<p>She was the highest level of activation, which is a tier one. And what comes with that is a ton of hospital resources and a ton of hospital personnel. So there's multiple E.R. physicians there. The trauma surgery team is there.</p> <p>The blood bank brings blood in case the patient's bleeding. The respiratory therapist shows up. The CT technologist shows up so we can know and expedite what kind of Cat scans the patient needs to get to the bottom of all the injuries.</p> <p>Drawing blood from one arm, getting blood pressure on the other arm.
