


BILLS BY THE NUMBERS

SENATE

BILLS TO WATCH

- SB 26 (Creighton): Teacher pay increase (passed out of Senate; moves to House)
 - Teachers with 3 or 4 years of experience
 - \$5,000 for teachers in districts with < 5,000 students</p>
 - \$2,500 for teachers in districts with > 5,000 students
 - Teachers with 5 years or more of experience
 - \$10,000 for teachers in districts with < 5,000 students
 - \$5,500 for teachers in districts with > 5,000 students
 - Increases participation in Teacher Incentive Allotment (TIA) from 33% to 50%.
 - Increases the number of designations and amount of allotments
 - Classroom teachers eligible for tuition-free pre-K
- SB 19 (Middleton): Taxpayer-Funded Lobbying (left pending in State Affairs Committee)
 - Prohibits school districts from spending public funds to hire lobbyists to speak on their behalf before members of the Texas Legislature or paying nonprofit state associations or other organizations that engage in lobbying activities in Texas.
- SB 12 (Creighton): Parental Rights and Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (left pending in Senate K-16 Committee)
 - Prohibits "infringement" of parental rights
 - Prohibits diversity, equity, and inclusion in public schools
 - Allows students to transfer to any public school district in the state based on available capacity
 - Increases Parental transparency and accountability
 - Establishes an appeals process for parent grievances
 - Prohibits instruction on sexual orientation and gender identity
- SB 686 (Paxton): Student Transfers between School Districts (left pending in Senate K-16 Committee)
 - Allows students to transfer to any public school district in the state based on available capacity
 Requires school districts to implement a lottery system if more transfer
 - applications received than available capacityEstablishes approval and revocation criteria
 - Establishes campus capacity guidelines
 - Includes reporting requirements for campus capacity, number of transfer applications received and denied

This past Tuesday, members of our Board of Trustees and District Leadership Team traveled to Austin to meet with our legislative delegation. It was a great opportunity to share CFISD's legislative priorities. Please see more photos from the day at the Capitol on the next page.




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COMMUNICATION TIPS

89th Legislative Session

Stay connected and let your voice be heard on issues affecting public education.

Log on to Texas Legislature Online capitol.texas.gov




- Create an account by locating the Login tab on the home page. Track specific bills and receive alerts when action is taken.
- Find out who represents you by submitting your address.



- Select your representative and locate email button to send message.
- Be sure to include in the message whether or not you support the specific bill you are addressing.

2 Access the TLO mobile site



- Enter www.txlegis.com into your mobile device browser for a mobile-friendly version of the website
- 3 Share info with your contact groups statewide via email and social media.

When sharing info, remember to:

- Encourage others to contact legislators.
- Follow up and stay in touch.
- · Be brief and be informed.
- Provide talking points.
- · Stay focused and give examples.

KEEP IN MIND

Legislators review ALL communication submitted to them by their constituents and look for the "Yays" and "Nays" of each bill.
