## The Math and Science Departments Certainly Are Resourceful

Are you feeling vexed by having to find x? Is photosynthesis not synthesizing in your brain easily and a test is imminent? Fear not, under the tutelage of Division Chair Mr. Kantzevelos and his two Assistant Division Chairs who we'll hear from below, the Math and Science Departments have free tutoring available to students. Read below for details:

What is Math Resource and what services are provided?

Ms. Smith: Math Resource is a classroom where a math teacher is available to help students with homework, studying, and ACT preparation problems. It's also a space where students can make up missed assessments like quizzes and/or tests or if they simply need a quiet place to complete math homework even if they don't need direct help from a teacher.

Where is Math Resource located?

Ms. Smith: Math Resource is in Room 343 and is open Monday through Thursday from 3:00 until 4:00 PM.

How can students access Math Resource?

Ms. Smith: Math Resource is a drop-in service, so students can stop by without a pass or appointment. Please arrive before 3:05, as no one is allowed to enter after that time.

What is Science Resource and what services are provided?

Mr. Daugherty: In Science Resource, students can get help with anything done in science classes, including reviewing lecture material, finishing labs, and taking missed quizzes and tests.

Where is Science Resource located?

Mr. Daugherty: It takes place in Room 265 on Tuesdays and Thursdays during all lunch periods. The other option is in Room 257, Monday through Thursday from 3:00 until 4:00 PM.

How can students access Science Resource?

All they need to do is drop by. It helps to inform their teacher first, but it's not necessary.

## Oh To Be in the TLC

If there is a theme of this issue of Counseling Corner, it's this: there is plenty of help that is available to Argo students free of charge when they experience bumps in the road of their academic journeys. A prime feature of this would have to be The Learning Center, or TLC.

Housed in the Pass Gate Annex (PGA) since its ribbon cutting ceremony, the TLC is a space within Argo that is dedicated to helping students in numerous ways. Open daily from 8:00 AM until 3:00 PM (and hosting Argo After Hours until 4:30), there is a Writing Center where students can receive assistance and have their writing proofread in advance of turning it in for a grade. Help is available in all subject areas and there is heavy traffic there during lunch periods comprised of students receiving tutoring, making up missed tests, and some who just like the quiet ambience that is conducive to getting work done instead of sitting in the cafeteria.

Students can obtain a pass from a teacher or counselor to attend the TLC and they have fifteen minutes to pick up their lunch and take it through multiple corridors and up to the TLC. With the semester about to enter its last weeks and final exams on the horizon, a visit up there is probably good idea for many if not most of our students. As veteran math teacher Mr. Stern says, "It's [TLC] a nice, relaxing place to learn or get help."

Let's hear more from Dr. Jervis & our new TLC staff:

The TLC is available for students to utilize throughout the day for retakes, essay assistance, academic support, or a quiet space to study. Students are welcome to attend during their lunch period, and tables are designated for specific subjects. The testing center allows students to retake and make up exams that they missed or would like to retake.

There are also opportunities for NHS students to become peer mentors. Their roles and responsibilities include helping struggling students, assisting with attendance, and sending out passes.

The TLC has a new Instructional Aide:

"Hello Argonaut Community! My name is Noelia Rivera and, as an alumna from the Class of 2019, I am absolutely thrilled to return to Argo as an Instructional Aide at the Teaching and Learning Center. After my time at Argo, I studied at Illinois State University before ultimately graduating from University of Illinois at Chicago with a Bachelor's degree in Teaching of Education and a minor in Communications. Through my teaching experiences, it is my belief that cultivating learning environments rooted in empathy enables students to take ownership of their learning.
