

INTERESTS VARY AT NORTH THURSTON

Success depends on character and everything you do.



Graduation, the event which every student anticipates and inwardly fears was now approaching. Soon their high school life would be behind them and in front, a whole new world of opportunities would open up.






RAMS 14 VIKINGS 13 RAMS 12 SPARTANS 12



On its way to a first successful season, the team defeated Lakeside, Sammamish, and Seattle Prep.







The 100 and 200 yard dash are two of the most popular races in track. The dashes require a quick, strong start to get ahead of your opponents and a fast finish to win.



The 440 and 880 are middle distance races although the 440 is practically a field sprint. Two of the most strenuous events in track, the 440 and 880 require much preparation and hard work.

The two long distance races, the mile and two mile, are two of the most tiring and arduous events in track. Having a strong finish and keeping a fast pace during the race, are important if the runner is to win.




One of the most thrilling running events in track is the relay. The relay team consists of four members who each pass a baton to another member after 220 or 440 yards depending if the relay is a half mile or mile race.






The three throwing events in track are the shot put, the discus, and the javelin. All three events require coordination, form, and strength. Using the proper form, it is possible to throw the javelin, shot put, or discus farther than a person with just strength.





One of the most unique running races, is the hurdles event. Timing and form are very important besides overall speed if the hurdler is to run a good race.



The long jump is similar to the pole vault, only instead of jumping up, you are jumping out. It is very important to get a fast run and to jump high as you leave the ground in order to make a long jump.



Requiring speed, agility and strength, the pole vault is one of the most exciting events in track. With the use of better technique and the fiber glass pole, new heights are constantly being achieved.



Much technique is also needed in the high jump. As in almost all track and field events speed is a necessity. Relying on form and a strong kick, a good jumper can jump over his actual height.




THE PACK


Chosen Thespian of the year was Mike Thomas, who was a great credit to the society.

Mike will be well remembered for the fine work he did during his acting career.







The "Rampage" was advised by Mr. Taylor. In addition to Journalism, he taught English courses. He was the advisor to Quill and Scroll.





