WRITING

What should my child learn in Grade 11?

Write Widely and Often

- Write clear and coherent expository, narrative, argumentative, and multi-genre pieces of varying lengths for different purposes and diverse audiences.
- Develop a topic with well-chosen, relevant, and sufficient facts, extended definitions, concrete details, quotations, or other information appropriate to the audience.
- Introduce precise claim(s), distinguish the claim(s) from other or opposing claims, and create an organized piece of writing that establishes clear relationships among claim(s), counterclaims(s), reasons, and evidence.

Research

- Conduct short and more sustained research projects to answer a question or solve a problem; synthesize multiple, credible sources on the subject, demonstrating an understanding of a subject.
- Summarize, quote, and paraphrase information to support research inquiry, using appropriate guidelines for citation.
- Develop and strengthen writing as needed by planning, editing, revising, or trying a new approach, focusing on addressing what is most significant for a specific purpose and audience.
- Use technology to produce, publish, and update individual or shared compositions, using technology to link other information and to display information flexibly and dynamically.

Language and Vocabulary

- Apply knowledge of language to understand how language functions in different contexts and across academic subjects to make effective choices for meaning or style.
