COURSE GOAL: First, to prepare students to become knowledgeable, thoughtful, and participatory citizens. Democracy depends on YOU! Second, to prepare students for the AP U.S. Government & Politics College Board Exam.

COURSE CONTENT: The AP U.S. Government & Politics course is divided into six key content areas:

- (1) Foundations of American Democracy
- (2) Interactions Among Branches of Government
- (3) Civil Liberties & Civil Rights
- (4) American Political Ideologies & Beliefs
- (5) Political Participation

The way you view the American political system depends on your view of life in general. Your desires lead you to expect certain results from the political system. If these results are not achieved, frustration ensues. But one must view our political system in a fashion that does not preclude frustration but rather renders it palatable, thus increasing one's frustration tolerance level. The maintenance of a Federal Republican form of government requires almost constant vigilance.
