THE YEAR OF SPIRIT ... CLASS


AND SCHOOL





SOPHOMORES




THE CLASS OF '68

They also began the "new trend" of a band instead of records at our dances by sponsoring their *sophomore* dance with Sr. Walter Raleigh and the Coupons.





Most students at North Thurston had doubtful speculation about the Ram's 1968 Track team. Maybe this is what stirred up the spirit and team unity that sparked the team to second place in the Seamount League, behind Fife and Curtis who shared the League title.

The big load was carried by the nine or ten returning lettermen. Mr. Arbuckle, took over as head track mentor, as Mr. Thomas turned over his reign. Along with Mr. Arbuckle, Mr. Fry and Mr. Upton took their respectable spots on the team. Mr. Fry coached the weight men and Mr. Upton took the sprints.

Six school records in track and field events fell in 1968. The Javelin record was broken by Brian Williams, as he tossed the spear 175'3". The Pole Vault record was shattered by Eldon Colombo, vaulting 14 feet 6 inches. The High Jump record fell to the hands of Greg Emry after he cleared 6 feet 2 and one quarter inches. Eldon had cleared 6 feet 2 inches two days earlier. The oldest record in the school books was broken by Greg Emry, that being the high hurdles, the new record 15.5 seconds. Mike Murray who also anchored the record breaking Mile Relay team, broke the Quarter Mile time, with a run of 51.8 seconds. 

With the ideals of scholarship and friendship actively practiced, the Honor Society was an uncommonly worthwhile organization.










Miss Voll spent her first year at North Thurston teaching three classes of English, a period of drama, and a class of speech. She also advised the Red Cross Club.






Science means something different to everyone but as a rule it is an interesting and challenging subject.

Mrs. Bouton taught four periods of Biology as well as a class of Research Science. She also served as advisor to the Science Club.


