What outside agencies will help provide:



1. Living independently
2. Employment
3. Recreation and leisure time
4. Continuing education

Guardianship



- When your child turns 18 they reach the legal age of Majority in NJ.
 - This includes all people regardless of disabled or not.
 - It does not matter if the person lives with the family or not
 - This means the parents no longer make decisions legally on behalf of their child.

Guardianship



- A guardian is defined as "a person or agency appointed by a court to act on behalf of an individual".
 - Can be general
 - or limited
 - Residential
 - Educational
 - Medical
 - Legal
 - Vocational
 - Financial

Guardianship



- Establishing guardianship is a legal process
 - Can be done with help from Guardianship Services at the Department of Human Services
 - With an Attorney
 - Possible to do without but very difficult
 - It is recommended that you make every effort to obtain the assistance of an attorney

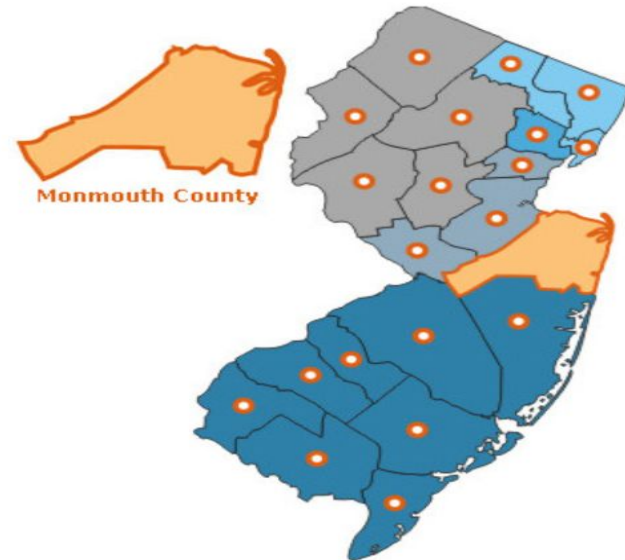

Social Security (Supplemental Security Income) SSI



- Provides monthly payments to eligible individuals
 - 65
 - Blind
 - Disabled

Social Security (Supplemental Security Income) SSI



- Eligible individuals
 - Gross monthly income is equal to or less than \$872.25
 - The resource maximum for an individual is \$2,000 or less
- Must meet SSI eligibility
 - Extensive application
 - Requires levels of documentation

ABLE Accounts



Allows individuals with disabilities to open tax-advantaged savings accounts for disability-related expenses without affecting eligibility for federal benefits like SSI, SNAP, and Medicaid.

Account Limits

- You may **only have one ABLE account** at a time.
- ABLE accounts can be opened in your **own state** or any state that allows non-resident enrollment (e.g., Ohio, Tennessee, Nebraska, New Jersey).
- **Annual contribution limit:** \$14,000.
- **Lifetime contribution limit:** Varies by state (e.g., New Jersey's is \$305,000).

Medicaid



- Provides medical coverage to individuals who are age 65 years or older as well as individuals determined blind or disabled by the Social Security Administration
- Application process required
 - Should do SSI application first
 - You automatically qualify for Medicaid if you receive SSI
- Source of funding for some related services

Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services (DVRS)



- Provides services to enable eligible individuals with disabilities employment opportunities
 - Consistent with their strengths
 - Priorities
 - Needs
 - Abilities
 - Capabilities

Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services (DVRS)



- In Wall, the DVRS caseworker attends exit IEP meetings when appropriate.
- Must fill out an application
- Provides
 - Pre-ETS Services
 - Prevocational counseling
 - Employment Placements
 - Supportive employment services (Short term)

Division Of Developmental Disabilities (DDD)



- Individuals receiving services through school are able to continue doing so through age 21
- Although Division services do not begin until age 21, individuals can be evaluated for eligibility as early as age 17.
- Most people wait until 19 or 20 to start the process.
- In my experience, the process takes six months before a person receives services.

Division Of Developmental Disabilities (DDD)



- Eligibility
 - Meet the functional criteria for a developmental disability;
 - Are a legal U.S. citizen and resident of New Jersey; and
 - Are eligible for or enrolled in Medicaid.

Division Of Developmental Disabilities (DDD)



- Application Process
 - Full form
 - Short form
 - You applied before for developmental disability services through the NJ Division of Developmental Disabilities (DDD) and were notified by DDD that you were eligible.
 - You applied before for developmental disability services through the NJ Children's System of Care (PerformCare) and were notified by PerformCare that you were eligible.

Division Of Developmental Disabilities (DDD)



- NJCAT
 - The NJCAT is completed during the initial eligibility application process.
 - Usually emailed once eligibility is established
 - Can be completed the winter before graduation
 - Ask for help when answering.
 - Establishes the individual's tier.

Division Of Developmental Disabilities (DDD)



- Service providers
 - Individual agencies that will help you access services
 - Based on needs
 - Available funds
 - Ability

- Residential Providers

Community Care Program (Group Home)



- About a 10 year wait once a person gets on the list
 - 18 years of age or older
 - Medicaid eligible
 - Determined by the Division to be eligible for services

Adult Day Programs



Provide adults ages 21 and older with developmental disabilities a daily program of activities

Should contain elements to develop skills in adaptive living, self-help, personal awareness, and recreation.

Adult Day Program



Day habilitation activities should:

- Be Age-Appropriate
- Offer Variety & Choice
- Emphasize Community Experiences
- Focus on Small Groups and Individual Interactions and Experiences

Adult Day Program



Activities I would want to see:

- Shopping – Budgeting, Money management
- Cultural events, Holiday celebrations
- Restaurants – Ordering from menus, Personal choices, Paying bills
- Travel and community safety, Use of public transportation
- Recreation, Bowling, Theater, Golf, Community concerts Library, Book clubs, Community festivals, Museums, Picnics
- Health and Fitness, Parks, Walking, Sports events
