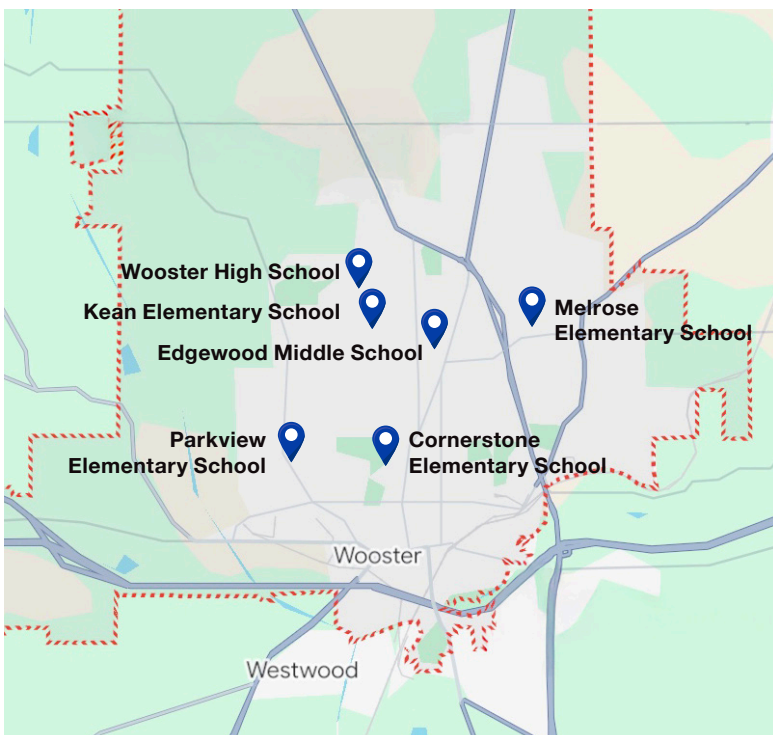


Community Profile

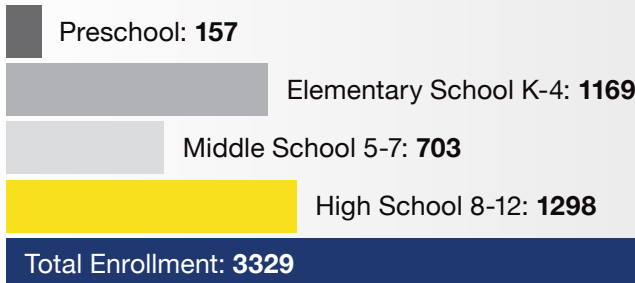

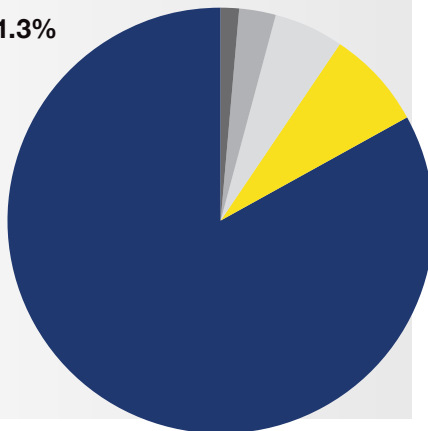
Student Enrollment

College Credit Plus (CCP)

Students may enroll at any state university or participating private college and participate in College Credit Plus. Students must declare their intent and be enrolled in the college they want to attend. Some students remain at Wooster High School and receive both high school and college credit. Career Technology Education (CTE)

Wooster High School offers Career Technical Education programs in Health Technologies and Manufacturing and Welding Technologies, providing students with hands-on, career-focused learning experiences in state-of-the-art facilities. Funded by a \$2 million grant from the Ohio Department of Education and Workforce, modern learning spaces on site at Wooster High School feature advanced tools and technology that support hands-on, career-focused instruction. Students are actively engaged in coursework, earning valuable credentials and gaining real-world experience that prepares them for success in high-demand industries.

The Health Technologies program offers certifications such as CPR, First Aid, Phlebotomy, EKG, and STNA, preparing students for immediate employment or continued study in healthcare. The Manufacturing and Welding Technologies program provides training toward AWS Welding, Forklift, and OSHA-10 certifications, as well as paid work-based learning opportunities. Both programs include two levels, typically completed during the junior and senior years, and reflect the district's commitment to innovative, career-ready pathways that blend technical skill development with STEAM-focused learning.

Littlest Generals Preschool

Our Gold Rated Step Up to Quality Littlest Generals Preschool Program is taught by certified teachers using Ohio's Early Learning and Development standards to provide engaging, hands-on and developmentally appropriate curriculum. Emphasis is placed on meeting the individual needs of students, as well as social and academic growth needed to prepare for Kindergarten. We have both AM and PM classes for ages 3 and 4. Classes take place Monday through Thursday. There is a sliding scale fee for eligible families. The Wooster City School District provides extensive programming and services for all students along a continuum of settings.

