- Increased interest in Vocational Education
- Need for additional Therapeutic Transitional Classrooms. An Adjustment Counselor would also be needed if this program expanded
- Need for additional custodial support due to busy event calendar at HS.

Challenges when ratios are higher

- Less individualized attention: Students who need extra help (especially Multilingual Learners, students with disabilities, or struggling learners) may not get timely support.
- Lower engagement: In larger classes, fewer students get to actively participate, ask questions, or receive feedback.
- Difficulty implementing best practices: Strategies like project-based learning, small group instruction, and individualized feedback are harder to manage with larger classes.
- Advanced students cannot receive attention for additional challenges or extension activities
- Less ability to engage in creative or innovative activities with larger class sizes and limited space
- Weaker social emotional supports: Teachers may struggle to build strong relationships with all students, which can affect belonging, behavior, and overall well being
- Weaker college and career readiness: Students in oversized classes may not build the depth of knowledge or critical thinking skills needed beyond high school
