Understanding Wisconsin School Finance

The Statewide Picture

Wisconsin continues to face a statewide school funding crisis. Many residents wonder why property taxes keep rising while schools struggle to maintain programs and attract teachers. The challenge lies in the state’s complex funding formula, revenue limits, and unfunded mandates that affect all 421 school districts – including Lodi.

When the school funding formula and revenue limits were first created, they were intentionally tied to inflation to ensure a sustainable and predictable way to fund schools over time. However, that connection was eliminated in 2009, and since then, per-pupil increases have not kept pace with rising costs. If funding had continued to track with inflation, schools would receive an additional \$3,380 per student in 2025 – representing approximately \$5.07 million in lost purchasing power for the School District of Lodi. To fill this gap, more than 85% of Wisconsin districts (including Lodi) have turned to operational referenda, which fund essentials like class sizes, instructional materials, and utilities – not extras.

Special Education: A Growing Cost

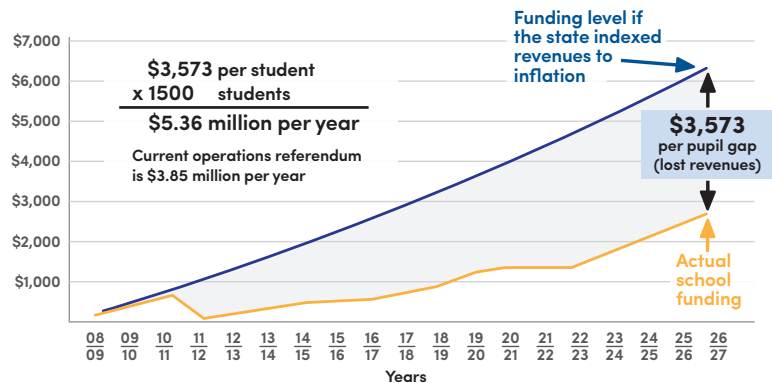
Students with disabilities make up over 15% of Wisconsin’s school population, yet the state has the lowest reimbursement rate in the country, at only about one-third of the actual cost. In Lodi, approximately \$2.6 million is transferred each year from general education funds to meet federally required special education services— reducing resources available to all students.

Property Taxes and the State Budget

The most recent state budget provided a \$325 per-pupil increase each year of the biennium but no new general school aid. As a result, local taxpayers shoulder a greater share of school costs – this is due to the state budget decision not because of any change in the district. Because Lodi is considered “property-wealthy” under the state formula, this impact will be felt more sharply here than in many districts. While the state budget included \$1.5 billion in income and sales tax relief, it did not provide property tax relief.

Community Team Studies Facilities and Outdoor Spaces

The School District of Lodi has formed the Community Viability Team (CVT), bringing together community members, students, staff, business leaders, and local officials to help shape the future of our schools and facilities. The Board of Education has developed guiding principles to help drive this team's work, focusing on accessibility, student opportunities, community needs, and long-term sustainability. Meeting monthly, the CVT will review current facilities, explore future improvements, and build consensus on long-range priorities. These priorities will be presented as recommendations to the Board of Education, which will then seek community input through a survey to help solidify these priorities and ensure they align with the community's vision. With support from planning partners Plunkett Raysich Architects, Point of Beginning Engineering, and CG Schmidt Construction, the team will ensure that a wide range of voices are heard throughout the process. The work will conclude in early 2026, providing a roadmap that reflects community values and supports Lodi students for years to come.

Looking Ahead

Wisconsin's school funding system is outdated and unsustainable. Lodi has taken steps to maximize efficiency and act as responsible stewards of taxpayer dollars, but continued community support is essential to:

- Keep class sizes manageable and provide modern learning opportunities
- Provide targeted interventions and supports to students who need them the most
- Maintain competitive teacher salaries
- Update facilities and technology

The district's current operational referendum sunsets at the end of the 2026–27 school year. The School District of Lodi anticipates returning to voters in November 2026 with a replacement referendum to continue supporting these priorities and sustain educational quality for students.

To continue engaging the community in these important conversations, the Board of Education hosted its third annual Community Engagement Session on November 3rd. This year's session focused on how the 2022 referendum funds are being used, the impact of the recent state budget on local taxpayers, and the ongoing study of our outdoor athletic spaces and facility improvements that will support Lodi's long-term success.

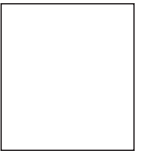
