




# THE TABLE *under*

Influences. Just being alive means exposure to many of them. Being in high school means even more. However, we have some choices of what influences us and whether they will be positive or negative, helpful or harmful.




No matter what the hunger, students could usually satis-

fy it in the lunchroom, the student store, or on Wednesdays and Fridays at Mr. Garoutte's Tea House.


Food was not the only item on which students could spend money. Annuals, dance tickets, spirit pom-poms, t-shirts and bake sales often were available in the

upper commons.











Louis Lalane: "I hang out with more people, which means more friends. I have more fun because I can do more as my friends start to drive."







# THE BEST OF TIMES: ASSEMBLIES


The usual pep assembly consisted of introductions of teams, skits by the drama club or the A.S.B., and




The ASB president, Reed Meyer, led the assemblies with his off-beat humor.



This was the idea behind the first cultural awareness assembly. Different cultural groups from around the community and school were repre-


sented in the first of many planned assemblies. Native Americans, Pacific Islanders, and African-Americans all performed dances that to unique their individual cultural group.

Being an observer, Heidi Fredricks explained, "It was really good to see some of the cultural differences instead of just being told about them."











Fashion seemed different, even though many classics from years past made their way into the scene.


Favorites among girls this year ranged from jeans and leather to black and brights. The miniskirt was still popular, as was the most







Walter Mirkovich is one of the six Timberline students that spends time "makin' dough" at Little Caesars Pizza.




Andy Frost says, "I work about twenty hours a week, but when I get my pay check it makes it all seem worth it."









what parenting really involves or to learn how to handle children ahead of time."





Students at Timberline had several opportunities to explore their talents at writing.


Two freshmen, Charles

Michelle Biscay, a senior, was a 1989 National Council of Teacher's Achievement Awards in Writing winner. She was recognized as one of the top writers in the nation.





Above right: Wanda Ramos and Charles Saunders are first and second place winners of the V.F.W. essay contest.



## A HELPING HAND





After the tutors who applied were accepted, they



Ms. Marianne Hunter, the A.P. American Literature teacher, listens as Ms. Downey lectures.



American Literature teachers, Becky Downey and Marianne Hunter decided to utilize this intimate connection for teaching by forming a block with the two classes.

In addition to learning verbal eloquence, members also developed confidence in themselves as


well as their intellectual personal and academic competence.

The club met and practiced in the library classroom five hours weekly. The team did very well at the Puget Sound Tournament at U.P.S. in 1989 and have been state competitors every year.









The fifty minute pro-







# SNATCHED FROM THE JAWS OF VICTORY... VARSITY BARELY MISSES PLAYOFFS.




In a new league, the girls didn't know what to expect, but they showed they were a force to be reckoned with. "Our talent was evenly spread out, while other teams focused




# TALENT BLAZES THE PATH















Coach Wharton was most impressed with the girls game at Bellarmine. Even though they lost by twelve points they played exceptionally well and with a great amount of team spirit.




# FRESHMEN



Because of their outstanding season, the team was honored by the district administration on March 5.












## YOUNG PITCHERS





In his initial year Coach Steve Rood had high expectations "The team has


a real solid foundation," he commented. "They show quite a bit of talent. The girls will be successful because they all play hard and want to be there."







# HEADIN' FOR GREATNESS

Coach Bob Atwell emphasized, "We have some quality athletes. There are


some very strong freshmen competitors on the team this year who, with help from the coaches and returning team members, could do very well."









play makes FFA a dull club, so their holiday festivities included a pool and pizza party. Adviser, Mark Sloan, said the club appreciated the community’s support.






Recognition was necessary. The student body was introduced to the

regular choir teacher at Timberline. Mr. Schooler, the orchestra instructor, worked many hours before and after school to pick the right music to fit his needs. "We've improved






During the school year, the Dance Team practiced everyday after school on routines for assemblies and halftime entertainment for football and basketball.





# DIVERSIFYING LIFE

ilitate the transition from school to work.


F.B.L.A. was involved in many activities, such as wrapping gifts at Fred Meyer during the Christmas season and selling Val-O-Grams.



**T**raditionally, the top ten students of each graduating class were recognized for their academic achievement. The class of 1990 was the first to graduate with the new state grading system. The grading system added different value to pluses and minuses. For example, a B and B- in the past, were valued at 3.0. On the new system a B equals 3.0 and a B- equals a 2.7. Consequently, the cumulative grade point averages ended up merely hundredths of a point apart. After much confusion over grade changes, the annual has chosen to increase the top ten to those students, having at least a 3.8 gpa.

The controversy started over a policy which enabled students who took honor classes in the past to raise their grade point average by erasing the honors classification from their transcript.

The question of whether a student should be allowed to change an official transcript was debated and the names of the top ten were shuffled around for weeks. Due to deadlines, the annual staff has chosen to recognize all students with a 3.8 or above equally without published grade point averages. As of this printing the administration had chosen to recognize the top eleven.
