A BEAUTIFUL POND RESTORED FOR BIOLOGY CLASSES AT MIDDLE SCHOOL

East Islip Middle School's pond has been beautifully restored into a serene home for wildlife, student art and hands-on science learning, thanks to the dedicated efforts of longtime EIMS science teacher Ray Lang, the generosity of alumni-owned partner Ron Gibbons Pools and the continued support of the district's For the Kids Foundation.

Lang began his East Islip teaching career in 1996, and currently teaches seventh and eighth grade science, including Regents Living Environment and life science classes. The history of the pond dates back over two decades ago, to the days when the school was still known as Islip Terrace Junior High School. Lang and then-Principal Bruce Castka developed the idea to enhance the school's new science rooms with a useful outdoor space.

"We wanted to create an ecosystem where kids could walk outside the classroom and learn so many different concepts through biology," Lang said.

With the support of then-Superintendent Dennis Maloney, a grant was obtained and the original pond was completed in 2005 by Ron Gibbons Pools along with other donors. In subsequent years, however, the pond sadly fell into disrepair. Lang, who is retiring soon, decided to make it his goal before he leaves to see that the pond was rebuilt for the generations of students to come.

The restoration project took root when Lang and Gibbons reached out to each other a couple of years ago with similar thoughts on the pond's future. Logistics were planned, and the pool company donated their labor and the materials

over the summer, completing work at the end of August on a magnificent installation with far superior technology to the original. As in the past, the pond offers numerous applications for student science learning.

"Having a pond, it's almost endless what you can do with the biology curriculum, from balancing an ecosystem to learning about photosynthesis, respiration and how animals interact with the environment," Lang said. "My students learn how it's a very balanced and delicate system, and if you add pollution and other negative things to it, it could collapse fast. It's an artificial ecosystem, but we want it to balance naturally. It was my vision 20 years ago to have this pond, and now to see it come back again is very rewarding. It's something we can leave East Islip's students 20 years into the future."

CURRICULUM UPDATE





East Islip Science Teachers Lead the Way

East Islip's K-12 science department has been hard at work collaborating, refining and charting a bold new course for student learning as New York State unveils updated science standards. Guided by the theme "Better Together," teachers across all grade levels have come together to ensure students experience science in engaging, hands-on and meaningful ways.

At the elementary level, a multiyear review process concluded this summer with the adoption of Mystery Science as the district's primary curriculum resource. Teachers praised the program's kid-friendly, interactive lessons; easy-to-use kits; and flexible print-digital hybrid format.

At the secondary level, teachers are equally energized. Grade 7 teachers spent the summer updating lessons and assessments to prepare students for greater rigor and deeper reading

expectations. Biology, earth science and space science teachers are rolling out exciting new curriculum standards this year, after years of reviewing shifts, piloting sample materials and crafting East Islip-tailored lessons. Students will dive into fresh opportunities to think and act like scientists through hands-on investigations and discovery-based learning. Looking ahead, chemistry and physics teachers are just one year away from implementing new standards, with even more innovative, labrich experiences on the horizon.

"This multiyear collaborative effort reflects the commitment of East Islip's teachers to ensure students are fully prepared for the future of science learning," Math and Science Director John Genova said. "The energy in classrooms this fall is unmistakable – teachers collaborating, students engaging and science learning taking flight!"

Bringing the Science of Reading to Life With Magnetic Reading

This summer, the district embarked on a coordinated professional learning journey to launch i-Ready Magnetic Reading across all K-5 classrooms. The rollout began in June with districtwide trainings, continued through July with grade-level Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) and culminated in a two-day Superintendent Conference Day experience that kickstarted the school year. Together, these sessions ensured that every teacher entered September with a clear vision for high-quality, grade-level literacy instruction and the support needed to meet diverse student needs.

Magnetic Reading is aligned with the Science of Reading, a



body of research that explains how children learn to read and what instructional practices are most effective. The program balances explicit, systematic instruction in foundational skills – such as phonemic awareness, phonics and fluency – with opportunities to build vocabulary, background knowledge and comprehension. This approach reflects East Islip's commitment to using evidence-based practices that give every

child the tools to become a confident, lifelong reader.

In June, teachers gathered for hands-on sessions introducing Magnetic Reading Foundations (K-2) and Magnetic Reading Comprehension (3-5). These trainings provided a common foundation in instructional design, lesson planning and assessment practices. Teachers explored how Magnetic Reading is structured to keep all students on grade level while also addressing individual needs. Educators left the sessions with weekly planning tools, lesson "look-fors" and strategies for scaffolding that maintain rigor while supporting growth.

The summer learning continued in July, when grade-level teams collaborated in PLCs to explore, expand and connect interdisciplinary opportunities within Magnetic Reading. These collaborative sessions focused on turning June's training into actionable classroom plans. This 12-hour professional learning series brought together teacher representatives from each grade level to align program texts with New York State social studies practices and science standards. These plans



include differentiation strategies and support for English Language Learners, ensuring all students benefit from cross-curricular connections. The process demonstrated how East Islip educators are truly better together when planning for student success.

"For East Islip students, this rollout means consistent access to high-quality, evidence-based literacy instruction," Humanities Director Korin Scarles said. "Every K-5 child will engage with rich grade-level texts and tasks, supported by scaffolds that promote – not replace – rigorous learning."





ANDREW MAROTTA PRESENTATIONS HELP Secondary Students Navigate Cellphone Policy

East Islip recently brought in Port Jervis educator Andrew Marotta as part of the district's commitment to distraction-free learning, offering his "Being a Winner, With and Without Your Cellphones" concept in a September series of seven energetic, interactive presentations at the middle and high schools. Like all New York State school districts, East Islip implemented cellphone restrictions this year. Marotta's presentation seeks to turn this new policy into a positive,

providing inspirational ideas on how students can create great, uplifting content, as well as urging them to follow their dreams.

"My presentation is really about the positive things in your life," he said. "When you have your phone, what are the good things that you could do? And when you don't have your phone, how can you engage with others? How can you be present?"
