When I first heard about a field trip opportunity in my journalism class, I was excited.


Mrs. Harshman, my

On October 1, 2025, the culinary world of PR changed forever. Now that it's comparable to Subway, I refuse to shut up about our cafeteria's new made-to-order Deli option. As a major foodie myself, the ability to customize wraps and sandwiches delighted me, but my excitement didn't end there. K-12 Cafeteria Food Director, Ashley Lindhurst of Chartwells, PR's new food company, eagerly informed me of her dreams for our cafeteria, emphasizing that with a lunchroom of our size, "the sky is the limit."

Because of passing conversations with our school's cafeteria workers, I'd known new menu options were on their way, but I had no idea how extensive and exhilarating the full scope of fresh meal possibilities were going to be.

"In the future, I want to see more action stations linked to live cooking in front of students. We could add an hibachi-like asian bar with a skillet for making meals-to-order. Pasta and flatbread pizza could be to-order as well. These are all things we've done in the past [at different schools]. All it takes is training people, and with the size and space of our cafeteria, we can pull the lever immediately in making stations more customizable," Lindhurst said.

More meticulous improvements are afoot as well. Students ordering from the deli may have noticed the preference towards wraps as opposed to buns. Lindhurst agrees with my thought that this skew may result from the dryness of the bread, and therefore she is currently seeking an alternative bread company.

Beloved, discontinued menu items from the past will also make comebacks, with buffalo chicken dip currently potentially peaking over the horizon. Students will have the ability to provide feedback about which meals they want to return when Lindhurst constructs a student advisory committee for food feedback and suggestions.

"Chartwells's goal in being here is to really make the dining experience special for students. Students don't understand what student dining can really be. We're going to develop the program into everything students want. Feedback is key," Lindhurst said.



PSAT's: My Experience

Was it all I expected? Do they still mean anything?

Today most colleges are "test optional;" before 2020 it was essentially a "must" if you wanted to go to college. But now most colleges don't require students to take the SAT or submit it if they don't score well. Therefore, SATs are becoming less and less of a major factor when it comes to going to college.

However, PR encourages all juniors and some sophomores the option to take the PSAT, which is a practice SAT. It prepares students to take the SAT and if students earn a high score, they have a chance at a national merit scholarship. This also is used as a guide to the students on what score they could expect on the SAT or what they need to improve upon when they take the real SAT.

My Experience: We walked into a classroom full of both juniors and sophomores. We were told that all of our devices had to be put away besides a calculator. We were given three hours to take the whole test. But instead of all the questions in the same segment, they were split into four parts. This was great because we got to take breaks and relax for a minute between segments. The challenging part was timing because each section had its own timer. If you didn't finish the section in the given time, it moved on regardless.

The SAT and PSAT involves two subjects: Math and Science. Both subjects have relatively the same amount of questions and follow the same pattern. Part one of math was basic algebra while part two was a two equation set with four different variables and was much more complicated.



FBLA Speaker Trish Parkhill on Personal Branding

FBLA kicked off its first meeting with a special guest speaker, Trish Parkhill, a Penn State graduate with a degree in advertising who has worked in NYC and is now at Marketspace, a creative agency that helps clients stand out in a crowded marketplace.

Parkhill focused her talk on two main ideas: personal brand and identity capital.

A **personal brand** is the reputation you create through your personality, values, and beliefs. "You already have a personal brand, and you're constantly building it," she told students.

Consistency is key, just like a corporate brand.

She encouraged students to decide what they want to be known for and put it into simple adjectives. For Parkhill, that means always being positive. Living those values in conversations, interviews, and online interactions helps your personal brand truly reflect who you are.

Parkhill also spoke about **identity capital**, a metaphorical currency made up of experiences that increase your value.

Some of it is tangible, some intangible, but every new skill, experience, or achievement adds up.

She describes it as "a stack of undeniable proof that you are who you say you are."

Her main message? When life changes, two things are always under control: your identity capital and your personal brand.

"Always make sure to love what you do," she said — a powerful takeaway for FBLA members as they plan their future careers.

Having Parkhill as our first speaker was inspiring, especially as a first-year FBLA member interested in marketing. I look forward to the rest of the guest speakers the club will host in the future

In South India, Deepavali celebrates Lord Krishna's victory over the demon Narakasura, symbolizing the triumph of good over evil. The day begins before sunrise, when families take part in rituals (oil bathing and praying) that purify the body and mind, welcoming light into their lives.

No celebration is complete without food. South Indian homes are filled with the aroma of flavorful snacks like muruku (similar to chips), adhirasam, (like a thick flat pancake), mysore pak (made with sugar and flour) payasam, (a sweet soup), and the traditional biriyani (rice with chicken and spices) At night, families light sparklers, elders share sweets while sharing stories, and the whole community glows.

For me, Deepavali always carries a bittersweet feeling. My grandparents live in Kumbakonam, Tamil Nadu, where the festival fills every corner. Here I celebrate it quietly but happily, often connecting with them through phone calls and video chats, listening to the sounds of their TV in the background or a small group of guests talking outside on their porch. It's not quite the same as being there, but those calls remind me that love and warmth travel far beyond our distance.

For future sophomores or current sophomores, my advice to you this: attempt to involve yourself with clubs and surround yourself with a healthy community.


Monitor how you are handling the workload and even join a study group between friends. Give yourself time to relax without thinking of anything and maybe involve yourself with the 10-minute method.
