



THE BONFIRE — NONFIRE?



Despite the loss to Tumwater this year's Homecoming created a lot of good memories and was one of the best ever.







And the gym stood empty again — echoing still with shouts and emotions of the since-departed crowd.













Timberline's 1986-87 school theme STAND BY ME.























Knowledge Bowl and Academic Decathlon

"The object of Knowledge Bowl is to have fun competing in the Academic areas, and to win," said Knowledge Bowl advisor **Becky Downey**. Even though dedication and hard work is the underlying cause of success in this group, it isn't all work and no play. However, when "stage time" nears, then the jokes are placed aside, and the serious work begins. According to Senior **Doug Peltier**, when it comes close to competition, members prepare by practicing two hours each evening, for a couple of weeks. Because of all the team effort, the Timberline Knowledge Bowl Team has consistently been one of the best schools competing in the state. The competition is in its fifth year throughout the state and THS has gone to state the past four years. The fun comes from the relaxed practices and competition, yet all the effort definitely pays off.


Over 20 Academic Decathlon participants studied in six different areas of academics — Renaissance (music, art, literature, and history), Astronomy and Chemistry, Economics, the U.S. Constitution, and Joseph Conrad's *Heart of Darkness*, as well as Shakespeare. They met from September through January every Tuesday and Wednesday for 2 ½ hours. Each student who participated received a credit for the class, even if they did not compete. Students who had a 4.00 to 3.75 GPA were placed in the Honors Level, students with 3.74 to 3.00 were in Scholastic Level, and those with 2.9 and below were in Varsity Level. After much studying and testing, teams of six students each were chosen (2 from each level). Two teams headed for Vancouver for regionals; the team took first by a storm. They beat Capital, who placed second by over 2,800 points, and with high expectations, they headed to State.

DEBATE

In preparing for a mock election and a political debate between Congressman Don Bonker and rival Joe Illing, Mr. Heino's P.O.D. students worked throughout the month of October on posters, speeches, campaign promises, and watched political debates. Many devoted extra hours after school and on Saturdays in order to be ready for the special event. P.O.D. students also passed out campaign pamphlets, researched issues, videotaped speeches, shook hands, and battled against campaign rivals. After weeks of chaos, all P.O.D. students voted to decide who would be mock representatives of George Bush, Jesse Jackson, Brock Adams, and others in the Timberline Campaign '86 election on October 31st. Those students proceeded to make more promises, speeches, and posters. During lunches live debates and videotapes were shown to give students around the school a chance to see who was running for each position in the schoolwide election. On October 31st THS students voted George Bush as President and reinstated Bonker and Gorton to their respective congressional seats. All the hard work had paid off; Campaign '86 was a success.

If you happened to be walking by Miss Hunter's room during second period, it is quite possible that you would hear, "Debate: it's not just a class, it's an adventure!" Debate consists of a class, club, and team. Class time was spent learning the basic skills of argumentation, research, and preparation for speech tournaments. The club participated in tournaments during the year which provided debaters with opportunities to compete in cross-examination, Lincoln-Douglas (a style of debate deriving from the Presidential debate between Lincoln and Douglas), and individual public speaking such as oratory and editorial commentary. The Timberline Debate Team consisted of a cross-examination tandem of Jay Swan and Thanh Tran, and Brad Hayes who competed in the Lincoln-Douglas debates. In return for their hard work, participants gained enjoyment from travelling to different parts of the region for tournaments, competing against other students from all parts of the state, as well as learning the "art" of public-speaking.



Blazers be here

These wonderful, creative nuggets of wisdom came into being this year because of a new project undertaken by the Timberline administration; revising our school's attendance policy. This controversial action was publicized during the first week of the year, much to the dismay of students. A student poll taken during first semester showed that 86% of the students polled were against the new policy. This overwhelming percentage was primarily due to a major addition in the framework of the policy, the mandatory handing out of extra assignments for every excused absence. Many felt that this was unfair to students who truly made an effort to attend and increased the strain of an already hectic schedule.

Despite all of the dislike expressed by students, the new '86-'87 attendance policy worked. As of December 3rd, 1986, not only did the average daily attendance reach an all-time high of ninety-six percent; quarter grades reflected "positively" upon the new policy. Also, there had been more than twice as many office appointments first quarter of '86 than of '85 which shows that the administration increased its efforts to force the raising of attendance.

The raising of attendance was an important goal, as shown by the administration's effort to improve the policy, but was it worth the dislike of the students? Unfortunately, the answer to this question will only be revealed at the beginning of the 1987-'88 school year.



