
There is no single group responsible for conveying the ideas of education. The responsibility falls on the whole, the teachers, the administration, the students, and the community.

Welcome to Thurston

The entire '69-'70 Student Body of NTHS was brought together by a Welcome Assembly. The assembly began with several speeches given by Committee Heads and ASB officers. Due to technical difficulties in the new PA System, speakers were barely heard. This led to an inattentive audience, where gum, money, and other items were heaved across the gym, between classes.

After a Pep Club skit, Mr. Russel gave an apology and explanation for the delayed annuals.

The Pep Staff did their "Hello Thurston" routine, which was interrupted by a shower of coins, tossed by several inconsiderate people, who were mainly Sophomores. During this first assembly the search was started for Herman.

Following the two-bits yell, a massive gum throw occurred. It was brief, but it left the gym floor carpeted with gum.

The Seniors took over the Assembly from there and presented a skit with the typical Sophomore initiation scene. The Senior Class Executive boys came on next, in old cheerleader outfits, and led the classes in class competition. The Seniors won by a fixed vote. Just to get the kids in a good spirit, each class gave their own number of raahs. The assembly was climaxed with another gum throw which was bigger and more violent than the first. Sling shots and other methods were used to hurl the gum, which led to injuries. Because of the trouble which occurred, assemblies were eliminated until a public apology was made by the guilty persons involved.

Mr. Thomas, with teachers' and students' help, hoped to keep as many *in school* as physically possible.

Mr. Bozak planned to point out to students the evils and consequences of skipping, and also the importance of a return to school with a good spirit both in body and mind.

Mr. Arbuckle wished to have a place for every student and every student in his place! (Or close.)

All Seniors were given an opportunity to participate in discussion groups of the seniors in three one-hour sessions. They discussed topics of importance to them and had a chance to freely express ideas and feelings. Mrs. Vaughan hoped that in such small groups they could feel they were worth while. During the last group session, seniors will receive results of SCAT Tests (School and College Ability Tests), GPA, class rank and some information on future planning. Each senior had at least one individual conference to discuss future plans. Students also saw her to discuss any personal problems.

Mr. Sinclair said that during the 1969-'70 school year, Sophomores and Juniors will have an opportunity to participate in action groups. Such groups were formed to help students find a common purpose. If they settle on one, the group would set out to test it. In the past action groups they have identified the need to be worthwhile to society or a purpose of life. To test this they worked with handicapped children, the old folk's home, child care centers and rehabilitated alcoholics.



Mr. Kiolet wanted a successful Boys Club and a winning baseball team. He also wanted to teach his students something of a value that would be helpful to them.


Mr. Koval hoped to be able to make the students aware of what is happening in the world today, by relating past history to present history.

Mr. Morris hoped to help his students understand the various media, use them in a constructive manner, and place them in their proper perspective.







Mr. Hackstadt hoped to assist his students in equipping themselves to logically solve problems of a wide variety which they may face in the future.



One of the most important classes in a girl's schedule at NTHS is physical education. These classes are aimed not only at individual and team sports, but also include improving relations with other girls.

We're the class of Pep and Go, we're the Class of 7-0!!!

September 3, 1967 was the day the doors of North Thurston High School opened for the *Class of 70*, the last entire class to enter from Chinook Jr. High School.


Their first big ordeal in high school, was the election of class officers. Their chant, "We've got pep, We've got go, We're the Class of 7-0", indicated their spirit but not always their actions. Winning five assemblies was outstanding for a Sophomore Class, but typical of the class' fate two were taken away: One because of firecrackers and another for throwing clothes on the gym floor. Their first big win, the Homecoming float, was a great success until they struck a car after rounding the football field. This unfortunate incident depleted the class treasury, leaving the class broke.

In '69 the motto "The *Class of 70* is heavenly", was an obvious sign that as Juniors they were out to banish unkindly thoughts which had been formed about them. Money was again in the minds of these angels. They earned money doing anything from selling hand warmers (baked potatoes) at games, to washing cars for 99 cents. By getting everyone involved they expected to transform their class into a united group of students. Their hard work resulted in the winning of every pep assembly during the Basketball Season. Alas, the end of the year approached and the Juniors were anxious to begin as Seniors. With the election of class officers in the spring and Move-Up Day these classmen moved across the bleachers to the Senior section.

"Seniors, Seniors, Seniors are we", was a loudly sung phrase among these new upperclassmen. With executive meetings during the summer and through the contacting of class members, the organization of class money-raising projects was established. The class started in the summer with car washes followed by a fall dance, pin sales and a spring hootenany. The Big Candle Sale put the class treasury over the mark with an excess of 3000 dollars. Having a treasury larger than any previous class enabled the class to leave the school a large gift and to make plans for an all-night ferry party, to take place after graduation ceremonies.

With the announcement of Hall of Fame, May Court and other Senior honors, their year rapidly concluded. As they finally travelled down the aisle on graduation night, they were no longer the unified *Class of 70*, but a group of young adults each to traverse his own path.

Juniors-the class of 71


"We're the class that's number one, we're the class of '71.'" This yell arose from the Junior class as they re-entered the halls of North Thurston for another year.

The enthusiasm of the class bubbled over during pep week. Through hard work and determination to win, the Junior hall took first place. Victorious again, the class also won the chariot competition.







There were several outstanding individuals, but the team members elected Wayne Leonard as the Soccer Inspirational Award winner.










JV Players Have Winning Season












Forfeits were common on the Ram team, but they came through with a 9-3 win-loss record.




The 1969-70 N.T.H.S. track team finished the year with a 3 win-1 loss league record and finished fourth in the League meet.

Top point men of the season were Devin Brown, 106½ pts.; Jim Fawcett, 74 pts.; and Mike Futrelle, 53½ pts.














The Activities Committee's main job was to distribute Honors Passes to qualified applicants. The leader of this group was Sandy Smith.

The wrestlers and student body say "Thanks a Million" to this terrific Rally Squad and their reliable advisor, Miss Trowbridge.








Nurses Club


Down the White Slopes

Their plans for the year were to take a trip to the Seattle Center and go on a few bicycle trips to sketch. Also in their plans was the idea of changing their name.








Foreign Language Club


The orchestra spent most of their time practicing for a fall concert, two spring concerts, Baccalaureate and Graduation.




With 120 couples present, Queen Mariann Mahurin, escorted by King Bob Collins, was crowned and reigned the night of May 9th.


