




Chinese Proverb




While she teaches classes she often draws on her travels through Europe and the Mediterranean to illustrate the text. It is this kind of enthusiasm that keeps her students going.

The A.S.B. and their committees this year were finally getting into the swing of things.



Kidding aside, all of the committees did their jobs well and even managed a little style and flair..



"Hey! Did you see that fence going up around the school?"




"Yeah, I guess they're trying to make this into a prison. Next thing you know, they'll put up guard towers with spotlights and machine gun nests."





The nurses aide and orderly class prepares the graduate for work in hospitals and convalescent centers. It is taught in a classroom at the district office (old Lacey grade school). The class takes up three periods and grants two credits per semester. The teacher is Mrs. Barbara Krous, R.N.

For the first two months students work in class. Then they work at Roo Lan Gardens and Panorama Convalescent Center. Patient care in practice often consists of range of motion, changing beds, feeding, and of course emptying bed pans.

Almost all of the students find jobs when they have completed the course, and many go on for advanced training in nursing or a related career area.

Nineteen seventy six was an historical year. Living through the country's bicentennial was a real experience. With George Washington in every advertisement, Paul Revere in every t.v. show, and Betsey Ross on every product, it was easy for the average American to get tired of the anniversary. (Notice the theme of this book)

Therefore, instead of filling this page with data from America's glorious history, we're going to look at North Thurston's history.

In '56, a group of Lacey citizens made their own declaration of independence. They decided they weren't being treated fairly by the Olympia School District, so with a fistful of supporters, and even less money, they threw together a very inexpensive school district. Superintendent, high school principal, and junior high principal were all in the same building along with the three or four hundred 7th through 12th graders. Elementary students were housed in Lacey and South Bay grade schools.

About 20 teachers were employed at NT that first year. The staff was young, and Mr. Kay Thomas, one of the teachers employed that year, remembers the teachers as being very close to the students and visa versa.

The Rams didn't leave an impressive sports record that first year, but the majority of the student body turned out to support every game. One game NT actually scored and the crowd went wild.


The district grew and North Thurston became strictly a high school. In '76 Thurston held close to 1300 students, and employed a staff of over 70. With this increase in size came a change in the society of the school. In 1976, it wasn't unusual to walk through the capacity-filled halls and see many unfamiliar faces. Many of the teachers were not well-acquainted, and to say the teachers did not know all the students would be an understatement.

As a result of Lacey being one of the state's fastest growing cities, North Thurston became overcrowded, and Lacey citizens again saw a need for a change. The results are left to be written in another yearbook of a future year.

Distributive Education Clubs of America are fast growing here at North Thurston and throughout America. There were about 33 NTHS senior coop students that met downtown with students from Olympia, Tumwater, Capital, and Timberline High Schools. Junior DE consisted of six chapters (classes) with about 100 students. DECA prepares students for life in the business world. They learn to work cash registers, inventory store items, make change, and apply for jobs. Some of the work is fun, like working in the haunted house that DECA and KGY cosponsor.

All the funds that DECA raised helped pay for students to attend differnt DECA conventions across the state.

Advisors Miss Becker and Mr. Mahlum also help members find jobs that relate to their school training.









Homecoming


The football team added yet another victory to the 20th year of homecoming. A drizzly halftime began with the parade of class floats and the introduction of the homecoming court.



Club members enjoyed sun, serf, rain, and sand during the spring vacation hike to the Olympic Coast.




They were able to make an expensive sport available to any student willing to work.


Adding an extra spark of enthusiasm to the traditional yells and songs, the 75-76 cheer staff introduced many new cheers.



In a way, the season was very successful. The league championship was attained, a goal that had been elusive for five years.

The 1975-76 wrestling team was highly regarded as the strongest in the BHL. This was before the season even started. Rolling over their first six opponents, the Rams ran into a tough and ready Capital squad. Going by the previous match scores, this was a squeaker. Up to this point, the Rams had a 7-0 season record, a first in one tournament and a second in another.

After kicking Yelm clear out of the state, the Ram grapplers suffered their first and only set-back of the year at the hands of the Bearcats. With Shelton the only unbeaten team now, the Rams had their work cut out for them. But wrestling their finest match of the year, they came back from a 16-0 deficit to post a wild win over the Highclimbers. Coasting past Aberdeen and Elma, the RamRiders finished their best season in years with only one loss all season long.


When you don't have a terrific season, you really wonder if it's all worth it. But the 1975-76 basketball team has to look to the future.



Now twenty years later, 1976, Steve Riddle the editor, and the class is accredited. For the first time the annual had a woman sports editor, Kathy Rigney.



The photography came from the head photographer Greg Campbell. Chris Cooley and Dave Iles both spent many hours working on photography.

Sandy Peasley and her advertising staff managed to sell and put together 16 pages of advertising. So we are afloat, just barely, for another year.






