## Fiscal Year 2024-25 Types of Services Funded

As a Title I school, we receive state and federal funding dedicated to improving student achievement, with particular emphasis on areas identified through district assessments and state testing. Recent district benchmark data indicate that we must continue to focus on strengthening foundational reading skills. In mathematics, our focus remains on building students' automaticity with basic operations and deepening their number sense.

We are working closely with our district-provided CORE ELA and Math coaches to ensure our teachers have access to the most effective professional learning and best instructional practices. Additionally, we have used site funds to extend our work with our CORE coach to strengthen foundational reading skills in the upper grades. Site funds were also used to contract with a Math Coach from Solution Tree. With the math coach, teachers are developing cross-grade alignment in the essential math content clusters and creating mastery trackers to facilitate collaboration and consistency across grade levels..

Funding is also allocated to compensate teachers who meet after hours with our Teacher Leader and grade-level teams to plan, review, and adjust instruction. When substitutes are available, we will also use funds to release teachers to observe veteran colleagues implementing high-yield instructional strategies.

## Professional Development

This section provides information on the annual number of school days dedicated to staff development for the most recent three-year period.

Our continued laser like focus on improving our practice around teaching reading foundational skills, and number sense, started school year 2022-2023. Our plan is to continue to provide our teachers with the "how" of teaching and presenting strategies that will serve our students in understanding grade level material. This is being supported by our district in the form of a two CORE coaches. The first coach has been working with our k-5 teachers around the Science of Reading . Teachers are being coached around best practices in delivering phonics, and phonological awareness lessons. This coaching happens at both the teacher level, and administration. We also have a math CORE coach who works with teachers to build a deeper understanding of adopted instructional materials, resolve implementation issues, and provide coaching on implementing effective instructional tech
