
Funding for Public Education

- "Required Net School Spending (NSS)" How much must be spent by the district on education at a minimum?

Foundation Budget in Action


FOUNDATION BUDGET COSTS




Factors Influencing Budget FY 2026

- ESSER funds ended
- Student Opportunity Act dollars not a significant increase from FY 2025 - FY 2026
- Enrollment decreased by 60 students (~1M)
- Increasing salary costs (5+%)



Previous Investments: Rigorous Teaching and Learning



- Purchased and implemented high-quality instructional materials K-12 (1.7 million dollar investment)
- Professional development for instructional coaches
- Implemented professional development, focused on belonging and culturally responsive teaching via Blackprint and Adaptive X
- Developed acceleration academies for secondary schools
- 90+ new special education positions
 - Teachers, coaches, speech therapists, BCBAs, administrators, paraprofessionals, clerks
- Nearly 50 new ELL positions
 - Teachers, coaches, administrators, paraprofessionals
 - Expanded Caminos program more grades, more classrooms
- World Languages at middle schools, Portuguese at CHS

Previous Investments: Recruit, Support and Retain Diverse and High-Quality Teachers and Leaders



- Partnered with the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE) to implement a diversification program.
- Created and Implemented Pathways programs such as:
 High School to Paraprofessional, Parent to
 Paraprofessional, Paraprofessional to Teacher, and
 Teacher to Administrator
- Designed and implemented a mentoring program for leads in each school
- Launched affinity group for BIPOC educators
- Vouchers for testing
- Increase wages for educators

Previous Investments: Expand Access, Opportunity and Equity

- Creation of Assistant Multilingual Director and Coordinator position to focus dual language and meeting the needs of multilingual learners
- Implemented assessments to support multilingual learners in earning their Seal of Biliteracy upon graduation.
- Expanded early college options to include Ben Franklin Institute of Technology (BFIT)
- Created an after school coding course via Codelicious
- Implemented before and after school tutoring
- Introduced STEM extended learning opportunities including the Calculus Project and Museum of Science partnership
- Implemented fine arts after school programming partnership with the Boston Children's Chorus
- Developed experiential learning opportunities for Chelsea High School in Collaboration with the City of Chelsea.
- Strengthened and expanded our after school programming with For Kids Only



Previous Investments: Family and Community Engagement



- Addition of family liaisons to match student enrollment at each campus
- Created the Chelsea Children's Cabinet which led to new telehealth partnerships and City ARPA funding to support mental health services
- Established relationships with local media (Telemundo, Chelsea Record, and WBUR)
- Invested in ParentSquare to improve communication with families
- Increased presence on social media

Previous Investments: Operations to Support Teaching and Learning

- Implemented MUNIS software upgrade
- Automated business and human resources so there is less paperwork
- Refreshed the CHS Library and Cafeteria.
- Purchased a building for Chelsea
 Opportunity Academy, the
 Intergenerational Literacy Program and
 Chelsea Virtual Learning Academy
- Hired an architectural firm to design 26
 County Road building for COA, ILP and
 CVLA
