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## **CURRICULUM**

Archbishop Riordan High School is committed to 21st-century learning that includes leading curricular innovation and exploring alternative instruction and assessment. Our dedicated, knowledgeable, and compassionate faculty is trained to help all types of learners reach their academic and personal potential.

## **STANDARDS-BASED GRADING SYSTEM**

Riordan utilizes a Standards-Based Grading System to help our students master the skills needed to succeed after graduation. The school no longer uses "F". An "I" grade reflects "Insufficient Evidence" and registers as 0.00 for GPA purposes. Riordan does not rank its students.

## **4X4 BLOCK SCHEDULE**

In the 4x4 block schedule, students can take up to eight classes a year with longer periods that meet every day. A one-semester, 10-unit class is equal to a full year in a traditional schedule. While many students request eight courses, accommodating these requests is not always possible.

## **LEARNING SUPPORT**

The Resource Specialist Program (RSP) offers a three-tiered program for students to receive the individualized attention appropriate to their needs. Students receive services including in-class accommodations, smaller English classes, a study skills class, personalized tutoring, and testing assistance. With the support of the RSP, students with learning differences can and do succeed in a mainstream college preparatory curriculum. Students must have documentation of a diagnosed learning difference to be a part of the program.

## **SERVIAM: COMMUNITY SERVICE REQUIREMENT**

To cultivate a culture of service, the community service program aims to form students to be servant-leaders through various experiential learning opportunities on and off campus.

## **SPECIAL ACADEMIC PROGRAMS**

The four-year Engineering Program trains future engineers and programmers, while the Biomedical Sciences Program bridges coursework in science, ethics, and human systems. Starting with the Class of 2029, Riordan launched our Business Program, which helps students gain practical knowledge in areas such as entrepreneurship, marketing, finance, and leadership. Each program creates opportunities that address the challenges of tomorrow, while being supported by Project Lead the Way, a national leader in curriculum development.

## **ST. FRANCIS SCHOLARS**

St. Francis Scholars are selected based on their exceptional academic achievement, performance on the High School Placement Test (HSPT), and demonstration of good character and citizenship. In addition to other extracurricular opportunities, students are required to take three philosophy courses called the Lyceum. These courses cultivate an entry into deep thinking, a sense of wonder, and a pursuit of truth, beauty, and goodness in the context of the Catholic intellectual tradition.

## **VISUAL AND PERFORMING ARTS**

The Visual and Performing Arts Department engages students in productive and analytical arts experiences. Courses are offered in Drama, Dance, Music and the Visual Arts. The Marching Band, as ambassadors of San Francisco, performs at local and international events. The Drama Department produces an annual fall play and spring musical, and visual art students explore traditional mediums of drawing, painting, ceramics, and sculpture.

## **COMMUNITY LIFE & HOUSE SYSTEM**

Riordan's House System supports all aspects of student life in the Marianist tradition and enhances an inclusive and collaborative community. More than 30 extracurricular clubs, activities, and Campus Ministry programs support the personal growth of students. Riordan fields over 40 teams in the following sports: baseball, basketball, cross country, flag football, football, golf, lacrosse, sailing, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, volleyball, and wrestling.

## **BOARDING PROGRAM**

Riordan operates one of the few boarding programs in a major city. The program accommodates 88 students from 22 countries: Brazil, Cambodia, Cameroon, China, Croatia, Germany, Hungary, Italy, Japan, Kazakhstan, Latvia, Lithuania, Mexico, Russia, Serbia, South Korea, Spain, Thailand, Turkey, United Kingdom, United States, and Vietnam.
