

## Annetta Elementary PFE Policy 2025-2026

<b>Parent &amp; Family Engagement (PFE) Program</b>	
<b>Purpose</b>	Annetta Elementary is committed to ensuring high levels of learning for all students while fostering strong partnerships with families and the community. Our goal is to plan and implement effective family and parent involvement activities to improve student academic achievement and school performance. One way we support this effort is by participating in the Title I, Part A State Program, which provides funding to campuses with higher percentages of economically disadvantaged students. We recognize that some students may need the extra assistance available through the Title I program, as well as other programs, to reach their grade-level goals, and we are committed to providing an exceptional educational experience for all students.
<b>Funding</b>	The Title I federal funds will be divided among the Title I campuses on an annual basis at the federal programs planning meeting based upon federal and state requirements. All funds will be spent in accordance with Title I, Part A program rules, which may include services related to parental involvement, and will supplement state required activities.
<b>Review</b>	Upon request, the Texas Education Agency may review all use of funding and activities to ensure they support the goals and needs of the PFE Program.
<b>Family Meetings</b>	<p>Parent meetings allow schools and families to share important information, address student needs, and work together to support academic and personal growth. They are key to student success, highlighting the vital role of parent involvement in education.</p> <p>Parent meetings are scheduled at various times to accommodate different family schedules. This committee will meet throughout the year to plan, develop, evaluate, and revise the Campus Improvement Plan and Parent and Family Engagement Plan based on the comprehensive needs assessment and ongoing student data and stakeholder feedback. If parents do not agree with the submitted plan, their comments will be included with the Campus Improvement Plan when it is sent to the district.</p> <p>The campus PFE Policy and School-Parent Compact will be distributed and reviewed at both Title I meetings and will be shared in the campus newsletter, along with information about providing feedback, to ensure all parents are given the opportunity to participate in the development and revision of the campus PFE Policy and School-Parent Compact. In addition, the campus improvement plan and PFE Policy will be available to the community on the campus website.</p>
<p><b>How to Be Involved</b></p>	<p>Annetta Elementary values the partnership of the parents in their child’s education. <p><b>Family Trainings/Activities</b></p>	<p>Each school year, parents and families are invited to a Curriculum Night where parents receive training on the District Instructional Focus, the Professional Learning Community process that ensures all students achieve proficiency on grade-level standards, and discover ways to stay actively involved in their child's academic progress. Parents are also guided on how to monitor their child's progress through technology resources and the importance of partnering with teachers and schools throughout the year. Throughout the year, parents receive progress reports and local and state assessment data for their child, including guidance on how to interpret these reports. Ongoing opportunities are provided for parent/teacher collaboration throughout the year.</p> <p>Annetta Elementary partners with the district to ensure families are encouraged to participate in activities that provide parents with training and materials such as Aledo Reads, which offers parents a list of books to read with their child over the summer, the Aledo ISD Technology Hub that provides access to virtual training on tools such as Remind, Launchpad, and the district's learning systems and ESL parent engagement events, where families receive hands-on materials to support English language development at home. In addition, Annetta Elementary staff collaborate closely with district departments to coordinate parent and family engagement events in partnership with the Early Childhood Academy, Special Programs, Gifted and Talented, and ESL. <b>Curriculum</b>	<p>The state standards serve as the foundation for the district's curriculum, supported by grade-level scope and sequence and high-quality instructional materials. Campus goals align with the district and campus mission of "Ensuring High Levels of Learning for All Students."</p>
<b>Forms of Academic Assessments</b>	<p>Collaborative teacher teams develop common formative assessments to ensure that all students, regardless of assigned class, are held to high academic expectations. District common assessments are administered across all grade-level classrooms to ensure alignment between campuses. These assessments are designed to monitor student proficiency of grade-level standards throughout the year. In addition, district screeners (mCLASS, IXL, MAP) are administered three times a year to track student progress beyond grade-level standards. The results help teachers identify which students are meeting, exceeding, or falling below expectations and guide their next steps. Aledo ISD ensures compliance with all state-mandated standardized testing requirements.</p>

<p><b>Expected Achievement Levels on Academic Assessments</b></p>	<p>The Professional Learning Community process ensures that teacher teams evaluate student performance on an individual basis and monitor student growth throughout the year. Collaborative teams set grade level goals and work individually with students to set student achievement goals.</p> <p>Collaborative teacher teams meet weekly to review student achievement data, including formative and summative classroom assessments and district screeners and benchmarks to determine intervention and extension needs for individual students. Collaborative teams answer four questions when reviewing student data: What do we expect students to learn? How will we know if they have learned it? What will we do if they don't learn it? What will we do if they already know it? In response to the third question, teachers and interventionists work with students to ensure growth and achievement on essential grade level standards. It is our expectation that all students show growth throughout the year and are, at a minimum, proficient on essential grade level standards.</p> <p>Parents receive progress and assessment reports throughout the year, along with guidance on how to understand the data and regular opportunities to collaborate with teachers.</p> <p>The State's Performance Standards can be found on this website:  <a href="https://tea.texas.gov/student-assessment/testing/taar/taar-Performance-standards">https://tea.texas.gov/student-assessment/testing/taar/taar-Performance-standards</a></p>
<p><b>Ways to Request Regular Meetings</b></p>	<p>Parents/Guardians may reach out to campus administration or their child's teacher at any time throughout the year to request a meeting by emailing the appropriate staff member or by calling the front office at 817-207-3405 to request a return call. If you don't know the staff member's email, reach out to the front office.</p>
<p><b>Communication</b></p>	<p>Annetta Elementary will provide staff members with training on the importance of two-way communication with parents during staff meetings throughout the year. (Minimum required contacts include one phone call, one email and one in person meeting in 1st semester) Teachers new to the district participate in the New Teacher Academy, where they receive training on effective parent communication and are provided with sample materials to support meaningful and productive interactions with families.</p> <p>Annetta Elementary will communicate with parents on a regular basis. Important information will be provided in the student handbook, parent notices, the Parent and Family Engagement Policy, district and campus websites, campus newsletter and via electronic communications. Frequent notices about student performance will be sent home with students via e-mail and/or discussed in conferences. Parents are encouraged to regularly review their student's grades through the online parent portal. As often as possible, all communication will be provided in a</p>

	language and format the parents can understand. Parents are encouraged to contact their student’s teacher initially followed by the campus principal if questions or problems arise.
