
ONLY ONE LIFE TO LIVE




SCHOOL PROVIDES A BEGINNING


Miss Rosengren, also a new teacher taught five periods of English too. She also helped direct the fall play.

Science is a study that is marked by exact observation, organized experiment, and correct thinking. The science students of North Thurston worked hard to learn about all phases of science.






Mr. Jouno, who advised the future farmers at North Thurston, was head of the agriculture program here.

A fine group of **A.S.B. Officers** worked hard to better our relations with other schools as well as work on our general school spirit. The idea of an Inner-High Council between the area's three high schools is an example, also the proposal of having a column in the Daily Olympian would let the other schools know what we are doing. This spirit of friendliness benefitted our school a great deal.

As far as bettering the North Thurston High School itself the Executive Council worked very hard. Not only by continuing current traditions but coming up with ideas of their own. The working towards setting up a Student Court and the setting up of a Smoking Committee are a few of these new ideas. The sponsoring of the ASB Card selling contest with Tumwater and the lending of money to the Band for new uniforms are a couple of the traditions kept by this year's Executive Council.

One important problem of the school which was very often neglected was tackled by this past year's officers. This was the establishment of a better student-faculty relationship.

This past year the ASB Council also took part in a national cause. This past year they were the head of the annual March of Dimes Committee. They attended, along with committees from other high schools, a Birth Defects Clinic in Seattle.



There was also an opportunity for one or two invitational meets. The debaters competed in the Seamount league, as did the athletes. But like most North Thurston teams, other interested students filled the vacancies and performed well. The team as a whole completed a very credible season.

This reflected an attitude of uniqueness and enthusiasm. Non-musical endeavors to promote funds for new uniforms were marked by a candy sale and an auction. With the help of the student body and the above projects the band was able to achieve its goal.

Many appearances and several hours of long, hard work kept the orchestra members very busy this year. They were able to appear before many different groups and were very enjoyable to listen to.

Visibility was exhibited by numerous contests and programs. Among these were the spring and fall concerts, Christmas program, Seamount League Festival, and several contests. Two girls stood out among the group as soloists. Jan Jaussi and Nancy Failor were selected to attend All-Northwest. The girls got to travel to Missoula, Montana for the honor. The whole chorus performed creditably throughout the year.

The Glee took part in the Fall Concert, sang for the shut-ins at Capital Arms, and participated in the Spring Concert.

They were outfitted in matching blue blazers and flowered dresses and looked neat and proper for all occasions. They practiced on Tuesday nights and sang for numerous banquets and conventions including a few school functions. To add interest in their swing numbers, they added some choreography. When they attended contest they received a superior rating.





A variety of different types of plays put on throughout the year kept this year's **Thespian Club** very busy. Two extra one act plays were produced this year as their part in the North Thurston Carnival. In addition to these plays a fall and three small spring plays were put on. As last year, this year's Thespian Club also took part in a one-act play contest in Tacoma.



This year the **North Thurston Drill Team** was headed by two Drillmasters. First semester was Eileen Jackson; Second semester was Dixie Rhodes. Their main purpose was to entertain the crowds during the halftime sessions of the football and basketball games. Besides marching they sold popcorn during all the games. They were also invited to march at the Shelton Forest Festival. This year was very rewarding for both the girls and the audiences.

The cheerleaders started preparing themselves for the busy year ahead by beginning practice early. They practiced everyday during the summer which was climaxed at a conference in Ellensburg, Washington. This was their first year as a combined song and yell staff, which the cheerleaders themselves, thought worked much better. Other activities done by the staff this year were a dance held in February, marching in the Shelton Forest Festival Parade, cheering at the football and basketball games and attending wrestling matches as well.

The Rams were fast and quick. Their offense and defense showed this through-out the season.






