PAC Goals for 2025 - 26

The Parent Advisory Committee's mission is to engage families to help shape education policy and represent diverse parent voices in the statewide decision-making process.

The PAC is committed to helping close gaps in achievement and to create authentic engagement opportunities that will result in transformative outcomes for California students.



The purpose of this committee shall be to review, recommend, and advise the district on matters pertaining to the Local Control Accountability Plan (LCAP) and Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF).

- Advise administration and staff on parents/families' views on any matter related to schools programs, practices policies, plans, and activities
- Communicate with parents/guardians and to promote parent/guardian engagement between home and school in providing for the education of their children
- Assist parents/families in access the system and to facilitate advocacy support for individual children and their parents/ family
- Assist in the planning, development, implementation and evaluation of the LCAP, using data to inform discussions.
- Assist with efforts to make parents aware of the district's policy and procedures relating to the programs and actions within the LCAP and other critical district plans.



LCAP Goals

- All students will receive a high quality education in a safe and welcoming environment with high expectations and rigorous instruction in the California State Standards that prepare them for college and career.
- Highly qualified, culturally proficient, and responsive staff will create a safe and engaging learning environment respectful of all students' backgrounds ensuring they are college and career ready when they graduate.
- Families and community members will be informed, and empowered as partners with Mt. Diablo Unified to support student learning and improve student outcomes.
- Focal scholars, specifically African American students, Foster Youth, students experiencing homelessness, students with IEPs and multilingual students, will experience culturally responsive practices and be provided rigorous instruction within an educational environment that builds trust and inclusive partnerships between the students, families, and staff.
- All students at Crossroads High School and Olympic High School will demonstrate a 6% increase in attendance rate and a 6% increase in on-pace graduation rate by June 2026, leading to an increase of 6% in graduation rates.



Background-MDUSD and Expanded Learning Programs

Established in 1999

Mt. Diablo Unified School District (MDUSD) has collaboratively developed twenty four after-school programs in the Concord, Pleasant Hill, Pittsburg, Martinez, and Bay Point communities.

These programs will serve approximately 120 to 250 students at each school site. Program components include but are not limited to: academic intervention/enrichment, social emotional learning activities, project based learning curriculums, physical fitness/sports, nutrition/garden education, field trips, youth service/leadership development, STEM activities, art, and visual performing arts. There is no cost for students to participate.


*Students from schools without a program can attend a designated site if they meet eligibility requirements and space is available.

Operating Days and Hours & Food Services



Program follows the school year calendar and provides program during fall break, spring break, teacher inservice days and operates a four week summer program. We operate the following Intersession days from 8:00 am - 5:00pm

Expanded Learning Program Hours

During the school year, the program runs Monday through Friday, beginning at school dismissal and ending at 6:00 PM

*Students who leave program early, will need to complete an Early Release Form.

Food Services

MDUSD Food Services provides meals -snack and supper on school days and breakfast, lunch and snack on intersession days.

Food Bank of Contra Costa/Solano Counties donates fruit and vegetables to every sites and 9 sites (Bel Air, Cambridge, El Dorado, El Monte, Fair Oaks, Shore Acres, Sun Terrace, Wren Ave., Ygnacio Valley Elementary) receive weekend KNOW packs.



Program Offerings

Academic Support

 An educational and literacy element in which tutoring or homework assistance is provided in one or more of the following areas: language arts, mathematics, history and social science, computer training, or Science.

Monday-Thursday for 60 minutes

If students do not have homework, standards based activities are provided

- Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELOP)
 - Entitlement Funds
 - Amount based on Unduplicated Students (Free/Reduced Lunch Eligible, Foster Youth, MultiLingual Learner)
- After School Education & Safety Grant (ASES)
 - o MDUSD has had the ASES grant since the early 2000s
 - o 16 of our 23 sites receive ASES funding
 - o 3 year renewable grant
 - Awarded a target number of students per school
- Title 1 Part A
 - Federal funds used to provide expanded learning programming at our two high schools
- Community Partner Grants
 - Concord Pleasant Hill Health Care District
 - Community Block Grant



What's Ahead...

Stakeholder Surveys

- We are currently collecting data from our Fall stakeholder surveys, which include feedback from parents/quardians, partner staff, administrators, and students.
- This information will guide program planning and improvements.
- Surveys are administered three times a year: Fall, Winter, and Spring.

Student Interest Surveys

- All MDUSD unduplicated families will receive an interest survey in late February for the 2026–2027 school year.
- Students at the 23 identified sites will also complete an interest survey in late February.

Registration Process

- Registration for the **2025–2026 school year** is currently open.
- Registration for **Summer 2026** begins in March.
- Registration for the **2026–2027 school year** begins in May.
- All registrations follow the Priority Enrollment Guidelines-Priority Enrollment Guidelines



Connecting to MTSS

Educational Equity:

- Educational equity is the principle of ensuring that every student receives the resources and support they need to reach their full academic and social potential, regardless of their personal circumstances.
- We provide opportunities for historically underserved students which are individuals who
 have faced systemic barriers and discrimination in the education system based on factors
 like race, ethnicity, income, or being the first in their family to attend college. They often
 experience lower educational outcomes due to these barriers and require targeted support,
 such as academic assistance programs, and more inclusive learning environments, to
 achieve success.
