Barnegat Light State Park

Barnegat Light State Park is a great winter birding spot, with lots of sea ducks, gulls, and winter shorebirds. We will hike to the end of the jetty from 7th Avenue. Dress warmly; a rigorous sandy hike on the beach is to be expected. Along the way, we will make a few more stops to pick up a few other species in the bay and ocean. If time permits, we will check out one of the surrounding salt marshes before heading back.

Sandy Hook is a 2,044-acre barrier beach peninsula that offers seven miles of beach line. The variety of coastal habitats including sand dunes, grasslands, salt and freshwater marshes, thickets, and maritime forest offers a diverse range of birding opportunities. From shorebirds and songbirds to waterfowl, join us as we search these locations for wintering birds.

We will start in Ocean at the Manasquan River Inlet and work our way north at least as far as Lake Takanassee. The trip will have multiple stops so dress in layers and be prepared for climbing in and out of the van.

Join us for a day on Sandy Hook! We'll meet a naturalist from the American Littoral Society for a light walk on a paved pathway to a seal-viewing area, then visit two birding hotspots—bayside and oceanside—to look for wintering waterfowl. While sightings aren't quaranteed, the trip is timed for the best chance to see wildlife. Afterward, we'll stop for lunch at Off the Hook (not included in the price of the trip), then explore the historic Twin Lights lighthouse, with the option to climb one of its towers. We'll finish with a stop at Mount Mitchill Scenic Overlook for stunning views of Sandy Hook, Raritan Bay, and the New York skyline and 9/11 memorial. Bring water, dress in layers, and bring binoculars (some available to borrow).




