Parking of Private Vehicles on School Property by High School Students Procedure

Parking on School property is a privilege and not a right, afforded to high school students. Permission for students to park private motor vehicles in school parking lots during the school day will be provided by the school principal. Students who wish to drive and park at their school shall comply with the rules and regulations established by this procedure and school rules established by the principal of the school. A failure to comply with these district regulations or school rules and regulations will be reason for revocation of school driving and parking privileges. Additional violations will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action according to the student code of conduct.

Students are authorized to drive and park on school grounds based on the following procedures and regulations:

1. Students who drive to school and park in a school parking lot during school hours must obtain a parking permit from school administrators.
2. A requirement for students to have a valid operator's/driver's license, vehicle registration, and show evidence of maintaining state requirements of financial responsibility and/or insurance, will be considered before issuing a parking permit.
3. The sale or transfer of parking permits between students or to any other car is prohibited without special permission from school administrators.
4. Students are not allowed to go to vehicles during school hours without permission from school administrators or designee.
5. The owner/operator of any vehicle parked on school parking lots will accept all responsibility for the loss of personal property inside the vehicle and agree to park at their own risk.
6. Students who are operating any vehicle on school campus in any manner deemed to be detrimental to the health, safety and welfare of other students or staff will result in the revoking of all parking privileges.
7. Consequences for driving and parking on school campus without a parking permit will be subject to appropriate disciplinary measures according to the student code of conduct. Towing at the expense of student/owner expense may also be considered.
8. Vehicles parked on school property may be searched by the principal/designee upon reasonable suspicion to believe the vehicle contains controlled substances, alcoholic beverages, weapons or other contraband in violation of school rules.
9. Individual school expectations and regulations may also include the loss of privilege to drive and park at school during school hours. Examples include attendance incentives, behavior expectations and good standing toward meeting graduation requirements.
