


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


We are the youth of today.






Every generation has faced this task.




## The Dedicatee

Miss Rosengren: “Do the best you can with what you’ve got.” She considers it “an old Rosengren proverb.”







This quote from Peter Abslard was given by Mr. McCallum: "The first key to wisdom is this: constant and frequent questioning . . . for by doubting we are led to question and by questioning we arrive at the truth."

Mr. Hackstadt, who taught Geometry, Algebra and Math Analysis, stressed the importance of responsibility. He also gave this definition: "A responsible person may be said to be one who recognizes his obligations and fulfills them . . . primarily his obligation to respect the dignity of his fellow man."

Geometry, Algebra and Trigonometry were taught by Miss Western who gave this reply: "Each person must dedicate himself to some meaningful purpose. Then, he must strive for this goal with the honesty, the respect, the courtesy and the responsibility to make the ultimate accomplishment worthy of achievement."

Mr. Taylor does not want to instill any ideas in his student's, but merely wants to equip them to handle the problems they will meet. He taught Geometry and Algebra.


This was the reply of Mr. Ahrens who taught Algebra, Senior Math and Survey Science: "Society doesn't owe anyone anything; it's the other way around."



Mrs. Benson, new to North Thurston, taught Advanced Steno and Accounting.



Mr. Peterson and Mr. Fry taught Drivers Training.







The A.S.B. Government directs the business of the student body and president Ross Hays assumed the role of guiding the student government.


## Student Body Elections, 1969


Overall the '69 elections were characterized by an atmosphere of maturity that will prove to be beneficial if it continues next year.

Students cast ballots in the largest election yet.






Out with the old...and in with the new.







Patrolling the school and performing any other service asked of them, the members of Service Club gave many hours of dedication to North Thurston and its students.









## A Hard Fought Season











They were coached by Mr. Walters and Mr. Colleran. Both were fine coaches and they always kept the team ready mentally and physically.









The success or failure of the season would depend mainly on the Sophomores.


The season on the whole was a success. Although the Seamount League standing was only 6th, the dual meet record was five wins and only one loss.




This year, the North Thurston High School had the pleasure of welcoming a new tennis coach, Miss O'Kelly. Her hard work proved to be an inspiration to the team.

Next year all the Varsity lettermen will be returning, but only one of the Varsity letterwomen will be back. There will be quite a few of the J.V.'s returning.



The class had always been a group of strong individuals which often benefitted and sometimes hurt the Seniors' efforts. The emphasis was more on individual preparation and school betterment than class spirit, the class did, however, recapture the megaphone. Their achievements had been many and varied. They had worked to promote leadership through their actions and showed that there are responsible youth in this era of irresponsibility. The rapid approach of commencement made them realize that soon they would be leaving the security of childhood and enter into lives of their own. Graduation brought them across the threshold; no longer the Senior Class of 1969 but the young adults of tomorrow.




