Hispanic Heritage Month Celebrated with District-Wide Activities



SPF was proud to celebrate Hispanic Heritage Month, which ran from Sept. 15 – Oct. 15. Aligning with the national theme, "Collective Heritage: Honoring the Past, Inspiring the Future," the district engaged students at all grade levels.

This observance was particularly meaningful for the district, where over 15% of students identify as Hispanic. It also directly reflected the district's commitment to creating equitable and inclusive classrooms.

"We are working to provide 'ample mirrors and windows' for all students," said Dr. Robert McGarry, Assistant Superintendent for Curriculum and Instruction. "Hispanic Heritage Month offers us an opportunity to create mirrors for our Hispanic and Latine/x students by affirming their identities and incorporating their experiences into our curriculum, while also creating windows for all students to learn about and appreciate the diverse cultures and experiences of these communities."

Activities included:


- Elementary schools: Teachers used a comprehensive set of slides developed by district staff. These resources introduced students to Hispanic Heritage Month through videos, geography lessons, and facts about the 21 Spanish-speaking nations. Daily activities included "Words of the Day" to learn Spanish greetings, colors, and feelings, a "Book Room" with read-alouds of books by and about people of Hispanic/Latin heritage, and an "Art Corner" featuring directed drawings of sugar skulls and projects inspired by abstract artist Ines Alvidres. Students also enjoyed music through a "Kidz Bop Hispanic Heritage Mix".
- Terrill Middle School: 7th and 8th-grade students celebrated by reading articles, conducting research, watching music videos, and participating in geography activities related to Hispanic heritage.
- Nettingham Middle School: Students created large wing-themed bulletin boards inspired by a Frida Kahlo quote, which will serve as photo opportunities for the school community. The morning announcements featured famous Hispanic and Latino individuals throughout the month, culminating in a school-wide Hispanic Heritage Month Spirit Week in early October.
- High School: The Spanish department is hosting a vibrant Hispanic Heritage celebration on Oct. 30 from 5-7 p.m. in the school cafeteria. The event will feature dance lessons from the local Alma Montuno dance studio, allowing students to enjoy music and food from the Spanish-speaking world.

Seven Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School Students Recognized in National Merit Scholarship Program

They are among the 34,000 Commended Students throughout the nation recognized for their exceptional academic promise.

Students entered the National Merit Scholarship Program, a nationwide competition for recognition and awards conducted by National Merit Scholarship Program, by taking the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) last year. In April, NMSC identified the 50,000 highest scorers and notified their high schools.

Although these seven students will not continue in the 2026 competition for National Merit Scholarship awards, they are recognized for placing among the nation's top scorers. Congratulations to our SPFHS students and all the Commended Students nationwide!



Facilities and Infrastructure Updates Happen Across the District

The district has undertaken a variety of facility and infrastructure updates that will benefit students and staff. Updates included:

Infrastructure

- New Nettingham Life Skills Room
- Nettingham flood remediation and rebuild
- Nettingham Generator
- High School Main Office moved to the front of the school; relocation of Child Study Team

- High School CST Space
- Flag poles replacements at Nettingham and Brunner and repairs across the district
- HVAC Replacements

Maintenance

- Various room touch ups
- Concrete/pavement/pothole repairs throughout the district
- Playground Repairs

Other

- Stage curtain replacements, repairs, treatments
- Bobcat purchase to increase efficiency of operations

The district also worked closely with its architects to plan for the La Grande Elementary School renovations and the referendum projects. The district has begun the bid process and completed the first sale of bonds for the projects approved by voters in January 2025. With construction beginning this fall, the district is on track to open La Grande Elementary School to prekindergarten students for the 2026-2027 school year and to complete district-wide upgrades to fire alarms, electrical, and HVAC by fall 2026 and fall 2027.
