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

The Junior class has concluded another year in the pursuit of knowledge and enjoyment in its educational program. Learning with each other, they also acquired a fine sense of social development.



Looking toward the future, the Juniors excitedly advance to the position of might, in which they will complete their high school education.











The baseball team received more support this season than previously, because two sections of bleachers were moved for the fans to the backstop from the football field.




