Title 1 Parent/Guardian Presentation

How does a school become a Title 1 building?

MEVSD Free / Reduced % = 24%

- Navin's % = 29%
- Edgewood's % = 29%
- Mill Valley's = 31.4%

Due to Edgewood, Navin, and Mill Valley having a higher percentage of free / reduced students than the district average and other schools, these two schools are eligible for Title 1 funding and have been selected to be serviced as Targeted Assisted buildings by the district.

What type of Title 1 buildings are there?

There are two types of Title 1 buildings.

- Targeted Assisted Building
 - A school with less than 40% low-income students who is eligible for Title 1 funds and is selected to be served the the local school district

- Schoolwide Building
 - A school with an enrollment of at least 40% low-income students and is selected for service by the local school district

How do children qualify for Title 1 services?

Schools utilize multiple data points in order to prioritize which students are in need of Title 1 services and determine which type of interventions will be utilized.

- CORE Phonics Survey

How often do students receive services?



The services provided by the school vary depending on the need of the child. They could include, but not limited to:

- Small group intervention
- One-on-One intervention
- “Orton Gillingham”
- Skill specific remediation
- Intervention provided by the reading specialist in the regular classroom (inclusion)
- Intervention provided in the reading specialist’s classroom (pull-out)
- 20-30 minutes sessions
- Frequency of 1 to 5 times per week

- Be a positive support to the child and teacher
- Promote a growth mindset
- Support your child with completing homework assignments
- Support your child with practicing reading at home by learning strategies from your child's teacher(s)
- Promote reading at home just for fun
