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
IMPORTANT DATES

- November 12, 2024: Bill filing began
- January 14, 2025: 89th Legislature convened
- March 14, 2025: 60-day deadline for bill filing
- June 2, 2025: Sine Die

BILLS TO WATCH

- SB2 (Creighton):
 - Creates an education savings account program to pay up to:
 - \$10,000/year for students to attend accredited private school
 - \$11,500 for students with a disability
 - \$2,000 for homeschool students
 - \$2,500 for homeschool students with a disability
- SB568 (Bettencourt):
 - Significant changes to the special education program and the allotment
- SB 260 (Huffman):
 - Doubles school safety allotment
 - \$10 to \$20/student; \$15k to \$30k/campus
- SB 558 (Schofield), HB 1153 (Hull), HB 152 (Raymond):
 - Amends the property value study to recognize 100% of CFISD's Local Optional Homestead Exemption (LOHE)

CFISD LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

- Fully fund school districts that offer a Local Optional Homestead Exemption (LOHE).
- Increase the School Safety Allotment.
- Increase the Special Education Allotment.
- Increase the Transportation Allotment.


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COMMUNICATION TIPS

Log on to Texas Legislature Online capitol.texas.gov



- Create an account by locating the Login tab on the home page. Track specific bills and receive alerts when action is taken.
- Find out who represents you by submitting your address.



- Select your representative and locate email button to send message.
- Be sure to include in the message whether or not you support the specific bill you are addressing.
