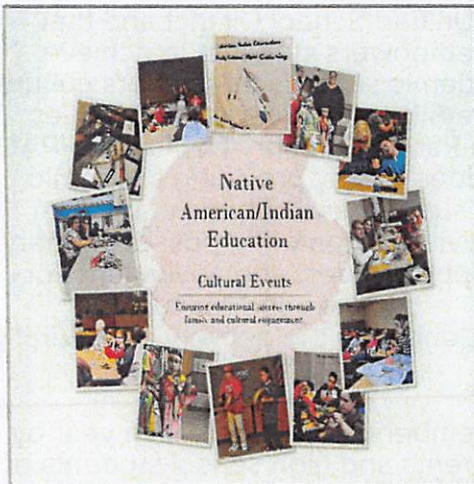

American Indian Alaska Native (AIAN) Eligibility

Overview

The San Juan Unified School District has approximately 600 self-identified American Indian/Alaska Native students. Annual student enrollment in the American Indian Education Program fluctuates between 100-200 students.

Funding

The program is funded under the Indian Education Act. All services are provided to students free of charge.

Our goal is to improve student academic performance by providing supplemental educational services. The main purpose of the Act is to ensure educational success for American Indian and Alaska Native students.

Services

Tutoring Program

The tutoring program provides after school assistance for students in 1st through 12th grades who are below grade level in reading, math and/or language arts. To request a tutor, contact our office at (916) 979- 8596 or visit our website for a tutoring request form.

Cultural Events

The American Indian Education Program offers several cultural events throughout the school year, culminating in a Senior Celebration for graduating seniors who are enrolled in the Program.

The Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) is a committee of American Indian/Alaska Native (AIAN) parents, families, students, teachers and community, entrusted to promote the local American Indian community. We are dedicated to supporting quality education that is accessible to AIAN students and families within San Juan Unified School District and that empowers students to achieve academic success that honors culture, traditional languages, and values. The Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) does this by providing academic support and culturally specific activities, promoting post-secondary opportunities, and advocating for services and resources that enhance the delivery of culturally responsible education.

Members are elected each year by parents and high school students of the SJUSD American Indian/Alaska Native community. Committee meetings are held in the evening during the school year on agreed-upon dates.
