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CATLIN GABEL SCHOOL

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Catlin Gabel is an independent, co-educational, non-sectarian day school serving students from preschool through grade 12. Founded in 1859, the school has a total of 789 students. 52% of the students who attend Catlin Gabel identify as people of color. This year, there are 323 Upper School students, grades 9-12.

MISSION

Catlin Gabel fosters compassionate and curious citizens of the world by inspiring in every student a love of learning and the courage to take responsible action.

ADMISSION

Admission is competitive, based on previous school record, recommendations, personal qualifications, and a day of observed activities and classroom participation. Each year, approximately 30% of ninth graders are new to Catlin Gabel. More than one-quarter of Upper School students receive financial aid.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

A diploma from Catlin Gabel indicates successful completion of four years of high school experience. For most students, this means completion of at least 18 academic courses, including the departmental requirements outlined in this document. Students are encouraged to take no more than six academic courses at one time. Additionally, students are expected to complete an experiential learning project in May and June of their senior year. Infrequent waivers to graduation requirements may be granted for health, exceptional proficiency, and neurodiversity reasons. Waivers are noted on page two of the student's transcript.

ACADEMIC PROGRAM

Catlin Gabel offers a rigorous college preparatory curriculum. In addition to graduation requirements, students may choose from a variety of electives in all departments. GRADING

Catlin Gabel's educational philosophy de-emphasizes letter grades, and student academic work is evaluated through formative assessments. Students receive formal feedback through frequent conferences with faculty and through narrative reports. Letter grades (A+ through F) are recorded once per year in yearlong courses; courses lasting for one semester are graded at semester's end. We do not rank our students, nor do we calculate and report a GPA on transcripts.

HONORS COURSES

Catlin Gabel Honors courses typically require students to have arrived at advanced mastery/proficiency of the preceding skills in the corresponding discipline. Typically, these courses meet or exceed the academic rigor or depth of Advanced Placement or college-level courses in the discipline. They assume students possess sophisticated skills in most or all of the following: analysis, communication, mathematics, abstract reasoning, and critical inquiry. Students in these classes are expected to work with greater independence and resilience, persevering through challenges and applying their learning to novel situations. In all cases, we strive to create a course catalog that offers equitable access to honors-level courses in a given discipline regardless of a student's individual circumstances or external resources.

PROGRESSIVE AND EXPERIENTIAL EDUCATION

Catlin Gabel is a leader in progressive education, and we continue to innovate and evolve. We prize understanding and action as educational goals, build a curriculum that integrates and encourages collaboration among different disciplines, and promote personalized learning. Our school values experiential education, the idea that people learn by doing, and our focus on experiential education includes community engagement. Our intention is that students learn through direct exposure to diverse projects, places, events and people. Our programs give students the real-world skills that they will need to work and create with others, and be part of a global society.

Consistent with our progressive mission, Catlin Gabel does not confer academic awards. A small number of community-based awards are given at the end of twelfth grade.

In addition to the experiential and progressive methods incorporated in our classrooms every day, the following programs are particular expressions of these values.

SENIOR PROJECTS

Senior projects are required for graduation and take place over four weeks in May and June, just prior to graduation. The projects are student-driven, connected to the community, and skills-focused, allowing students to apply their knowledge and skills to make an authentic impact with local businesses and organizations. Students are expected to work thirty hours per week with an on-site mentor at their chosen organization.

ENGINEERING PROGRAM

In the Catlin Gabel Engineering Program, students immerse themselves in real-world practice that draws from engineering as well as from computer science, electronics, mechanical design/fabrication, business development, public relations, community engagement, urban planning, and applied physics. Community Engineering students develop new products that make the world better; these products have won multiple international design competitions. The FIRST Robotics team regularly qualifies for the world championships and frequently wins the local Chairman's Award recognizing partnership and outreach.

PALMA SCHOLARS PROGRAM

The Palma Scholars Program serves as a locus of innovation at Catlin Gabel, through its distinct academic programming and student cohort. Between three and five incoming 9th graders are selected as Palma Scholars annually, based on their potential in four key areas: academics, athletics, leadership, and service. Programmatically, the centerpiece is the Palma Seminar, an interdisciplinary course open to all Upper School students that changes its subject matter annually, but consistently emphasizes experiential learning around contemporary social issues. In addition to the annual Palma seminar course, Palma scholars are required to complete a senior capstone project. Other than those courses, Palma scholars have no graduation requirements; they are empowered to shape their course load, in partnership with the program director, around their intellectual interests and goals.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION

The outdoor education program offers students avenues for social, physical, and emotional development on both short and extended expeditions. A number of trips are offered each year, and roughly 75% of students participate in at least one trip or class during their time at Catlin Gabel. Guided by four major pillars of Community, Reciprocity, Self Discovery, and Outdoor Craft, students learn technical travel skills, develop their environmental ethics, and live communally in small groups learning to balance their group's needs with their own. Financial aid is available to enable greater student participation.

IMMERSIVES

Immersive courses are two-week intensive experiences that allow students to engage in deep, rigorous, experiential, often interdisciplinary learning without the usual constraints of the school's routine schedule. They are required for all students in grades 9-11. Participation in an immersive will be noted with a Pass/Fail grade on student transcripts. Students may participate in a global education trip in lieu of immersives.

GLOBAL EDUCATION

The Global Education program offers 3 two-week trips each year. Destinations have included Turkey, Ecuador, India, Spain, Nepal, China, Ghana, Japan, Costa Rica, Guatemala, Morocco, Nicaragua, and Cambodia. Each year, approximately 15% of the student body participates in a global trip. Students learn inter-cultural communication, international community engagement, and group membership skills. Financial aid is provided for students in need.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Ninth graders start with on-campus service days, collaborating with their advisors and local organizations to lay a strong foundation for their involvement. As students advance, tenth and eleventh graders deepen their engagement through community-focused classroom activities and take on leadership roles in clubs and student councils. Twelfth graders culminate their journey by presenting their senior projects to the Upper School, showcasing their growth and commitment to making a positive difference.

ATHLETICS

The goal of the Catlin Gabel athletics program is to ensure every coach and player embraces and fulfills the school's values of integrity, inclusion, and kindness. Players should understand that their success is directly connected to their teammates; it is a shared success. Any student who tries out makes a team in one of our 13 programs at the JV2, JV, or Varsity level, resulting in high participation rates, with 77% of Upper School students participating in at least one sport, and 42% playing more than one sport. The Catlin Gabel Eagles have a rich tradition of success in athletics, including being a 21-time winner of the Oregon 3A All-Sports Award, and thirteen state championships over the past four years.

JUDICIAL COUNCIL & DISCIPLINARY REPORTING

Catlin Gabel places a great deal of responsibility on its students to act with kindness, integrity, and inclusion. In the Upper School, significant violations of the code of conduct or other school rules will result in the student appearing before the Judicial Council, a committee composed of students elected by their peers, and select faculty members who review serious violations of the community's standards of behavior. This committee carefully reviews the situation and conducts relevant interviews with the student(s) involved. The Council then makes recommendations for corrective actions to the Dean of Students who ultimately decides the appropriate consequences in consultation with the Upper School Head. It is Catlin Gabel's policy to be forthcoming when asked by a college about major disciplinary action. When requested, Catlin Gabel will report to colleges all major disciplinary incidents (those that result in suspension or expulsion) in grades 9-12.
