first day of school or as soon thereafter to apply for additional benefits and help schools maintain free meal eligibility in future years. Household Income Forms are available on the District's website, at the main office in all schools, and at the Food Service Office. For more information, please contact the Food Services Department at 631-285-8190.

The Healthy Meals for Healthy Americans Act of 1994, P.L. 103-448, has amended Section 9(b)(2)(c) of the National School Lunch Act (NSLA) to allow limited disclosure of information about student meal eligibility without parent/guardian consent. Participant's names, eligibility status, and other information provided on the application or obtained through direct certification or verification may be disclosed to certain other federal, state, or local agencies as authorized by the NSLA.

Safety

Crossing guards assigned by Suffolk County are on duty at school crossings in the mornings and at school closing times. Elementary teachers stress the importance of observing street crossing safety rules at guarded and unguarded crossing corners. Many schools host presentations on safety sponsored by representatives of local fire and police departments. Our school bus drivers present a bus safety program to students in grades K-5. Safety rules, emergency procedures and behavior are discussed. For more information, call Transportation at 631-285-8880.

Accident Insurance

Student accident insurance is in place for students injured during school-sponsored activities. Injuries occurring during a school-sponsored activity must be promptly reported to the activity supervisor and the school nurse. The insurance program assesses coverage after a claim with the individual's primary insurance carrier has been settled and coverage is based on regional, usual and customary medical rates. Claims not filed with the District within one year from the date of injury cannot be considered for payment.

AHERA Notification Compliance

The District is required annually to notify the public of AHERA inspection information as follows:

INFORMATION ABOUT ASBESTOS-CONTAINING BUILDING MATERIALS, PURSUANT TO AHERA, SECTION 40, CFR 763.84(c), 763.93(d) AND 763.93(g)(4), IS ON FILE IN THE DISTRICT MANAGEMENT PLAN AND IS AVAILABLE FOR REVIEW WITH THE COMPLIANCE OFFICER, IN THE BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS OFFICE.

The District undergoes a rigorous inspection process to ensure that all of our buildings provide a safe and healthy environment for our students and staff.

Pesticide Notification

The District utilizes an Integrated Pest Management Program that significantly reduces any use of pesticides. However, please be advised that as required by Section 409-h of the Education Law:

- Pesticide products may be used periodically throughout the school year.
- The District is required to maintain a list of parents, guardians and staff who wish to receive 48-hour written notice before a planned pesticide application.

School Facilities Use

School buildings and grounds may be used by local organizations for meetings and sports activities during times they are not in use by the schools. Organizations must have valid Certificates of Insurance and non-profit status on file with the Business Office. The online application process can be found at <https://login.schoolde.com/>. A fee is charged to cover the cost of custodial, security services, heating and air-conditioning when applicable. For more information about the use of school facilities and fields, contact the Business Office at 631-285-8020.

Taxes/Assessment/School Aid

Public schools in New York State receive funding from several sources. These revenues come from local, state and federal funds. Monies received from District residents are raised by taxes levied on property. School taxes are collected along with special district taxes (fire districts, lighting districts, etc.) by the Town Receiver of Taxes and transferred to the School District. Assessment and equalization rates, which are not in the District's control, are used to determine the total tax to be paid. The Town assesses any structure of a permanent nature. Questions regarding local taxes should be referred to the Town of Brookhaven Assessor's Office at Town Hall, 631-451-6300. Federal aid to the District is allocated for specific programs. State aid provides assistance to the District for a variety of programs.

Title IX/DASA

Title IX prohibits educational institutions that receive federal funding from discriminating on the basis of sex. The law addresses both discrimination and harassment, including peer-on peer harassment as well as instances where a teacher or other school employee harasses a student. It also guarantees equal athletic participation to students regardless of sex, and may be used to target harassment based on a student's failure to conform to gender stereotypes.

Middle Country adheres to Title IX regulations mandated by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare by not discriminating on the basis of sex in its education programs or employment practices. The School District's Title IX Compliance Officer is Jonathan Singer, Assistant Superintendent for Instruction.

Students in New York schools are also protected by federal, state, and local laws that also provide protection against bullying and require schools to take certain affirmative steps to guarantee equal education for students with disabilities.

