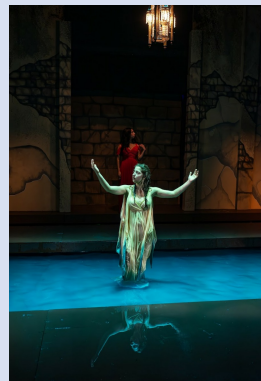
***Metamorphoses* Shines at SPFHS**

The Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School Repertory Theatre presented a stunning performance of this year's fall play, *Metamorphoses*. This one-of-a-kind play was staged in and around a real pool of water, transforming the stage into a mythical realm filled with stories of love, loss, and change. The Manya Ungar Memorial Auditorium was reconfigured into an immersive black box theater, with seating arranged on three sides so audiences could look down into the water and become part of the storytelling experience.

Metamorphoses is a play by Mary Zimmerman based on the myths of Ovid. It reimagines timeless Greek myths — including “Orpheus and Eurydice” and “King Midas” — through poetic storytelling and breathtaking visuals. As the play's director, Mr. Morgan Knight, wrote in his director's note, this play is not just a collection of myths, “but a meditation on what it means to change,” making water the “perfect metaphor” for a play about change.

Congratulations to the cast and crew, as well as to Mr. Knight and all of the staff and adult volunteers who collaborated in creating this magical play. Up next: The SPFHS spring musical, *Guys and Dolls*, will run from March 12-15 in

the Manya Ungar Memorial Auditorium.

SPFHS Student-Athletes Commit on Signing Day

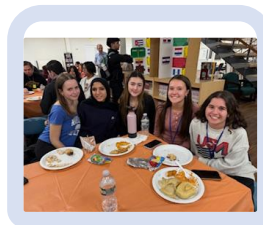
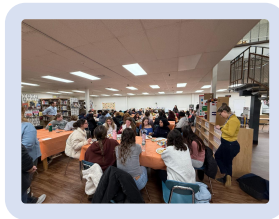

AP African-American History Activities Abound

This year's Advanced Placement African-American History class has engaged in active learning in a number of ways this year. "Anatomy of an Empire" projects depicted the achievements and culture of an African kingdom. In "Blackout poems," students were asked to select facing pages of text from discarded books in the library, or from one of two sources provided, and create a blackout poem about the transatlantic slave trade. In another activity, students used indigo vats to dye fabric, which was a valued skill both within Africa as well as with enslaved individuals. These engaging assignments are coupled with rigorous AP reading and writing assignments, connecting students to the depth of the African-American experience.



Environmental Program Screens Documentary

This past month, the SPFHS Environmental Club had the pleasure of hosting an advanced screening of *ADAPTED*, a new documentary following three outdoor enthusiasts and their journey after traumatic spinal cord injuries. Students came together in the Multi-Purpose Room to watch their powerful stories and their connections to nature. After the screening, the students welcomed director and Chris Morgan Wildlife Ambassador Paul Bikis for a question-and-answer session, asking him about the filming process and his advocacy for nature. This event gave students an opportunity to witness how nature can support healing, offering a valuable reminder of why the outdoors is important for everyone.



Italian Exchange Reunion

Julia Poeschl, former graduate of SPFHS, recently reunited with her Italian exchange student from 2017! Sindi first visited SPF in the fall of 2017. Julia traveled with our program to Reggio Emilia in 2018 and lived with Sindi and her family. Over the past eight years, the girls kept in touch via social media. Sindi came back to visit the U.S. and the families were able to meet for the very first time in November.



Marathon Support for New SPFHS Teacher

Mr. Jeffrey Dunker is in his first year teaching at SPFHS, and is teaching AP Psychology and U.S. History 1. On Nov. 2, Mr. Dunker ran the New York City Marathon, one of many races he has run in his life. During the marathon, Mr. Dunker sustained a leg injury while running over the Queensboro Bridge.
