## Timberline has **SPiRiT**




# Spirit To The Maximum




## So you think guys have it easy?




# A Time To Eat



## What do you crave?

hard earned money.







Beating the crowd...

## Getting Into The School Groove



Luckily, Mr. Denning's cozy classroom couches had helped make Erica Roe's first day a little easier.






A minute too late...


# Learning THE Ropes




at from a new point of view. They also provide a way for students to explore and experience different fields of interest.



## Blazers after school

What we do outside of class changes every year as grow older. As a freshman you might have a sport after school but most manage a ride home and hangout.


When you reach the driving age your priorities change when you have "the bills of driving" come in. You have the ability to drive all over and hangout with friends, but a lot of students work.





# Play Time


# We All Have to Give Sometimes

## Blood Drive


Yet again the annual blood drive was another success this year with 150 participants donation their time, blood and energy to save hundreds of people in need of blood.





## A Club With the Community in Mind


## Orchestrating Success.


## A Look Back...

# Life Threatening Mental Illness is Often Invisisble

Many people have eating disorders, whether it is anorexia, bulimia, or obesity, and some don't even realize that they have a problem. "I think that (eating disorder) are around a lot more than most people realize. I know quite a few individuals who have suffered with eating disorders; it's kind of surprising who they are and how many," said sophomore Briita Swanson. Those that do know they have an eating disorder are often in denial. Even their parents can be in denial.

Since those with the problem are often in denial, "friends need to be conscious of their friends' eating habits. And they need to know how their friends feel about their appearance...their concerns," said sophomore Cara Pirie.

One eating disorder is anorexia nervosa. People suffering from anorexia have a distorted image of thier own body.

They believe that they are fat even when in fact they are dangerously thin. "Even though the person with the disorder may look as good or better than others, they don't think that," said sophomore Pam Michael. A newly diagnosed patient is usually a "model child," an obedient, and good student. People display anorexia through a combination of factors: by refusing to eat, by over exercising, and occasionally by deliberately vomiting and using laxatives. One percent of teenage girls in the U.S. develops anorexia nervosa and up to 10% of those may die as a result. The psychological symptoms include social withdraw, obsessive compulsives, and depression. Some medical consequence are shrunked organs, bone mineral loss, low body temperature, low blood pressure, slowed metabolism and reflexes, and irregular heartbeat which can lead to a cardiac arrest.


Since most people who suffer from bulimia nervosa tend to binge and purge in secret and are not skinny, they are often able to hide their problems from others.

Unlike anorexics, which resist eating, bulimics eat large amounts of high-calorie foods. They then purge themselves by forcing themselves to vomit, exercising excessively, and abusing laxatives. Some medical consequences of bulimia are digestive problems, damage to the stomach, broken blood vessels in the face; bags are under the eyes, loss of tooth enamel, diabetes, heart failure, and certain types of cancer. Up to 19% of college women are bulimic.

According to Timberline Schhol nurse Pat Davis, "Obesity is when someone is 30% over thier normal body weight." Most often obesity in young children is simply caused by over eating. Also children who have obesity in young children whose parents are more likely to become obese parents are more likely to become obese than children whose parents are of average weight. Medical consequences of obesity included high blood pressure, diabetes, strees on bones and joints and breathing difficulties. Many obese children and adolescents also suffer from poor self-esteem.

Most people think of adolescents and adults when they think of eating disorders. However, even children are affected by eating disorders. According to health teacher Mark Rubadue, "Half of 9 and 10 year old girls feel better about themselves if they are on a diet. Also 4 out of 5 children at the age of ten years old are afraid of being fat." This can come from influences such as they portray the image of the "desired woman." Even sports affect the issue of eating disorders.

"Common high risk sports for eating disorders are football, wrestling, gymnastics, and dance/ballet," said Davis. "If you truly have an eating disorder you cannot get over it by yourself. The first place you need to go too a doctor and a counselor."






# Life Skills Program


# Fighting to be on top...



endless. Creativity and freedom of choice are some of the values held high in the tight circle of friends that skateboard, snowboard, or whatever their "extreme" sport is.



**Sky high...**



## bikes vs. boards






them on a 3 game skid.







Along with their fierce competitiveness, the




The definite star of the girls' team was Jennifer Richard, who,




It's safe to say that the Blazer fans look forward to seeing these girls do what they believe is one of the most important activities at Timberline... cheerlead.

# taking it... step by step



The Blazers finished with a 6-14 record. Although this is not all that great, the games were well fought, players hustled and scrapped and we can all appreciate the effort that they put out.









**Did you attend any special camp or training sessions to prepare for the season?**


Over the summer I attended a Nike Golf camp up at PLU. It was a good experience, I learned a lot and had fun doing it!

The best thing about being a member of our team was that we all ways had fun. It didn't matter if we won, lost, or were getting yelled at we always had fun together!








## Traveling That Extra Mile

Some of the goals for this years program included: sending the seniors away with memories of a good season and conditioning some of the returning wrestlers to take their place in the lineup.






# Rivals Week



# REACHING OUT Honor Society


# Class Acts



## Black and White and Kicked All Over








## Ahead of the Pac