Timberline has been and always will be a "portable" school with a multitude of students to be educated. Overcrowding was, at times, inconvenient but was dealt with in the best manner known.




A familiar site, a crowded lunchtime commons filled with many conversationalists.

Experience: The best Teacher


VOCATIONAL SKILLS. Academics isn't all pen and paper, at least not for the many students involved in the Timberline High School Vocational Program. These classes provide a break from the books for some hands-on experience and valuable training for future occupations. This program is not just confined to the boundaries of THS, but has an important branch for the more serious vocational student.

A major part of the Vocational Program is located off-campus at the New Market Vocational Skills Center. New Market is a program which provides students with the skills, work habits, and attitudes to be successfully employed or to enter additional training at the post-high school level. Juniors and seniors are taken off-campus to the center for three periods to be taught by experts and to work with up-to-date equipment. The students who take advantage of this program find it very worthwhile and, if given the chance, would do it again. The main reason for the student's appreciation is due to the advantages that the program provides. Some students receive certificates which put them in a better position for jobs and further training, such as the Certified Nursing Assistant certificate which will enable **Anne Hayes** to be employed in her field.

The Vocational Skills program is an extremely valuable asset in Timberline's attempt to keep up with the constantly changing job market. With this program, our students are given an extra edge in job-hunting and further education which is, in essence, the general purpose of high school.

Senior **Leo Norris** is experiencing the practice that sets New Market apart from the norm, learning by doing.




Crawford's "model of success" was Pete Lundberg, THS former activities director. He said, "Lundberg got me involved in school activities when I was a slider."


The University of Washington and a teaching degree are in Crawford's future plans. Someday, Crawford hopes to return to Timberline to teach and carry on that "model of success."


His future plans include attending Arizona Automotive Institute September '87. He will most undoubtedly be a mechanic for a while, but would like to eventually own his own auto business.

(You're writing copy for JII, not JI.)


(JII?)

Chef's Club

Tuesday Surprise

Ingredients:

- 1/4 cup diced parsley
 - 1 whole Mr. Garoutte
 - 18 Jell-O Pudding Pops
 - 2 12 oz. cans Heinz tomato paste





This incredible run not only clinched a 7-2 record, but also gave the Blazers their first Playoff bid in 12 years.


People could argue that the 1986 Blazers weren't a Cinderella team. But not one head coach in the B.H.L. selected the Blazers as a team to beat in the pre-season picks. The Blazers started off strong with 4 convincing wins including trouncings of North Thurston and Shelton. The team was then ranked as high as 5th in the state polls going into the Tumwater game. Over 3,000 people flocked to South Sound stadium to watch the battle of the unbeaten as it later proved to be the championship game. The Blazers got off to a slow start as Tumwater dominated the line of scrimmage while rattling starting quarterback **Ron Effland** who later came out with a concussion. Timberline then dropped the game 16 to 23. The Blazers then only lost one more regular season game because of a serious overlook of winless Centralia.

Coach **John Jordan's** success was due to a steady defense and a strong offensive attack. But much of the Blazers success was due to an excellent passing game led by **Ron Effland** and a fine corp of receivers including seniors **John Apostol**, **Jeff Worgum** and Junior **Curtis Geathers**. Effland led the league in passing yardage and touchdown passes. The Blazers also had an effective option ground game that opened up the passing game. This was led by **Richie Taylor**, **Corey Greer**, and **Alec Lewis**.











According to Somnis poor conditioning and the promotion of some of the squad's older players to varsity were factors in the teams overall play.




Fullback Steve Springstead opens a hole against a Shelton defender





Frosh have long season








JV Bumpers show potential




The climax of the JV girls season was a victory over Hoquiam at home in two games with scores of 15-3 and 15-10.



"We have a young, inexperienced team but we're making lots of improvement," stated C-team coach Valerie Davis mid-way through the volleyball season.









Though the Blazer Girl's Soccer Team didn't always win, they played competitive games within a tough league.



The highlights of the season were the games against Tumwater. The Blazers played well, but lost both contests, 0-2 and 0-1.








Sophomores earn respect









guys improved." The teams biggest strength was the defense. It really got their offense to go and the other teams to turn the ball over.


The highlight of the freshmen boys season was the last game when they came back and beat Olympia after they had been defeated by ten points earlier in the year.





Hard work turns season around





C-team grows with experience













The girls had a great outlook on the season and played hard in spite of their inexperience. They plan to stick with it and hope to do very well.





Youngsters look good



Olympia and North Thurston's tennis teams looked to be state contenders this season, providing stiff competition for the young netters.






Divot squad looks on to state





No pain, no gain