Teacher-based teams co-plan to co-serve through proactive instructional practices for each student. Curriculum and instruction are rigorous, culturally responsive, and universally designed. Research-based methodologies are implemented to enhance the instruction of all staff working with students presenting with academic, social, emotional, and/or behavioral needs.

Preschool through grade twelve integrated services include Speech and Language Therapy, Audiology, Occupational Therapy, Sensory Integration, Physical Therapy, Community-Based Instruction, English Learner Language Services, Psychological Services, Service Coordination, Guidance Counseling Services, and Clinical Counseling.



Nursing Services

Wooster City Schools contracts with Akron Children's Hospital for nursing services. A Registered Nurse is available for each district building. Clinical counseling is also available in each building in partnership with the Wayne County Department of Job and Family Services and local counseling agencies.

BusRight



The Transportation Department uses the BusRight app, a free and easy-to-use tool that tracks bus arrival times and routes in real time.

BusRight allows parents and guardians to:

- Track buses in real time to see where your child's bus is and when it will arrive.
- Receive alerts and notifications about route changes, traffic delays, or weather-related updates.
- Confirm safe arrivals when your child reaches school or home.
- View routes for one or multiple children in one convenient place.

Goodwill Industries of Wayne and Holmes Counties

In 1980, a group of Wayne County business leaders mobilized to form Goodwill Industries of Wayne County, Inc., a 501(c) 3 nonprofit organization, and ten years later the agency expanded to include Holmes County. Like the other Goodwill affiliates of Goodwill Industries International, Goodwill Industries of Wayne and Holmes Counties operates independently, guided by its own local Board of Trustees made up of diverse community leaders. In this way, local Goodwill agencies are able to develop programs based on the needs of their own unique communities.



The Leader In Me

Our Elementary buildings implement The Leader in Me, an evidence-based, comprehensive model that builds leadership and life skills in students, creates a high-trust school culture, and lays the foundation for sustained academic achievement.



OHuddle

OHuddle is a non-profit organization supporting students with invested relationships in the form of 1:1 Mentorship. OHuddle stands for "Odyssey Huddle." OHuddle's mission is to awaken youth to their unique value and empower every child to thrive and enrich their community.



OneEighty

At OneEighty, we support a continuum of care with an individualized approach that can save and restore lives. OneEighty actively supports an evidence-based approach to sustainable recovery from trauma and addiction, restoring dignity and purpose, reimagining potential, and rebuilding the lives of the students that we serve through peer mentoring in the schoolhouse.



United Way of Wayne and Holmes Counties

YMCA

The YMCA of Wayne County operates the Ellen Shapiro Natatorium on the Wooster High School campus. The YMCA also runs before and after school programs for Wooster City Schools students.



The safety and well-being of our students is the top priority of the Wooster City School District.

We are dedicated to providing a secure environment where students can thrive academically and personally. We continue to invest in advanced security measures, utilizing both local and grant funding. Through strong partnerships with the Wooster Police Department and other local law enforcement agencies, we have developed a comprehensive crisis management plan to ensure the safety of our students and staff during an emergency.

Communication Systems

Our district utilizes the Centegix Crisis Alert System across all school buildings. This system allows staff members to instantly alert building and district administrators, as well as the Wooster Police Department, in the event of an emergency. The alert system also triggers automated PA announcements and visual displays throughout the school, ensuring that everyone is informed of safety concerns promptly.

Wooster High School's Public Announcement system enables coverage and accessibility for administrators and teachers, even from remote locations. Speakers throughout the interior and exterior of the building improve communication during critical situations.

Surveillance and Infrastructure

Security cameras in each building feature facial recognition technology. During emergencies, the Wooster Police Department can access these cameras, enhancing our response capabilities. Classroom door blockades across the district provide additional protection.

Safer Ohio School Tip Line

The district actively participates in the Safer Ohio School Tip Line, a state-wide service that allows students and adults to anonymously report threats to student safety. Whether it involves a potential mass incident or harm to an individual student, tips submitted to 844-SaferOH (844-723-3764) are reviewed and acted upon by local school officials, law enforcement, and the Ohio School Safety Center (OSSC). More information about this free safety resource can be found at the Ohio School Safety Center, where safety concerns can be submitted directly.

Visitor Management

All school buildings use a cloud-based visitor management system, which streamlines the visitor sign-in process by scanning driver's licenses, conducting background checks, printing photo badges, and notifying staff of visitor arrivals. Visitor data is tracked and monitored online, allowing building principals to maintain awareness of who is in the building at all times. Additionally, students who arrive late or leave early are checked in and out using this system, which automatically sends email notifications to parents.
