GUIDANCE NEWS



Dear Parent or Guardian:

Jasper-Troupsburg Central School District has been selected to participate in the 2025 Prevention Needs Assessment Survey. This survey is designed to measure the need for prevention services among youth in the areas of substance abuse, delinquency, antisocial behavior, violence, mental health, eating disorders and sexuality. The information the students provide can help us all take steps to reduce and prevent these problems in Jasper-Troupsburg. The survey will be administered to 8th, 10th and 12th grade students starting next week. The survey is sponsored by the Steuben Prevention Coalition, a group working to build healthier communities.

The following are facts about the survey:

1. It is totally **voluntary**. Your child does not have to participate. You do not have to give a reason for not participating. Students are not required to answer all questions, only those that they want to answer.
2. It is **anonymous**. The survey is designed to protect your child's and your school's privacy. No names or any other identifying information will ever be recorded. All of the surveys are carefully protected.
3. Jasper-Troupsburg School District and the Steuben Prevention Coalition will use the school survey results to plan better prevention efforts.
4. The Prevention Needs Assessment Survey has been scientifically tested and is valid and reliable. Developed in 2001, it has been given to over 1 million students in schools across the United States without difficulty over the past eleven years.
5. The summary of the county report will be sent to area newspaper outlets to notify the public.

If you do not want your child to participate, simply send a note or call the main office by November 24, 2025.

Thanks for your help. This survey is an important part of Jasper-Troupsburg Central School and the Steuben Prevention Coalitions effort to keep our children healthy and safe. I hope you will allow your child to participate.








A Strong Start for Business 7

Mrs. Aldrich's Business 7 class recently completed their *Famous Entrepreneur Research Project*. Students were tasked with researching an assigned entrepreneur's traits, experiences, and accomplishments, and then creating a creative presentation to share their findings.


This project was designed to both teach students the principles of successful entrepreneurship and initiate their development of vital communication skills.

The students excelled in communicating their research and engaging their classmates. I am very proud of the quality of the presentations, which mark a fantastic start to improving both their business knowledge and communication abilities!

As part of their study, each student created a cell analogy—a creative comparison that explains how the organelles of a cell work by relating them to something more familiar, such as an airport, a store, or a concert. After designing their analogies, students presented them to the class, explaining how each part of their chosen system represents a specific cell organelle. The students were very creative in their chosen cell analogies, selecting a wide variety of systems.



Exploring Germany

Some of our classes had the wonderful opportunity today to hear from Johanna, our foreign exchange student from Germany, as she presented to Mr. Dennison's science classes. Johanna shared an engaging and thoughtful look into everyday life in Germany—from the unique structure of their school system to the lively traditions and fun found in her home village.

Students were fascinated to learn how German schools operate, what a typical day looks like, and how education differs from what they experience here. Johanna also brought her community to life with stories of local festivals, customs, and the special sense of togetherness that defines her village.

Her presentation not only broadened our students' cultural understanding but also sparked meaningful conversations about global similarities and differences. We are grateful to Johanna for sharing her experiences and helping our students see the world through a new lens!
