Columbia Public Schools is the fourth largest school district in Missouri. It includes 21 elementary, seven middle, and four high schools, plus the Columbia Area Career Center, an early childhood education program, and the Boone County Nature School. Total enrollment is 18,779 students.

The school district is accredited by the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, citing such educational advantages as:

- Comprehensive curriculum and services at all grade levels, preschool and adult
- Exceptional programs for at-risk students and students with special needs
- Extensive middle school and high school course offerings
- Award-winning career education programs designed for all students
- Successful community partnerships and volunteer programs
- Significant emphasis on staff development and school improvement efforts

Columbia's students excel in the classroom and in their post-secondary education careers. Approximately 85-90 percent of Columbia students extend their education beyond high school, with 70.9 percent attending a college, university or post-secondary program. Our career and technical education students have a 96.9 percent placement rate.

Student performance on the ACT and SAT exams exceed state and national averages. In 2024, 84 percent of graduates took the ACT. Additionally, of the 1,113 students taking advanced placement courses in 2024, more than 82 percent earned college credit.

Our district's teachers represent the primary reason Columbia's schools and students are so successful. While 68.1 percent of teachers hold a master's degree, 280 staff hold a professional certification, and educators average 13.2 years of professional experience.

The community understands the importance of maintaining a high-quality educational program. Most recently, bond issues were passed in 1994, 1996, 1998, 2000, 2002, 2004, 2007, 2010, 2012, 2014, 2016, 2018, 2020 and 2022. A tax levy increase received voter approval in 1999, 2003, 2012 and 2016.

Columbia Public Schools is also ranked as a top 10 district for exemplary and innovative use of technology by the National School Boards Association and continually receives national recognition for financial reporting excellence and transparency.




