RSHS Priority Practices and Related Actions

Freshman Academy

- "Social and Emotional Learning and Ninth-Grade Students'
- Academic Achievement" (University of Texas at Arlington, 2023) Key finding: Ninth graders with stronger SEL skills and better connectedness to their school community had higher grades. This suggests that when freshmen feel supported socially/ecorrelates with better academic performance.
- "Intrinsic motivation, Need for cognition, Grit, Growth Mindset and cademic Achievement in High School Students" (2022)
- Key findings: students with higher grit, growth mindset etc., had significantly better grades across disciplines.
- "A tier 1 intervention to increase ninth grade engagement and

Accredidation - School Performance

Where We Are—and Why You May See "Accredited with Support"

Since the start of the year, we've reviewed our performance data and put targeted supports in place—schedule adjustments, extension classes, Freshman Academy, APS, HOCA, CTE Academies & Pathways, Edmentum, Friday School, Summer School, Graduation Coaching, and more. Over the years we've strengthened our curriculum and maps to align with assessment blueprints, and our overall metric scores are rising across categories. We're moving in the right direction We Are Close!

Why the label? Wyoming's accountability system reflects multiple years of results. A school can carry an "Accredited with Support" designation even while trending up; it signals that the state is providing added resources and oversight to accelerate improvement. It's a snapshot of where we've been—not the end of our story. Our trajectory is positive, and the work you're doing each day is turning momentum into results.

By the end of the 2025-2026 school year, strengthen datadriven instruction, collaboration, and targeted interventions through the consistent implementation of grade-level PLCs, data reviews, Extension (Math, English, College and Career Readiness interventions, and a structured MTSS process.

Edmentum: Exact Path

Exact Path: Why & Expectation

Exact Path is our district and school-wide tool for targeted acceleration. It uses adaptive diagnostics to pinpoint each student's strengths and needs and automatically builds individualized learning paths in math, reading, and language arts—so every minute is purposeful and progress is measured along the way.

Directive & time on task

This is a district and school expectation: all Extension Classes will implement Exact Path for 40 minutes per week in Math and Literacy (split between Reading and Language) at this time. Exact Path and Study Island may also be used in any other class at any time. Consistent, short bursts align with Edmentum's guidance (about 40 minutes/week per subject) and are linked in studies to measurable gains when used with fidelity.

Cell Phones

Review the Cell Phone Procedure below. It is located in the handbook and has been created per District Policy JFCN. This procedure is an expectation and non-negotiable in our buildings and we appreciate your support and help in enforcing our policies.

Cell Phone and Smartwatch Procedures 9-12

Sweetwater School District One recognizes the importance of communication and collaboration and provides devices for students to be productive in the classroom. Students in grades 9-12 will be permitted to bring personal telecommunication devices on school property. To prevent disruptions and distractions to the learning environment, and to keep students focused on academics, use of personal communication devices will be limited as follows:

- Devices shall be silenced and kept in the student's backpack, locker, or other area designated by the classroom teacher during scheduled class periods.
- Device use shall be allowed before the morning bell rings, during passing periods, lunch, and after school is released for the day. The district is not responsible for any damaged, lost, or stolen electronic device. The use of any device or camera capable of capturing images is strictly prohibited in classrooms, locker rooms, or restroom areas at all times.

Physical Science will be solidifying our understanding of chemical bonding and balancing equations.


