Cold Weather Check List

Take some time to go over the following check list to see if your child is ready for the cold weather.

My child has the following:

- _____ **Hat**
- _____ **Winter Gloves/Mittens** (Waterproof are best...Not the little knit gloves!)
- _____ **Coat** (One that the student can zip/put on themselves.)
- _____ **Snowpants** (Now is the time to try these on and make sure the zippers and straps are working properly.)
- _____ **Winter Boots** (Ones that the student can put on and fasten/tie themselves.)

Another thing to stay on top of is making sure these clothes are dried daily. I highly recommend removing boot liners daily and placing them, along with mittens, near a heat source in your home to dry. *Imagine having to go outside with wet gloves and boots for 20 minutes when the wind-chill is in the single digits!*

SEND CLOTHING FOR OUTDOOR RECESS EVERY DAY - EVEN IF YOU THINK IT MIGHT BE INDOOR RECESS!

Remember...all students will go outside for recess if the wind-chill is above 0 degrees. Playing outside in the winter can be lots of fun if you are dry and dressed appropriately.

Be sure to write your child's name on their outdoor clothing!

Please be sure your child has shoes and a sweatshirt/sweater to wear at school. Winter boots and coats will stay in their lockers during instruction time.



UNEXPECTED EARLY DISMISSALS

Tis' the season for unpredictable bad weather. With that in mind it is imperative that families are prepared for unexpected early dismissals. Be sure that your family has a plan in place of how your child(ren) will be getting home.

Please prepare your child with special directions in case school would be canceled during the school day. Does s/he know how to get into the house if you are not home? Does s/he know where to call you?

WHEN TO KEEP YOUR ILL CHILD HOME FROM SCHOOL

As parents we have all had the following scenario happen...you're getting ready to go to work and your child says, "I don't feel good." Your mind immediately goes to all of your tasks for the day as you try to determine if your child really needs to stay home or if they should tough it out.

Keep your child home from school if they have any of the following symptoms:

- Fever (over 100 degrees)
- Lethargy
- Persistent Crying
- Difficulty Breathing
- Influenza
- Diarrhea or Vomiting



By keeping your child home, you will help to lessen the risk of spreading your child's illness to others. Also, if you see a doctor, please be sure to ask them how long your child should be out of school. Often times, children return too early and become ill again very quickly. If your child is prescribed an antibiotic they should remain home for 24 hours after the first dose. **If your child has the flu, they should remain home for 24 hours after the fever and other symptoms have stopped.**

Be careful to not keep your child home too quickly. Children who are absent for more than 10 days in a school year may be required to obtain physician statements for ongoing absences.

Wisconsin State Education Accountability Report Cards

As part of the Wisconsin state accountability system, the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) produces a report card for every public school and district in Wisconsin. The data included in a school's report card is retrieved from spring state assessments (Math, Reading, Social Studies, Science), daily student attendance, and high school graduation rates.

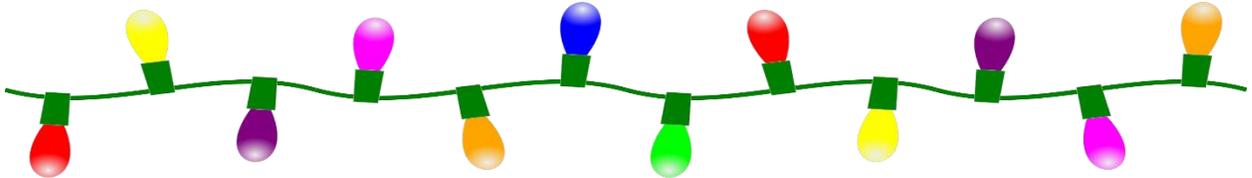
