The Miller Place School District launched the 2025-2026 school year on September 4, welcoming students back for an exciting year of growth, achievement, and discovery. Administrators, teachers, and staff greeted students with smiles as they made their way to their classrooms and settled in. The back-to-school season brings fresh opportunities to learn, explore new experiences, and build lasting friendships. As we begin a new school year, we wish our entire school community a season of success, connection, and endless possibility.



A Message From the Superintendent

Welcome to the 2025-2026 school year. This summer, we hired over 38 new staff members that included nurses, aides, clerical, operations staff, teachers, and teacher assistants. In August, parents, guardians, and students were invited into our buildings for an informative walk-through and orientation. Staff gathered on September 2nd and 3rd for our Superintendent's Conference Days, finalizing preparation for our students' return. On Tuesday, September 4th, we welcomed more than 2,250 students into our classrooms, including the 2026 senior class and our newest generation of students—the class of 2038—who began their journeys at Andrew Muller Primary School.

As we opened, the new school year activities were in high gear. Each school building had their Open Houses as parents and guardians were invited to meet their child's teachers. Our District provides students with a well-rounded experience as students have the option to participate in extracurricular activities. This fall, students in grades 7 through 12 will represent Miller Place in 24 interscholastic athletic teams. Clubs are an opportunity for students to be involved in school and with approximately 40 clubs offered at the secondary level, students are offered the chance to select those activities that interest them. In the late fall and early winter, clubs will start at both Andrew Muller Primary School and Laddie A. Decker Sound Beach School.

As part of the Miller Place Strategic Plan, we are focusing on a collaborative effort on the benefits and understanding Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA), a research-based assessment that measures growth and proficiency utilized by the district in grades two through eight to track student growth and identify areas of strength and areas that need to be addressed. We will be increasing our communication with parents and guardians about the NWEA reports as we have added an additional parent-teacher conference day at AMPS and LADSBS in March in order to facilitate conversations about student progress. We are providing additional professional development for teachers in NWEA tools and teachers will be speaking directly with students about their growth and avenues for enrichment or improvement.

The education landscape in New York is continuously evolving, including the Regents exams and the newly adopted New York State Portrait of a Graduate. We will be looking at incorporating these changes into the current Strategic Plan and/or adjusting our plan to meet the changes and needs of our students. As students start the new academic year, Miller Place staff members are committed to planning, teaching, and supporting student success inside and outside the classroom. It is important for students to communicate with staff when they need help, and for parents or guardians to reach out as well. This allows staff to better understand any challenges and work together to create a plan.

I look forward to working with students, parents, guardians, and staff to continue to improve our student success and continue to make Miller Place the best possible district.

AROUND OUR SCHOOLS

ANDREW MULLER PRIMARY SCHOOL

At Andrew Muller Primary School, our new gymnasium and kindergarten/Universal Pre-kindergarten playground have been supporting student learning. With these new spaces, students now attend physical education classes three times per week. PE teachers Ms. Dunn and Ms. Gibbons have expanded the PE curriculum, adding a golf unit, expanding the bowling and cooperative games unit, and ramping up the jump rope unit. First and second graders have been exploring team building, turn taking, and skill development during their recess periods. Students who are interested are able to spend more time playing kickball and practicing their basketball skills. We can't wait to see what else is in store for our students as we work to build strength, skill, and stamina.



Kindergarteners and UPK students are loving the new playground, repaved blacktop, and grass field. They are invited to go outside twice per day to play with friends and meet new students from other classes. The physical activity allows students to develop gross motor skills as well as social skills. Gross motor development is the precursor to fine motor development, which supports handwriting and posture. Physical activity also provides developmentally appropriate playtime, which supports focus in the classroom. Friendships foster strong connections with classmates and create a positive sense of belonging at school.

LADDIE A. DECKER SOUND BEACH SCHOOL

Laddie A. Decker Sound Beach School teachers recently engaged third grade students in meaningful reflection surrounding the events of September 11th. Students read the story September 12th, written by a first-grade class about how they knew everything would be okay after the events of 9/11. They also read 14 Cows of America, a true story about the Maasai people of Kenya who gifted 14 of their most prized cows to America as a symbol of compassion, strength, and healing after the tragedy of 9/11. Students learned the significance of Patriot Day, decorating the school building with their own paper chain creations and Ribbon of Remembrance. Continuing their lessons of American values and unity, students shifted their focus to the Constitution. They collaborated with their peers on a presentation exploring the work of the Founding Fathers, reviewing each Article of the Constitution, and defining the Preamble. As they worked, they participated in meaningful discussions led by their teachers about the meaning and relevance of the Constitution in today's world. Through these lessons covering September 11th, Patriot Day, and the US Constitution, students were able to ask questions, discuss with their classmates, and pay tribute to defining moments in American history, engaging empathetically with their learning.