The New York State Dignity for all Students Act was established to provide a school environment free of discrimination and harassment for all students. The Dignity Act states that no student shall be subjected to harassment by employees or other students, nor shall any student be subjected to discrimination based on actual or perceived race, color, weight, national origin, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity or sex. The New York State Dignity for all Students Act includes bullying and cyberbullying occurring either on or off school property where such acts would foreseeably create a risk or substantial disruption within the school. 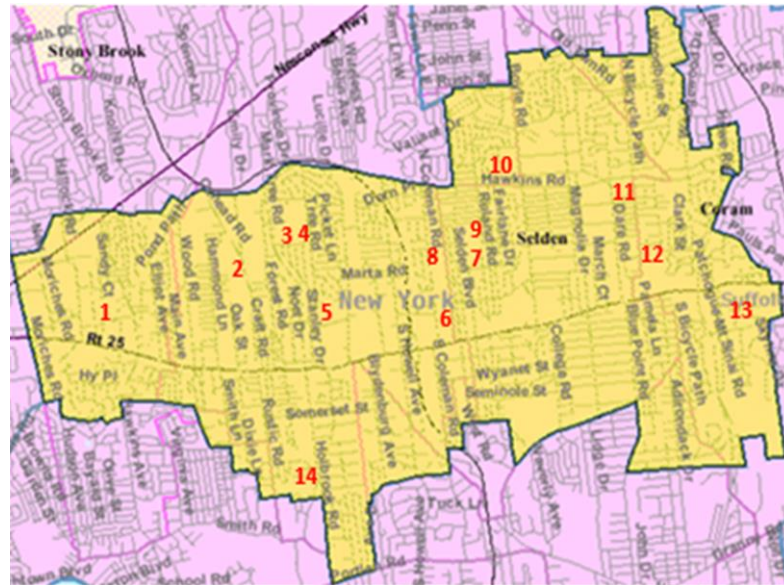

Board of Education

The Middle Country Central School District is governed by a nine-member Board of Education. Members serve without pay for staggered, three-year terms. Candidates for the Board of Education must be qualified voters of the school district. They are nominated by a petition, signed by at least two percent of the actual voters in the last annual budget vote and school board election.

The School Board sets local District policy and is responsible to the New York State Education Department. The School Board appoints the Superintendent of Schools, who is responsible for the day-to-day administration of the schools.

Middle Country School Board meetings are also posted in all District buildings, on the District's website and in the public library. All School Board meetings are open to the public, except for executive sessions, when confidential matters are discussed in accordance with the Open Meetings Law. Minutes of the meetings are available on the District's website, at [Board of Education](#), or you may contact the District Clerk for assistance.

Individuals seeking to address the Board of Education at a regular meeting must register with the District Clerk.

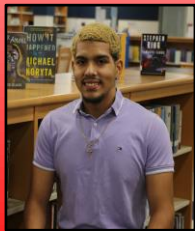

Code of Conduct Summary

The Code Includes:

- Provisions regarding conduct, dress and language deemed appropriate and acceptable on school property including school functions, and conduct, dress and language deemed *unacceptable and inappropriate* on school property, and the range of penalties associated with violating these provisions.
- Standards regarding acceptable, civil, and respectful treatment of teachers, school administrators, other school personnel, students, and visitors on school property, and includes the range of penalties associated with violating these provisions.
- Provisions defining the roles of teachers, administrators, other school personnel, board of education and parents.
- Standards and procedures to assure security and safety of students and school personnel.
- Provisions for removals from the classroom and from school property, including school functions, of students and other persons who violate provisions of the code.-
- Disciplinary measures to be taken in incidents involving the possession or use of illegal substances or weapons, physical force, vandalism, violation of the civil rights of others, and threats of violence.
- Provisions for detention, suspension, and removal of students, which are consistent with federal, state, and local laws, include provisions for school authorities to establish policies and procedures to ensure the maintenance of educational programming and activities for students removed from the classroom or suspended from school.
- Procedures by which violations are to be reported, determined, and by which discipline measures are imposed and carried out.
- Provisions ensuring that the codes and the enforcement thereof, are in compliance with state and federal laws relating to students with disabilities.
- Provisions setting forth the procedures by which local law enforcement agencies will be notified of code violations that constitute a crime.
- Provisions setting forth the circumstances and procedures by which, parents will be notified if their child violates the code.
- Provisions setting forth the circumstances and procedures by which criminal court complaints, juvenile delinquency petitions or persons in need of supervision petitions will be filed.
- Circumstances under and procedures by which referral to appropriate human service agencies shall be made.
- Procedures by which minimum suspension periods will be set for students who are substantially disruptive of the education process or substantially interfere with teacher's authority over the classroom, provided that the suspending authority may reduce such period on a case by case basis to be consistent with any other state or federal law or regulation.
- Provisions for minimum suspension periods for acts that would qualify the pupil to be defined as a violent pupil, provided that the suspending authority may reduce such period on a case-by-case basis to be consistent with any other state or federal law or regulations.
