Demonstrating advanced skills, she has successfully passed a Dual Credit course in Multivariable Calculus through the University of Illinois, and is currently enrolled in Linear Algebra also through U of I. Nicole has qualified for Honor Roll each semester of her high school career and holds an amazing 4.989 GPA.

She is involved in many extracurricular activities, which include being a part of the Math Team, for which she is the current social media manager. As a consistent high performer, she has qualified for the state competition every year and achieved high individual regional placements, including 2nd place as a freshman and 5th place as a junior. Since the use of hearths was prohibited, Parisians wanted some sort of traditional symbol that could be enjoyed with their family and friends during Christmastime.

Step 3

Step 4

Invite Contributors (click or scan the code to see who would be your contributor)

*To invite you will need: name, date of birth, social security number, and email address



Step 5

Parents can complete the parent section after receiving the email invite to complete the FAFSA



Step 6

Review and Submit

If you are not planning to complete the FAFSA this year, you must submit a non-participation form. This form is an important step to ensure all necessary requirements are met for graduation.



Ajani Williams is the recipient of the December Social Studies' Golden Globe Award!









Seal of Biliteracy

The next administration of language proficiency testing for the State Seal of Biliteracy is on Friday, February 20th! The Seal of Biliteracy is a recognition for students who demonstrate proficiency in English and one or more other languages. When earned, the Seal of Biliteracy will appear on the student's official transcript and diploma. Students who earn the Seal of Biliteracy are also allowed to earn early college credit. All public colleges and universities in the State of Illinois have criteria for how this credit is awarded. Students should reference the college or university website for their criteria about how the specific institution recognizes the Seal of Biliteracy for college credit.

To qualify for the State Seal of Biliteracy, a Grant student must accomplish one of the following to demonstrate proficiency in English:

- Earn a minimum 18 or above on the ELA with the writing portion of the ACT
- Earn a minimum score of 4.8 on the ACCESS test
- Earn a score of 4 or 5 on the AP English and Language Composition Exam
- Earn a minimum score of I-5 on the AAPPL English Test

To demonstrate proficiency in another language, each student must also meet one of the following criteria:

- Earn a minimum score of I-5 on the AAPPL test in the chosen language
- Earn a score of 4 or 5 on an AP Language and Culture Exam (Spanish, French, Chinese, German, Italian, Japanese)

Students wishing to earn the Seal of Biliteracy are encouraged to discuss the opportunity with their counselor and/or language teacher. The AAPPL test fee is \$20. Grant Gives Back

Bulldogs Supporting Bulldogs

In late October, Grant Community High School began receiving an increased number of phone calls from Grant families in need, particularly in the realm of impending food assistance program changes. Grant staff stepped up BIG to partner with local food pantries and ensure that shelves and refrigerators remained well-stocked throughout November and December. This year, GCHS staff were able to donate over \$2,500 in monetary donations, as well as non-perishable foods, personal care items, and cleaning supplies, to four local township food pantries. Grant Community High School's district boundaries stretch from McHenry Township to Grant Township to Avon Township to Lake Villa Township. Grant delivered six large boxes of food donations in November to the Grant Township Food Pantry. In December, each of the four locations received a monetary donation from Grant Community High School to ensure that students and families throughout the district have access to these essentials throughout the holiday season (and beyond).

Did you know that food pantries can use monetary donations to purchase grocery items through food bank exchanges to maximize the impact in their communities? Every dollar donated to a food pantry can, in turn, purchase eight dollars of groceries and personal care items. With monetary and grocery donations this season, Grant Community High School provided nearly \$19,000 of assistance to our neighbors in need. Such donations are always welcome if you'd like to contribute to your local food pantry as well. Way to go, Bulldogs!
