
A Year Of Frustration

Teaching at West Fargo High School for the past eleven years has been both a rewarding and frustrating experience. The rewarding part includes the opportunity to associate with some of the warmest, most dedicated staff, and some of the finest young people one could find anywhere. It is also very rewarding to have learned to know, and value as friends, many people in the West Fargo area. It is rewarding to observe many students going on to successful lives.

It is easy to write about the positive, but at this point I must discuss the negative. There is something terribly wrong going on in the West Fargo School District. We see widening gaps between community and school, between faculty and administration, between Board of Education and faculty, between city and rural people, between students and parents, to name a few. All of these groups are apparently pulling for some selfish interest, when the youth of our area are the real losers. We see bond issues defeated, mill levies go down, cuts in school programs, and hear rumors of more cutbacks to come. And still no long range planning is evident!

Speaking specifically for the high school, our needs are extremely critical in many areas, as they have been for some time. However, the predicted increased enrollments of the next few years are about to create problems far beyond those of the present. Immediate needs for the high school are a sizeable building addition, plus a considerable addition of teaching staff to keep anywhere even with our current program.

The situation is serious in all areas of the high school, but especially critical, near impossible, situations exist in music, art, drama, counseling, industrial arts, languages, and library to name a few. Teachers and students in these areas should be recognized as extremely dedicated people to even consider involving themselves in such adverse conditions. Besides the above there are many areas of study needed which cannot even be offered.

I wish I could say, "here are the answers to all of these problems." Of course, the solutions to such complex problems are not that simple. It is obvious, however, that the almighty dollar is a prime factor in our school problems. Our area is really a very prosperous one. Look around you . . . stores, restaurants, lounges, bars, and others are doing an excellent business. Automobile dealers reported record sales last fall, and large new shopping areas are being built in the area. West Fargo area people are spending huge amounts in these places and others although they are not all in our school district. The money is there, but where are our priorities?

Another major factor is the lack of cooperation and understanding among various factions within the West Fargo School District. I talk to people, both city and rural, who have some petty gripe against the school from way back many years ago, refusing to forgive, forget, and go ahead. Many people really have no idea of our school problems, as they never come near a public school to take a first hand look for themselves. Who really suffers? Do teachers suffer, do administrators suffer? Do Board of Education members suffer? Certainly to some degree in concern, but really the people who suffer are the youth of our community.

My hope would be that the people of the West Fargo School District start taking a long, honest, serious look at the situation and that all of these factions would be big enough to bury the past and do something positive for the group which is really suffering, our young people! How can it be otherwise?

Five Steps Backwards-- Mod Scheduling back to Traditional

We've got an unhappy student body. There are probably several reasons for this stalemate atmosphere, but, in talking to various people lately, the heaviest gripe is the loss of modular scheduling.

STEP ONE

A. Scholastically. Which means simply, the quality and degree of knowledge. Now let me relate to you quote fragments from our students showing their opinion on the change in learning. "We're learning less, even with longer classes . . . I don't accomplish as much as I used to . . . much more homework . . . no time to get assignments done in school . . . everything is so tense! . . . clockwork! . . . no variety . . . a drag, my grades are the same, but it's so 'blah' . . ." It sounds like a dejected atmosphere, eh? I, myself, find it an undesirable combination: tenseness and monotony. One step backward in the progressive learning process.

STEP TWO

B. Socializing. This doesn't mean that our educations should teach us how to gossip and make noise. It means that we should have the utmost opportunity to develop our skill and desire to relate to fellow humans. This includes a variety of instructors, and now, hear our students: "I'm in contact with the same kids day after day. Before, I was with

different size groups, different kids . . . we got more meaning

out of small groups than out of what we have now, because you could speak your mind better and hear what others got to say . . ." This says, in my opinion that classes have less open discussion and communication, thus lower relevance. Another step back.

STEP THREE

C. Individuality, independence in thought and action, obviously a very important facet in preparing to meet the world outside without falling flat on your face. We are all extremely different in one area or another, so how

can we all benefit in a plan where students have the same amount of time allotted for help from our teachers? Students comment ". . . there's less individual work now, it's all one big machine . . . the classes are too big, the constant teacher/student ratio is too high . . . you don't do much on your own no more, but that's o.k." Is it another step backwards.

STEP FOUR

D. Resourcefulness, or how we can best use our time, interest and capabilities, can be stifled with inadequate resources or opportunities. Kids told me ". . . I've been cheated out of classes that I wanted to take this year because there is no time or teacher available . . . we have only one teacher per class this year except in math . . . sometimes I have 15-25 minutes left over in class with nothing to do there, when I have other homework I could work on . . . we're just wasting our time here . . . I hardly use the resource centers now because I have to do all my homework at home . . ."

" . . . step back, please, you're standing on my toes . . ." but how far can we continue falling back before we fall off?

STEP FIVE

E. Spirit, which determines the amount of knowledge we soak in, is a crucial factor in our lives. Again students remark, "I've been bored out of my mind since Sept. 7 . . . I don't like the schedule this way, that's all . . . I'm in a rut, first hour this, next-that . . ."

Not all people have been bored "out of their minds" but I, too, find that the seven hour day just isn't offering the opportunity of personal fulfillment. In other words the steady patterning somehow curbs creativity. Attitude, which is based on spirit and self-worth within the school, makes or breaks the unity of the school and its people. We can either be apathetic and break ourselves and our relation to other students and faculty, or step up again and become unified.

We have to do the best with what we have, but what if we strive to step up again and surpass where we have stood in the past? We can, if we have the spirit of the school (and I don't necessarily mean the "rah-rah" kind of spirit) and the vote of the city AND rural area behind us. I really think that we should strive to reclaim the modular schedule system.

The most difficult thing for me here is that I always have to say something about West Fargo, and this high school and North Dakota in general.

Sometimes, I wonder why my opinions are that important: because I come from Germany? It was not my decision what I was born: German, American, Russian, or Australian. I am nothing special. A human being, just as anyone else in this school. I wanted to get to know new people and make friends, which I did. I wanted that you accept me as the kind of person I am and not as a German.








In my opinion, this school's going downhill.
