# Confidentiality and Public Information

- Generally, security documents, records, and information reviewed by the committee or discussion of the documents and records should **remain confidential**.
- Texas Education Code section 37.2071(i) makes any document or information collected, developed, or produced during the review and verification of a multi-hazard EOP not subject to disclosure under the Texas Public Information Act (PIA).
- Texas Education Code section 37.108(c-1) provides that any document or information collected, developed, or produced during a safety and security audit conducted under the provision requiring regular safety and security audits of a district's facilities is confidential and not subject to disclosure under the Texas Public Information Act (PIA).
- Access to documents and records by committee members are to be confidentiality protected and not shared with the public. **Any security documents, records, or information shall only be released by the District with permission from the Texas Attorney General.**

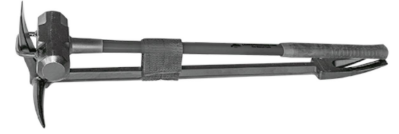

# Grants Update

- SPAT Grant - @78K - \$0 balance
  - Raptor Emergency Management
- School Safety Formula Grant (2022-2025) - \$1.1 million
  - Impact Film for windows
  - Radio repeaters
  - Fencing
  - Campus radios
  - Reallocation of SRO costs
  - Balance = \$92k, must be spent by 7/29/26
- Safe Cycle 2 Grant (2024-2025) - \$700k
  - Breaching tools
  - Reallocation of SRO costs
  - Campus radios
  - Fencing
  - Balance = \$136k, must be spent by 7/29/27

- Upcoming Projects
  - Peepholes in exterior doors
  - 2nd door handles

# Legislative Updates - HB 33



- The District has purchased and received all ballistic shields, cases, and breaching tools for all elementary campuses.
- The guidance that we received from Region 10/TEA indicated that these items must be accessible for responding officers.
- These items will be stored in the front office of every elementary campus.
- Secondary SROs have these items issued to them by their police departments, and they will remain with the specific officer and likely stored in their office.
- These items are to be used by trained professionals only (armed security/SRO)
- Adequate storage is being researched for campuses (Level III+, 16" x 30", 24 lbs.)



# Legislative Updates - HB 6

- HB 6 has significant implications for threat assessment by requiring schools to have a campus behavior coordinator report students engaging in terroristic threats, weapons offenses, or other alarming behaviors to the threat assessment team. It also mandates that threat assessment teams include a person knowledgeable about student disabilities when assessing a special education student. Your Director of Special Services will fulfill this role. It is critical that your campus behavior coordinator attends the Friday threat assessment meetings as we need input from the campus. Your EBSS may also attend if they have specific knowledge of the student in question.
- Current District threat assessment model is that we have representation from: Student Services, Special Services, Counseling, Campus Administration, Safety & Security, and local law enforcement. **This has been our practice since 2023, prior to HB6.**

# Legislative Updates - HB 121

- **Training and Personnel Requirements**
  - Requires district employees hired as armed security officers under a good cause exception who are not trained/approved school marshals to complete training within 90 days of being hired, including active shooter response (via ALERRT), school safety and emergency management, crisis intervention, incident command, first aid, mental health, and firearm qualifications
  - Requires threat assessment teams evaluating special education students to include a member with specific knowledge of the student's disability such as their special education teacher, a licensed behavior analyst, clinical or master social worker, or school psychologist
  - Requires threat assessment teams, rather than superintendents, to notify parents when a student is determined to pose a serious risk of violence
- **Accountability and Compliance**
  - Requires districts that claim a good cause exception to the armed security officer requirement to renew the exception and alternative standard annually
  - Requires districts to renew their good cause exception and alternative facility safety standards every five years
- **Emergency Operations and Communication**
  - Requires multi-hazard emergency operations plans to address reunification and safety during extracurricular activities, as determined by TEA
  - Requires districts to provide emergency services districts with school building maps
  - Requires districts to provide parents with information on safe firearm storage three times per year

# Legislative Updates - SB 57

- Requires the commissioner to develop guidelines by June 1, 2026, which districts are required to follow, to ensure students and staff with disabilities are provided equal access to safety during a disaster or emergency situation, including recommendations regarding accommodations for students with an IEP during a mandatory school drill, required documentation, required communication, and requires consultation with public school administrators
- Requires the district's schools safety and security committee to include a special education administrator and ensure the plans reflect recommended accommodations for students with IEPs

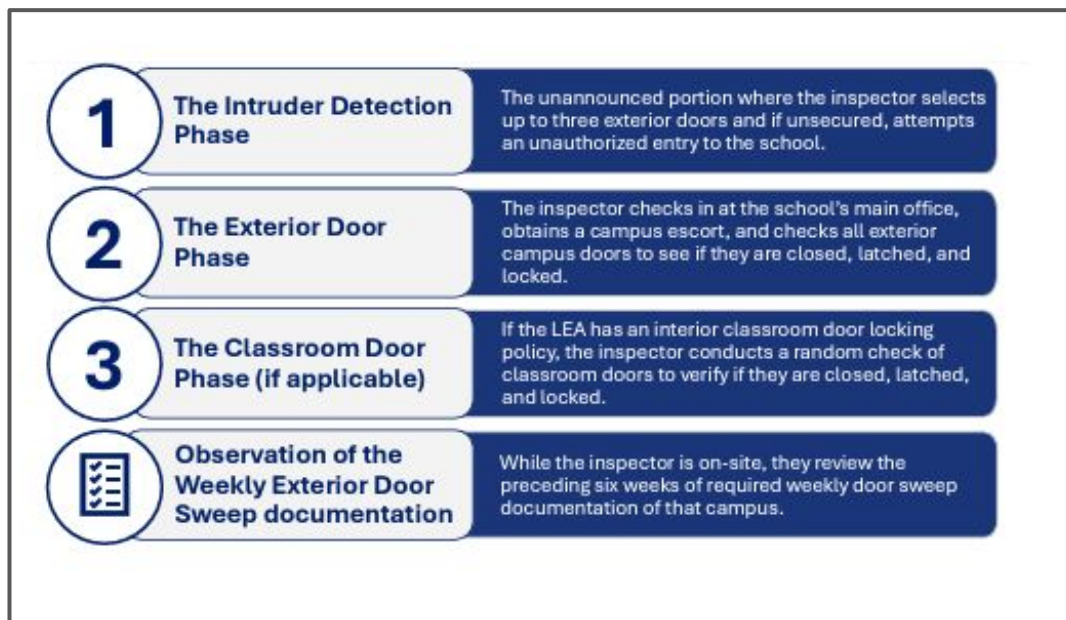
